World Health Organization Epidemiological update on COVID-19

<u>Global overview</u> Data as of 19 June 2022

Globally, the number of new weekly cases has continued to decline since the peak in January 2022. During the week of 13 until 19 June 2022, over 3.3 million cases were reported, a 4% decrease as compared to the previous week. The number of new weekly deaths declined by 16% as compared to the previous week, with over 7500 fatalities reported.

At the country level, the highest number of new weekly cases were reported from the United States of America (652,217 new cases; -12%), China (406,401 new cases; -19%), Germany (356,414 new cases; +10%), Brazil (256,034 new cases; -9%), and France (253,322 new cases; +33%).

The highest number of new weekly deaths were reported from the United States of America (1,858 new deaths; -13%), China (1,044 new deaths; -13%), Brazil (956 new deaths; -3%), the Russian Federation (443 new deaths; -11%), and Italy (338 new deaths; -24%).

The commercial stage coach had all but vanished by the 1850s. Yet there remained a nostalgia for what was seen as being a more romantic form of transport than the workaday railway. There were occasional enthusiasms for the thrills and spills of coach racing among the young men about town.

Richmond proved ideal locations for such races, as was lay about ten miles from London. Ten miles was about as far as a coach and four could travel at speed before the horses tired and had to be changed. Between 1839 and 1870 there were several races between Mayfair and the Castle Inn near Richmond Bridge. The Inn was not the ideal objective as there were complaints about the 'badness of the dinner surpassed by the execrable wine.' The craze petered soon petered out.

But every year between 1909 and 1914 there was a fiercely contested annual race along local roads. It was not really a race: more important were the drivers' skills and the condition of the horses at the finishing line.

With their specially trained teams of horses the races were dominated by two American millionaires Alfred Vanderbilt and William 'Judge' Moore, who between them won every event.

The first one took place in June 1909, when contestants were challenged to drive from the King's Arms at Hampton Court to Olympia via Bushey Park, through Twickenham, across Richmond Bridge, and

Barnes Common and Hammersmith Bridge in 75 minutes or less. There was to be a gold cup and £40 for the winner. Each coach had to carry at least four passengers, a race official, and a driver and guard. The winner in 37 minutes was Alfred Vanderbilt.

The following June the race was repeated, although there was a slightly smaller field. There were enthusiastic crowds along the route with the police clearing traffic to ensure that nothing stood in the way of the coaches. Mr Vanderbilt again won, taking 42 minutes to cover the eleven-mile route.

From 1911, the Richmond Royal Horse Show also organised an event between Hyde Park Corner to the Show's grounds in the Old Deer Park. Again there were large crowds along the route.

After the First World War Richmond's coaching marathons slowly faded away. The aristocracy no longer maintained their interest, in part because Alfred Vanderbilt had drowned when the *Lusitania* had been sunk by a German U-boat off Ireland, and Judge Moore passed away a few years later. The races were now dominated by Bertram Mills, the circus owner.

More importantly the roads were now busier than ever with motor traffic, which did not mix well with coaches and fours. The last such event took place in 1966, when there was a gentle canter from the Richmond Horse Show in Old Deer Park through Richmond Park.

This week, the London Fire Brigade warned about the dangers of e-bike batteries after one caused a serious tower block blaze in Shepherd's Bush. There have been dozens of similar incidents in recent months and over 70 fires caused by e-scooters and e-bikes in 2021. That's why they have been banned on public transport by TfL.

I have little doubt that some of those batteries and chargers are unsafe and I have absolutely NO doubt at all that most of their owners have absolutely no idea of the proper way to charge their batteries because even some professional users are careless and buy the cheapest rather than the best and leave them on charge unsupervised.

Heathrow planes creating noise sewer over Teddington

Is plane noise making it difficult to have a conversation outside or even inside with windows open in this hot weather or is your sleep disturbed at night by the increasing number of lower flying, loud planes. Teddington has always been overflown, especially if there are Eastern winds. With a third runway not soon materialising, Heathrow wants to create more flight paths to increase capacity by jamming more flights on the same routes at closer intervals. The impact of this proposed consolidation plan would create a "noise sewer" over Teddington.

