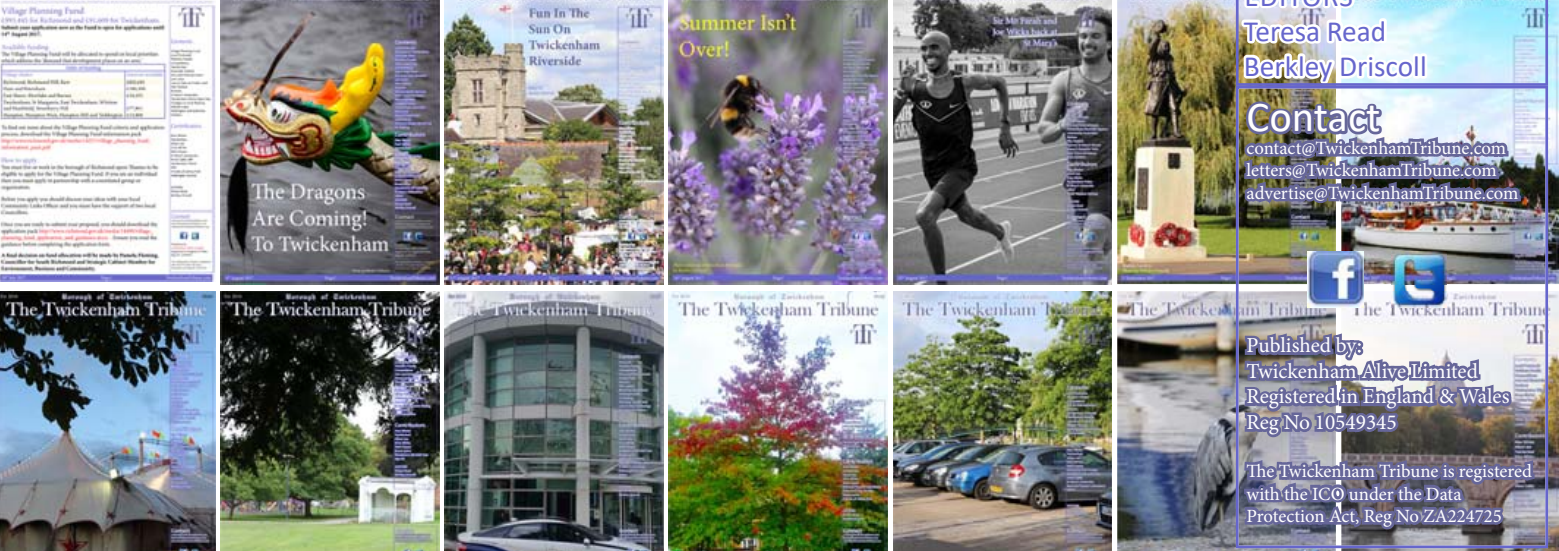
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One year Anniversary

PART 47 – TWICKENHAM’S CINEMA HERITAGE CONTINUES!

We have been without a purpose built Cinema in Twickenham town centre since the Odeon closed its doors 31 years ago.

This week’s 1940’s postcard shows the Odeon cinema proudly standing dominant on the corner of Heath Road and Strawberry Vale and facing King Street in all its glory.



Originally named the Luxor Picture Theatre, it opened on 18th November 1929 with Victor McLaglan in “King of the Kyber Rifles”. It was designed as a cine-variety theatre with a proscenium 35 feet wide, there was a 17 feet deep stage and four dressing rooms. The theatre contained a mixture of styles, with the exterior being a combination of Egyptian and modern. The Egyptian theme was continued in the auditorium and the foyer was modern. The Luxor Picture Theatre had a large and rare Compton 2Manual/8Rank theatre organ.

In 1932, the Luxor Picture Theatre was sold to the Joseph Mears Theatres chain and In January 1944 was sold on to the Odeon Theatres chain who re-named it Odeon in January 1946. After the Second World War and into the 1950’s, my Mother frequently appeared on the stage here as a member of the Max Castelli Accordion Band which was also based in Twickenham and played frequent concerts in the theatre.

The Odeon was closed by the Rank Organisation on 10th October 1981 with Franco Nero in “Enter the Ninja” and David Warner in “Nightwing”. A spectacular organ concert on the Compton organ was held in the theatre, just prior to closing. The theatre was demolished in 1986 and a sports club and bar now operating as Rileys was built on the site.