With routes are so close together, there is insufficient space between routes for respite from the airplane noise. Additionally, airlines save money by flying lower and slower on take-off, which again impacts Teddington. Combining the impact of increased noise from lower flights for longer hours and pollution, we in Teddington should think hard about pressing for changes.

In 2017 the Tribune was invited to exhibit in Rome by Fondazione Mondo Digitale, under



Police in Richmond warn against ASB

Police in Richmond are warning parents to stay aware of where children are going and what they are doing after a spate of anti-social behaviour and serious crime in the borough last week.

Last Friday school-children gathered at Teddington Lock after an event arranged on social media.

While most of those who attended were not from Richmond, several offences including a sexual touching offence, a number of assaults and dangerous behaviour such as jumping from Teddington Lock bridge occurred.

Police received a number of calls about anti-social behaviour, and the disruptive and concerning activity of these children.

Jumping into the Thames is not safe. There a significant risk of cold water shock, which can cause your body to go into shock no matter how fit you are. It causes panic, anxiety, disorientation and loss of muscular control, which cause you to gasp for air and as a result, inhale water. London's waterways often have underwater refuse which can be a danger to swimmers.

Police have information to suggest another event is being arranged for this Thursday in the same area, at the end of GCSE exams.

Due to this, police are ready to enforce a section 35 Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing order, which when in power means it is an offence to:

A number of officers will be on duty across Richmond and Kingston to keep the peace.

Police are working closely with local schools, local council Park Guard and the public to ensure school children celebrate the end of exams safely, and are asking that parents exercise their parental and safeguarding responsibilities too.

Dedicated volunteers complete the build of their coach shed project!

Council gets tough on fly-tippers with CCTV at fly-tipping hotspots

Richmond Council is launching a 'Caught on Camera' campaign at recycling sites across the borough to deter and identify fly-tippers, following approval by the Environment, Sustainability, Culture and Sports Committee on Tuesday 21 June.

The Council provides a number of public recycling sites, with some sites attracting repeated incidences of fly-tipping. CCTV has been trialled at several sites and has had a deterrent effect in reducing incidents of fly-tipping and Fixed Penalty Notices being issued where fly-tippers have been identified.

This type of approach has proven successful in a number of other London boroughs, including Barking and Dagenham with their 'Wall of Shame' campaign. The Caught on Camera campaign will publish video and images of fly-tipping on the Council's website and ask residents to help identify the perpetrators.

The locations of the cameras will be based on previous fly-tipping reports, resident complaints and intelligence from Council officers and contractors. Signs will be placed in these areas notifying residents that CCTV cameras are operating in the area and all footage will be collected lawfully.

The campaign will be monitored to understand reduction in fly-tipping at the sites with CCTV, but also to see if there are any adverse impacts such as fly-tipping increasing elsewhere.

The first nine sites to be targeted are:

- Ham Parade (Ham and Petersham)
- Holly Road Car Park (Twickenham)
- Cedar Road (Teddington)
- Twickenham Green, First Cross Road (Twickenham)
- Queen Elizabeth Walk (Barnes)
- Richmond Road (near Sainsburys)
- Kneller Road (Whitton and Heathfield)
- Popes Avenue (Twickenham)
- Cambrian Centre, Queens Road (Richmond)



Cllr Julia Neden-Watts, Chair of the Environment, Sustainability, Culture and Sports Committee, said:

"Fly-tipping has a detrimental effect on the look and feel of our beautiful borough as well as taking up a significant amount of Council resources. This is a warning to fly-tippers; this Council does not tolerate fly-tipping.

"Our new campaign will help us to take action on fly-tippers and prosecute those that illegally dispose of their rubbish. Anyone caught fly-tipping will be fined."

Application submitted for Ham Close redevelopment plans

Working in partnership with Richmond Housing Partnership (RHP), housebuilder The Hill Group has submitted a planning application for the regeneration of Ham Close. The proposals, if approved, will deliver new affordable and private sale homes alongside new community facilities and high quality open space for the area.