Anyway, here is the really good news. After establishing a monthly base in the Cabbage Patch at the beginning of the year, the Twickenham Cinema Club opened for business at the Exchange 300 seater cinema /theatre at Brewery Wharf opposite the station this week. Those of us in attendance watched the 2009 film “A Single Man” starring Colin Firth, from very comfortable tiered seats. The club has forged a partnership with the St. Mary’s College managed Exchange building and will be showing films monthly. Find out more on www.twickenhamcinemaclub.co.uk

Book Early for Christmas!

Halloween is over...phew! It's only early November, and Bonfire Night is still to come, but Christmas is already well underway in retail terms, (and there will be more here on Christmas food in future columns). But if you are thinking of avoiding cooking and planning to go out to a restaurant for Christmas lunch this year, you'd better hurry up and book! The Royal Oak In Teddington tells me it has been fully booked since July! So book very early if you want to go there for Christmas lunch 2018.



So where can you go locally for Christmas lunch? I've done a bit of a ring-round for you to save you the trouble of researching. But I should mention that those places which are listed below have all said that they are filling up fast, so I wouldn't leave it too long if you are planning to eat out this year.

[The Bingham](#) is always a popular Christmas lunch venue and they do still have some availability for Christmas lunch – it is £150 per person, though, for a special festive seven-course tasting menu plus coffee and petit fours. But it will be very good.

There are quite a few pubs doing Christmas lunch, which should be nice and relaxed and allow beer drinkers to enjoy a few pints! Also, many are dog friendly (but do check on booking), which means that you don't have to leave canine family members out of the celebrations. Most of the [Youngs](#) pubs that have restaurants are open: including [The Alexander Pope](#), plus [The Orange Tree](#), [The Shaftesbury](#) and [The Marlborough](#) in Richmond. They do have some availability and the prices vary. Generally prices are around £75 per adult to include prosecco/champagne on arrival, three courses & coffee (reduced price for children.)

[The Fox](#) in Church Street has an excellent value Christmas Day lunch (£55 to include drink on arrival, three courses and coffee).

[The Royal Oak](#) in Twickenham is offering a four course Christmas Day lunch for £60. Its private room seating 12 is already booked but if you have a very large family, it still has the larger private room - seating up to 20 - available!

[Le Salon Privé](#) is also open and offers three courses for £85 with a glass of champagne. (Children half price)

Going a tad further afield to Hampton Court (and the Chapel Royal at Hampton Court Palace is fabulous for Christmas morning) there is [The Mitre Hotel](#), situated adjacent to the bridge. Lunch there on Christmas Day is £99 (drinks & canapés on arrival, three courses, coffee and petit fours/ mince pies). And, from just £130 for a double room B&B, you could always make a night of it too (saves having to get a cab home!)

[The Bell](#) in Hampton has lunch for £69 (£30 children) for three courses, coffee and mince pies.

To sum up then, and avoid disappointment, don't leave it too late. Quite a few places aren't open on Christmas Day and, to be honest, people in the hospitality industry work such long hours I don't blame them wanting to spend Christmas Day relaxing with their families.