Built in the 1960s, the site at Ham Close currently consists of several blocks of flats that have become outdated. Richmond Council has been working with RHP for several years to secure the regeneration of the estate. The planning application seeks to replace the 192 existing properties on Ham Close with 452 new homes for current RHP tenants and leaseholders and provide additional homes to meet a range of housing needs.

The new properties will include affordable homes for both rent and Shared Ownership. The application also includes plans for two new community buildings, which will primarily replace the existing youth centre with added flexible uses for community groups, and a significantly improved MakerLabs building.

Richmond Council has a Collaboration Agreement with RHP, the largest provider of affordable housing in the borough. The Agreement commits to a number of Development Principles, including a minimum number of affordable homes, provisions for new community facilities that will deliver services for children and young people, and a



commitment to meaningful engagement with residents.

Working with RHP, Hill undertook a number of engagement events with residents, stakeholders and the wider community on the redevelopment of Ham Close. These were a range of in-person and virtual events held from July 2021 to April 2022. <u>View the full consultation timeline</u>.

Cllr Jim Millard, Richmond Council's spokesperson for Housing, said:

"I am delighted that the planning application for Ham Close has now been submitted. The new affordable homes will be a welcome addition to the area and will be a significant part in helping us achieve our goal of delivering over 1,000 affordable homes in the borough over coming years that will cater for the needs of the community into the future. Please make sure to let us know your thoughts on the application by providing your comments on the scheme."

David Done OBE, Chief Executive of RHP, said:

"The planning application is a significant step in delivering high-quality housing to our existing tenants at Ham Close as well developing new affordable housing on the site to meet the future needs of the area. We look forward to continuing to work closely with the local community and the Council to deliver for our existing and new customers."

Andy Hill, Chief Executive at The Hill Group, said:

"Over the past year, we have been working closely with RHP to undertake significant community engagement with existing Ham Close residents and the wider community, both in person and virtually, to deliver the submitted planning application. With green space and sustainability at the heart of the project, we are confident that the plans will bring much improved homes and surroundings whilst creating greater social value for the community."

In due course the Council's Planning Committee and the Mayor of London will make a decision on the proposals.

Private Peaceful by Michael Morpurgo

Nottingham Playhouse and Jonathan Church Productions at Richmond Theatre, in recognition of **Armed Forces Day on 25th June**, then on tour until 9th July

"They are not long, the days of wine and roses" warned Ernest Dowson in his 1896 poem *Vitae Summa Brevis*, and for Charlie and Thomas Peaceful and the rest of their generation approaching adulthood in 1914, that line was particularly pertinent.





Michael Murpurgo's

Private Peaceful tells the story of the two Peaceful brothers and their inescapable fate. The action moves backwards and forwards with the narrative, as younger brother Thomas, 'Tommo', tells the story as he keeps watch through the night before a significant event in his older brother's life.

Tommo looks back on their Devon childhood, the loss of his father, and both brothers' love for their school friend Molly. The story of both brothers falling for one woman might be the whole tale, but it is WWI and its catastrophic consequences that form the main event here. The War itself is strikingly well

created, but it is a busy narrative for the stage.

Fired up by a visiting recruitment officer, Charlie and Tommo go to war, despite Tommo being underage. Tommo's blossoming relationship with a local woman is brought to a sudden, violent end and ultimately Charlie's selfless and heroic conduct brings him only misery.

As an ensemble piece, all actors deserve credit for their adaptability, particularly those playing several roles. Daniel Boyd as Charlie, however, avoids sentimentality and makes a dignified journey from boy to soldier, personifying the sacrifice of that generation; while Daniel Rainford

as the younger Tommo provides an endearing portrayal of a child thrust into manhood in the worst possible way. Liyah Summers' Molly is a light, positive presence as the dark descends, one of the many women left behind to bring their children up and provide the next generation.

Cyrano de Bergerac by Edmond Rostand, adapted by Glyn Maxwell

by Edmond Rostand, adapted by Glyn Maxwell Putney Theatre Company at Putney Arts Theatre until 25th June

It's always with something of a jolt that we are reminded that *Cyrano de Bergerac* is only a little more than a century old. Yet <u>Edmond Rostand's 1897 play</u>'s historical setting, verse form, and the impression it's made on popular culture, combine to give it a timeless feel.