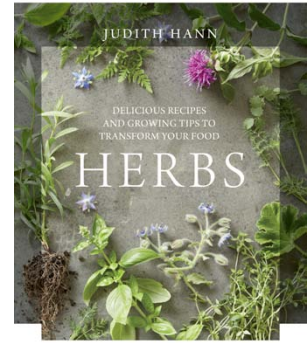

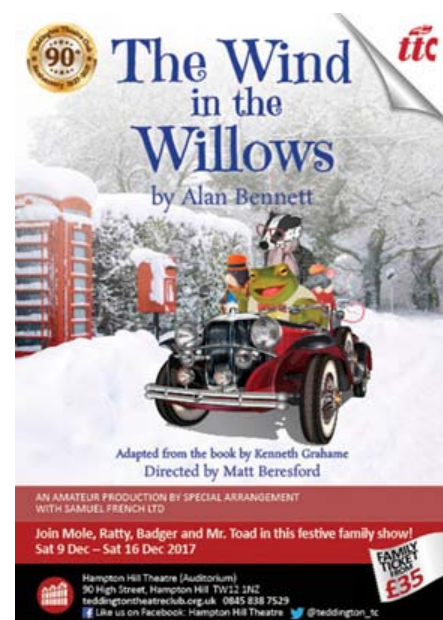

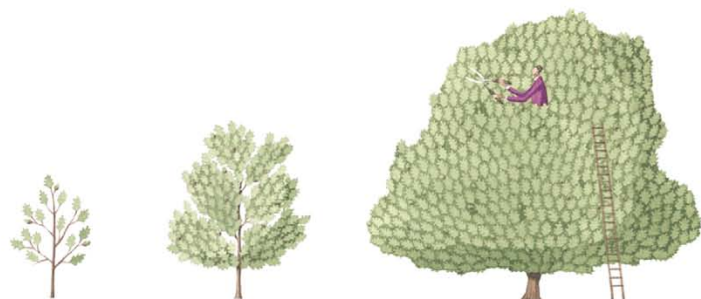

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Has Twickenham Been ReDiscovered?

It always seemed that LBRuT's description of their property development ambitions for Twickenham Riverside was a misnomer – “Twickenham ReDiscovered”. Who has rediscovered Twickenham Riverside and what have they rediscovered? Have they found that Twickenham has so much history?

It was the interest in renovating the historic slipway next to the Eel Pie bridge which led to one group finding out about the competition for proposals for the riverside site. At first it was thought that the competition would be open to all but as time went on it became clear that those invited to submit proposals would be selected by the Council. However, around five to six people from Twickenham were present in the few teams drawing up plans.

It was understood by competitors that a number of architects would take part and that questions from each group – and the answers – would be circulated. After a while, it was concluded that there could not be many participants as only one set of questions were circulated.

One group came up with the idea of bringing an outdoor pool to Twickenham Riverside – it seemed a popular idea from conversations with residents – but the limitations of the site meant that the best option was a modern lido complex based on a successful model outside London.

The Council Brief was also limiting especially as it included Council offices which now seem to have been airbrushed out of LBRuT's recent information. It would be interesting to know whether Quinlan and Francis Terry considered providing Council offices and if not, why not?

After submission of the plans some participants were surprised that there was not a public exhibition and very early on Lord True made an announcement in the press that there would not be a lido.

A petition on Change.Org produced quite the opposite response to Lord True as thousands of signatures and well thought out comments from local people soon mounted up. The Council was not impressed with the interest in the lido and at a meeting of senior members of the Council it was requested that the petition should be taken down. Cllr Fleming insisted that residents wanted “permeable” space and she wrote to councillors to tell them that a lido would block the view of the river.

The competition started in January 2015 and now the Council have finally published the plans produced by the four groups of competitors, as above. Below is a link to the consultations.

Cllr Fleming is pushing ahead to planning with the Francis Terry scheme (he parted from his father,

Quinlan, with whom he won the competition) although there are currently over 5,000 residents against the proposals and, in comparison, support for Council plans is extremely low.

Cllr Hodgins has recently taken over the reins of the Conservative party from Lord True and it can only be hoped that he will take the Council plan for Twickenham Riverside to the electorate at the Local Election on 3 May 2018.

Many people have spent decades “Saving Twickenham Riverside from Richmond Council” and now more than ever we need to stop this mad rush to build flats on the Twickenham Riverside site – there is an opportunity to regenerate Twickenham and it will not be achieved by building blocks of flats.

Expressing the art of the theatre critic

SMDG at Hampton Hill Theatre until 28th October

The WI is not to be messed with. It is they, let us not forget, who slow hand-clapped Prime Minister Tony Blair for impolitely hijacking their Wembley conference with a political speech in 2000. It is they too, who raised huge amounts of money for leukaemia research with a groundbreaking, naked calendar and gave us a new national catchphrase on the subject of buns. But in the case of WI Blues, the WI is in fact a simple plot device to bring a group of women together in a room for an evening, so we need not live in fear.



This group of five women duly gather in the living room of Grace who has just waved her husband off for the evening. First to arrive is Fiona, a simple and rather downtrodden farmer's wife bearing homemade coleslaw. Fiona is patronised and abused by Grace (nicely played by Norma Beresford) who is equipped with gold standard qualifications in snobbery. Three other characters arrive: Gina Way as Jane, the good natured vamp; Bobbie Ennals as Pippa, a woman who appears for most of the proceedings to be an ordinary wife and mother, and Hazel (Sue McMillan) who owns the local deli and is struggling with an illness which may turn out to be serious. These characters then interact with each other, largely on the subject of the men in their lives, but also giving vent to their frustrations and the ups and downs of daily life. Their reason for being there is to help Grace with a speech she's going to make in the hope of being elected head of the local WI.



St Mary's Drama Group is evidently blessed with a group of skilled actors, everyone in this piece was doing their best with rather weak material. Norma Beresford as Grace would deserve credit for the vast amount of lines she had to deliver but in addition to this she gave life to a caricature role that drew a lot of laughs from a receptive audience. Gina Way and Sue McMillan similarly gave it their all and got any comedy that was to be had from what they were given. I was startled to learn towards the end of the play, that the character Pippa was the child of a peer of the realm, as the children of the

aristocracy generally carry themselves with more languid superiority than the rest of us, but this character seemed a little underwritten.

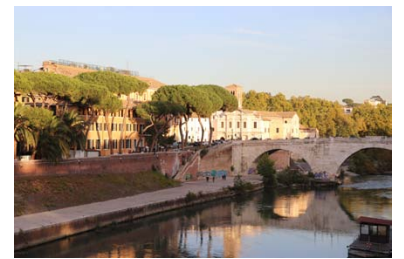
Stand out performance of the evening was Jean Keay as Fiona. Ms Keay clearly bagged the best role and played it to great effect. She was very funny, timed her responses beautifully and overdid nothing despite a rather bizarre section in which her character got halfway drunk and forced everyone else to play pass the parcel, you need some degree of skill as an actor to carry that off – and trust me, when women get drunk together, we don't play pass the parcel!

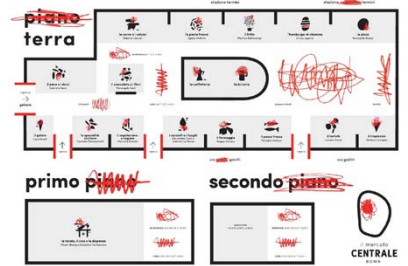

Brigade braced for record Bonfire Night call outs

Fire chiefs are urging Londoners to attend organised firework displays rather than holding their own in a bid to reduce Bonfire Night incidents.

Last year was the busiest Bonfire Night in six years, with more than 500 incidents on November 5 compared to 150 in 2015. There have already been nearly 100 fires in London caused by fire works this year.



London Fire Brigade Group Manager Mark Hazelton said: “This year, Bonfire Night falls on a weekend again and while we want people to enjoy the celebrations, we also want them to stay safe.

“Last year was one of the busiest firework nights in recent years and three people were seriously injured. We want to avoid anyone getting hurt this year and I would strongly urge families to take children to an organised display.

“If you are having your own display then make sure you follow our safety advice including only buying fireworks marked with the British Standard Kitemark BS7114, never drinking alcohol if setting off fireworks, always keeping fireworks in a closed box and following the instructions carefully when using them.”

Firework related fires the Brigade has attended this year include:

- A block of maisonettes in Stratford in September which was started by a firework being ignited in the hallway. Firefighters had to lead a man to safety and fortunately stopped the fire spreading.
- A call to a fire in Hounslow where a shed was alight with a box of fireworks stored inside last month.

There are dozens of organised displays taking place across the city this weekend and we would urge people to attend these rather than holding their own events at home.

Firework safety

The Brigade is urging the public to attend organised displays this year.

However, for those planning on hosting their own event, always follow the **Brigade’s bonfire and firework safety advice**, including:

Only buy fireworks marked with the British Standard Kitemark BS7114.

- Never drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions carefully when using them.
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back.
- Never go back to them once they are lit. Even if a firework hasn’t gone off, it could still explode.
- Never throw fireworks and never put them in your pocket.
- Respect your neighbours – don’t let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws to follow.
- Take care with sparklers – never give them to children under five. Even when they have gone out they are still hot, so put sparklers in a bucket of water after use.
- Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening.

ICE RINK WINS APPEAL FOR RADNOR GARDENS

The Planning Inspectorate has upheld the appeal for a temporary ice rink in Radnor Gardens, and overturned the decision to refuse permission.

Decision

1. I allow the appeal and grant planning permission for temporary structures erected in the grounds at Radnor Gardens as part of the winter festivities for visitors, comprising of: 1. Open-air, temporary ice rink covering a surface area of up to 400m². 2. One area for ice rink machinery (chillers, generator, bunded fuel tank and pumps) housed in two acoustic enclosures and screened by an acoustic wall. 5. Small PA system to play background music & announcements on rink. BONFIRES COULD CAUSE FATAL ASTHMA ATTACKS, WARNS CHARITY

Bonfires and fireworks could cause potentially fatal asthma attacks, a leading asthma charity has warned, issuing advice ahead of Bonfire Night on 5 November.

The smoke fumes from burning wood and firework displays can linger in the air creating localised pollution, which could cause asthma attacks for the 5.4million people in the UK with the condition, says Asthma UK. Two thirds of people with asthma say poor air quality makes their symptoms worse. The charity advises that the smoke from bonfires coupled with cold and wet weather, which can also trigger asthma symptoms, could be a 'deadly' combination. The warning comes after weather forecasts predict that temperatures could drop as low as -5 at the weekend.

Asthma UK, who provide a nurse-staffed helpline for people with asthma, advice on its website and funds over 30 research projects, says three people die from asthma attacks every day.

Having an asthma attack can be incredibly frightening, and one occurs every 10 seconds in the UK. An attack happens when the airways start to tighten, which can leave people coughing, wheezing and gasping for breath. Some people with asthma describe having an asthma attack as feeling like someone is holding a pillow over their face.

Asthma UK has advice for people with asthma on how to cope with bonfire night, saying it is vital people have their reliever inhaler (usually blue) with them at all times.

Jessika, 25, a HR administrator from Manchester who was diagnosed with asthma when she was a child, was forced to call an ambulance when Bonfire Night sparked an asthma attack. She said:

"A few years ago, I had a terrifying asthma attack on bonfire night. I was at a family gathering and my gasps of amazement at the fireworks display soon turned into gasps for breath.

"The smoke from the fireworks made me wheeze so badly that my husband had to call an ambulance. I didn't have my reliever inhaler with me.

"Thankfully, I managed to get my breathing under control by the time the ambulance arrived, but I know that I'm lucky my asthma attack didn't escalate. I'm well aware that asthma attacks can be fatal.

"Now, I always carry my reliever inhaler with me on bonfire night and I want to urge people with asthma like me do the same – it could save your life."

Asthma UK's in-house GP, Dr Andy Whittamore, says:

"Lots of people love the excitement of bonfire night, but for some people with asthma it could be deadly.

"We don't want people with asthma to miss out but we want them to be safe and aware of the increased risk this Bonfire Night when pollution will be higher than normal.

"We are urging people with asthma, or parents of children with asthma, to make sure they have their reliever inhaler with them, and want people's friends and family to know what to do if their asthma symptoms suddenly get worse."

Asthma UK has issued top tips for people with asthma on Bonfire Night:

- Take your preventer medicines as prescribed
- Carry your reliever inhaler (usually blue) with you at all times
- If you find that smoke is making you cough, stand well back and admire the fireworks from a distance
- Make sure your friends and family know what to do and when to get help if your asthma symptoms suddenly get worse
- If it's cold, wrap a scarf over your nose and mouth; this will help to warm up the air before you breathe it in.

Government must reverse damaging school cuts

Ahead of the Autumn statement Twickenham MP Vince Cable has written to the Chancellor urging him to rethink school cuts. It is the latest part of the MP's continuing campaign to defend local schools. Since the General Election Vince Cable has secured a parliamentary debate on funding of London schools and only last week spoke at a mass rally at Westminster.

It has emerged that under the Government's plans all state schools in Twickenham are facing a real term cut to their funding according to the NAHT (National Association of Head Teachers)

Vince Cable said:

“The government's decision to plough ahead with these heavy cuts to school budgets show that they are continuing to ignore the needs of children and teachers up and down the country.

“These cutbacks will have a devastating effect on local schools, leading to teacher redundancies and bigger class sizes. I urge the Government to think again and reverse these cuts which will hold back the life chances of too many children Twickenham.”

Made Smarter Review sets out UK vision for industrial digitalization

Teddington's National Physical Laboratory this week welcomed the publication of the government's **Made Smarter Review**, which explores how UK manufacturing can maximise benefits from increasing adoption of digital technology through a strong industry and government partnership.

The industry-led Review, launched as part of the Industrial Strategy and chaired by Siemens UK CEO Juergen Maier, sets out a vision for growth and increased productivity across the manufacturing sector by unlocking the potential of Industrial Digital Technologies (IDTs). It puts forward a set of recommendations that it firmly believes, if delivered as a combined package of measures, will achieve the UK's ambition of becoming a world leader in the Fourth Industrial Revolution by 2030.

Benefits to the UK economy over the next decade could be as high as £455 billion for UK manufacturing, increasing manufacturing growth between 1.5% to 3% per annum, creating an estimated net gain of 175,000 jobs throughout the economy and reducing CO2 emissions by 4.5%. Overall, industrial productivity could be improved by greater than 25%.

The Review focuses on three priority areas informed by understanding of the three main challenges business face:

- more ambitious, informed and focused leadership
- more widespread adoption of industrial digital technologies across supply chains, especially within SMEs
- faster innovation and the creation of new IDTs, new IDTs companies/value-streams and new capabilities to sustain UK competitive advantage

Aligned with the aims of the Review, NPL's Digitally Enabled Supply Chain (DESC) programme will provide the catalyst to enable data confidence throughout supply chains and establish a world-leading position for the UK. The DESC programme has been designed to address data challenges through a focus on data collection, data validation, data uncertainty and trust of data as it passes through process and systems, and between organisations.

As the UK's National Measurement Institute, NPL will enable data-confident approaches to technology insertion across manufacturing applications and sectors. It will accelerate the capability of the UK supply chain base, particularly SMEs, through regionally-based access to NPL and delivery partners that provide digitally-relevant skills support.

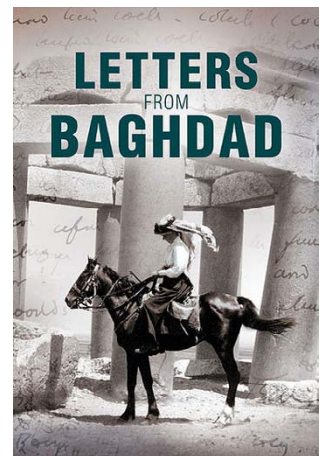

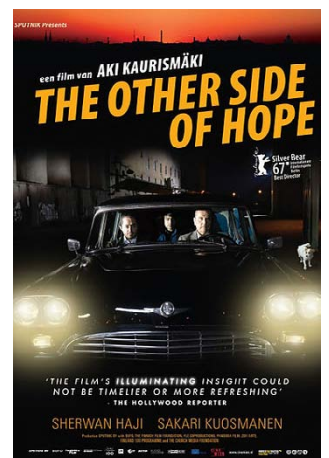

St Mary's University Update

St Mary's Pro-Vice Chancellor Rt Hon Ruth Kelly hails pioneering educational programme to improve life chances of children in care

Last night former Education Secretary and St Mary's University Pro Vice-Chancellor, Rt Hon Ruth Kelly, unveiled a pioneering educational programme recently launched at St Mary's University, Twickenham, as a means of tackling what has come to be seen as "the virtually intractable problem" of improving outcomes for children in care.

In the Sir John Cass's Foundation annual lecture, Ruth Kelly told leaders in the field of education and social care that the First Star Academy programme could provide a new approach to addressing the personal and academic development of the 72,000 looked-after children across the country.

St Mary's is the first UK university to take up First Star and adapt the four-year scheme initiated in the USA by film producer, Peter Samuelson, to meet the academic and emotional needs of children in care.

The Academy will see 30 young people (aged 14-18) currently living in foster care or children's homes in London boroughs – including Richmond, Hounslow, Ealing, Southwark, Kingston and Wandsworth – spend four residential summers and monthly sessions during term-time on St Mary's University campus to receive academic tutoring, life skills training, emotional support and experience of campus life, with the joint objectives of helping them to sustain their academic progress and succeed in their exams, and also raising their aspirations to access college or university.



The Academy also offers a programme of support for foster parents aimed at reducing the chances of foster placement breakdown. In the USA, the First Star programme has achieved impressive results, 99 per cent of First Star Academy pupils who have completed four years of the programme have graduated from high school, and 91 per cent have enrolled in higher education.

If the programme at St Mary's is able to achieve results that stand comparison with the success achieved by First Star in America, the University hopes the First Star model will be taken up by universities across the country, supported by local authorities and the Government, to transform the educational and employment outcomes for more young people.

Ruth Kelly said, "I believe that this educational project being funded by Sir John Cass's Foundation and others, with the participation of a number of local authorities in London, could provide a new model for tackling what has sometimes been seen as the virtually intractable problem of how we help to improve the outcomes of children in care and on the edge of care.

"The life chances of youngsters who have been brought up in care are significantly worse than for young people as a whole. We know that educational attainment is closely linked to life outcomes. If we can find a way to provide children in this group with a little more stability and a little more ambition, then we can open new doors for their future that otherwise remain locked."

The first cohort of St Mary's academy participants joined the programme in May and while it is too early to judge its success, according to First Star Director at St Mary's, Nick Turk, the initial response has been extremely positive.

He added, "It is shocking that only 6 per cent of young people in care in the UK go on to study at university, compared to 45 per cent of their age group peers. This certainly isn't due to any lack of potential on the part of young people in the care system. Our approach is to develop that potential through core academics, life skills and immersion in university life.

"By the time the current participants are of university application age they will have been in the programme for four years and will have developed a profound sense of comfort and belonging in a Higher Education environment. No one will be able to tell them that they don't belong in university just because they were in care."

Northern Broadsides

at The Rose Theatre, Kingston until 4th November, then on tour until 2nd December

Let's sit down, have a nice chatter-watter, and natter about For Love or Money. Now here's a nice tale if you like, a fun-filled farce about folks' foibles.

Northern Broadsides' tongue in cheek play is about a concatenation of conmen, with more fiddles than the Yorkshire Symphony Orchestra. The company often works with journalist and author Blake Morrison to adapt plays from the past, ranging from Aristophanes to Kleist, into the Yorkshire vernacular. This time round the source is Turcaret by Alain René Lesage, which was first performed at the Comédie Française in 1709. How does the play cope with its 220 year transplant from Paris to a Yorkshire mill town in the late 1920s? Surprisingly well, for human vices like lust and greed, which are the peccadilloes that form the driving force of For Love or Money, are real hardy perennials.

The Great War took the colonel who lived in the grand mansion on the outskirts of the Yorkshire town. Ten years since, he never returned from the front, and his young and attractive widow Rose is finding it hard to cope financially. The furniture has been sold, as have the oil paintings, witness the shadows of the frames on the William Morris wallpaper.



Rose is wooed by two suitors, the well-heeled banker Algy Fuller, and the louche gigolo Arthur. However, Arthur is a con-man and is fleecing Rose, but Rose is taking Algy for all she can, while Algy is embezzling from his bank, and a great merry-go-round of greed tootles its merry way around the story.

The guileful but gorgeous Rose is played by the Sarah-Jane Potts who skilfully balances the demure innocent-abroad against the shrewd schemer in Rose's psyche, coy one moment pert the next. She is the flapper par excellence, fringed hair, satin dress the colour of, well, a peach. For Rose is the focus of the action, the honeypot cum money-pot to which the men are drawn, some for the honey, some for the money. Arthur is after both; the money to feed his gambling addiction, the honey to feed his voracious sexual appetite. Neither his promiscuity nor his ego know any bounds. Jos Vantylers has the part of Arthur to a tee, oozing debauchery from his coiffured hair to his co-respondent's shoes; even his movements are dissolute. Now, Algy has plenty of money of his own, or is it his own? For Algy runs so much of a double life that it probably counts as a triple life. Suited and booted, smiling and moustache twirling, Algy bursts onto the scene adamant to achieve his goal of seducing Rose. His armoury includes gifts of jewellery (fraudulently acquired), verses proclaiming his love (witless doggerel) and promises to build a magnificent new house for her with orangery and haha (castles in Spain). Barrie Rutter portrays Algy as an effusive convivial man, opulent and expansive, comfortably rotund and very self-satisfied. He has lost his wife to the 'flu epidemic, or was it the flew epidemic? Algy is wary in matters of business, particularly dodgy-business, but totally blind in his enthrallment by the alluring Rose.

Venture Wolf

at Leicester Square Theatre until 7th November

It is great to see young, emerging companies produce new work. And it is always exciting to be introduced to new productions because one can go in completely blind. Anything can happen. But, as with all new thing, it can be a hit or miss. Venture Wolf's production *Lipstick and Scones*, performed at the Leicester Square Theatre, is unfortunately mostly a miss. To be painfully honest, I am not sure what to choose to grapple with here.



Lipstick and Scones is the story of three very different sisters meeting up at the eldest sister's house for a weekend to celebrate her recent engagement ... her fourth one in a year. What follows is what I can only call a weekend from hell. The sisters and their respective partners tear at each other, hurling insults, family trauma and bad life choices at each other seemingly for sport. It is a weekend spent mostly tearing everything and everyone around them apart with pure, malefic cruelty.

None of the characters seems to have been given any other qualities. It is all about the acid they can spit at each other within these tropes which makes it very hard to like or at the very least empathise with them. When towards the end, when we get a semblance of a reason for this awful behaviour, it is too late. What human charm and dimension there is to be found I suspect comes mostly from the actors themselves, the most successful being Jessie Waterfield as Ellie. She has a natural and quirky warmth about her I found reminiscent of a young Olivia Coleman.

The one redeeming quality in all of this is that at times *Lipstick and Scones* are quite funny. There are some great zingers and quips that land quite well with the audience. I suspect that is the characters in this piece been given more layers and the direction (also by Paul Vitty) been clearer, even more of the humour could shine through the mess that is this play. Family dynamics are difficult to capture, but that is also what makes it so fascinating and timeless. However, a fifty-minute one-act just isn't enough time to fully play with the premise presented nor to do the characters justice. This is presumptuous of me, but I would suggest either cutting down, simplify and streamline what you have or take the leap and expand it into a full-length play. No more plot is needed, but with that added runtime, the characters can be fleshed out and given time to breathe. That way the audience could get the chance to get to know them all, and hey, perhaps even like them.

Uneasy sleeps the head that wears the crown

Rodelinda

by George Frideric Handel, libretto by Nicola Francesco Haym
English National Opera at The London Coliseum until 15th November

I always find it quite amusing how the English have adopted the German Georg Frideric Handel as one of their own, a great British composer. But one could possibly describe him as a truly European artist, masterfully incorporating Italian, German and French style and influences, while authoritatively shaping English Baroque music. Richard Jones' hugely entertaining and innovative production of Rodelinda at ENO strikes me as equally European, something you would maybe expect Barrie Kosky to do in Germany: a bold, quirky reimagining, moving the plot into a 1940s Mafiosi milieu with a distinct cinematic aesthetic, half Italian film noir half Graphic Novel, topped with a blood-heavy Tarantino-esque finale.



The story, in typical Baroque Opera style, is a confusing muddle of love triangles and Machiavellian politics, where Queen Rodelinda loves Bertarido, whom she believes dead so agrees to marry the usurper Grimualdo but only to save her son Flavio, whose life is threatened by the evil Garibaldo, secretly plotting his own ascend to the throne by manipulating the lovesick Eduige, sister of Bertarido ... more tangled relationships than a season of Game of Thrones. Baroque audiences didn't really care for coherent plot, they came for masterful virtuosity showcasing spectacular voices and musical skill – Handel's particular field

of expertise, stringing together one da capo aria after the next. It is therefore surprising, imaginative and an extraordinary achievement, how Richard Jones puts all the focus and energy of his staging into storytelling. Our character's motivations are so central to this production, they each and all have them tattooed somewhere on their body.



Rebecca Evans as Queen Rodelinda is a fierce and fearless Italian Mama, dominating every scene and singlehandedly driving the action, manipulating the men to her needs, sometimes sensuous and flirty, sometimes furious and raging. Juan Sancho, in his ENO debut, gives a sleazy skinny rock star attitude to Grimualdo, all sharp suits and coiffed hair. The male lead Bertarido is a surprisingly passive character, always outside the action watching his wife's struggles from exile. It is down to the unique stage presence and crystal clear voice of counter tenor Tim Mead, that Bertarido's few scenes are some of the most memorable and magical. I loved him crashing in a trashy neon lit bar, singing his sorrows into a whiskey glass á la Frank Sinatra.

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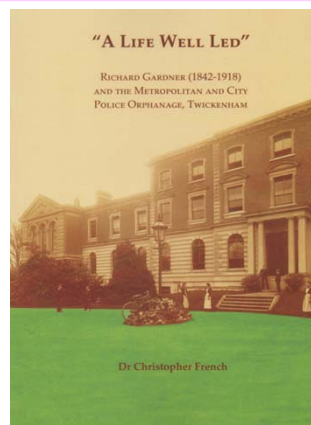
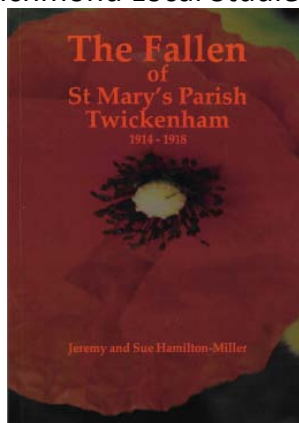