This new production is performed using traverse



staging between two wooden arches, a simple set that becomes a convent, a battlefield, a bakery, and even ... a theatre. Set changes comprise moving four benches around, and are fluid and assured. All the audience's attention is constantly focused on the actors.



A gaggle of excited nuns set the scene on the way to vespers, wondering where their daily storyteller has got to. Within minutes, the holy sisters are engaging in enthusiastic but decidedly secular swordplay, and then in selling oranges to each other as they evoke the Parisian theatre where the story begins.


The play is witty and fast-paced. David Erdos leads a strong ensemble cast as Cyrano, boasting a powerful voice on a par with his mighty prosthetic nose. He holds the stage from the moment he disrupts the play in which the grotesque Montfleury is appearing. It's a true *tour de force* performance of an incredibly demanding role.

Cyrano is joined by the poetic Roxane, here played by Lizzie Iredale with childlike exuberance and huge energy. Her affection for her

cousin is palpable in their brief scenes together. She also conveys her love for Christian de Neuvillette, a challenging role in which Rajeev Soni turns in a fantastic performance. Smitten with Roxane, Christian is a pragmatic soldier and his speech no match for Roxane's poetic soul.

Cyrano de Bergerac is a highly-polished and atmospheric production of a much-loved, but also technically challenging play. Expect a wonderful evening of entertainment.

Beemaster

by Chris Harris and Chris Denys Blue Fire Theatre Company at the Exchange Theatre, Twickenham then on tour until 31st August.

A comedic tale focusing on the plight of the humble bee, *Beemaster* provides audiences with an entertaining and educational glimpse at the life of our winged friends, exploring the symbiotic relationship between keeper and bee and, in doing so, posing some thought provoking questions regarding our own existence and the meaning of life.

It is a monologue by Brother Barnabus, the appointed Bee Master for an otherwise silent order of monks living in the idyllic surroundings of Clumpton Abbey. This setting, represented



by two stage-flats, designed and painted beautifully by Junis Olmscheid, is simple yet highly effective.

Beemaster is divided into two distinct parts: the first delivered by Brother Barnabus as himself and the second following his sudden demise on stage and surprise reincarnation as a bee (complete with full 'bee' costume) and delivered from within one of the Abbey's hives (the flats are turned during the interval to reveal this change of scene). The audience, therefore, get to explore the relationship of keeper and bee, through the eyes of both parties. This clever concept is well delivered by Steve Taylor and his acting strengths allow him to make the transformation from elderly monk to the more sprightly new-born bee, with great effect. The monologue contains some highly entertaining moments, such as the bee's song and dance

routine, whilst also providing some interesting and thought-provoking bee-related facts through stories and anecdotes.

Beemaster was presented at Twickenham's Exchange Theatre as a rehearsed reading, prior to a staged tour that culminates at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. It clearly has great potential and there is little doubt that this will soon become a popular addition to Blue Fire's successful repertoire.

WIZ Tales: Chile - The Richmond Connection

The Republic of Chile is in South America, Santiago is the capital and the largest city; Chile's territory includes Easter Island.

Chile has a long coastline with the South Pacific Ocean with low coastal mountains and a central valley; the Andes mountains form a border between Chile and Argentina. Chile's Atacama Desert, in the north of the country, is one of the world's driest regions.

In 1817 the Spanish, who occupied the country, were defeated by the revolutionary forces of Bernardo O'Higgins and Jose de San Martin, the liberator of Argentina.

Bernardo O'Higgins studied for a while in Richmond upon Thames. He lived at 2 The Vineyard and a blue plaque commemorating his stay was erected by the Historic Buildings and Monuments Commission in 1994; there is a monument to O'Higgins on Richmond Riverside in Bridge House Gardens.

Conservation Areas are areas of special architectural and historic interest, the character and appearance of which is worthy of preserving or enhancing. This character is derived from the area as a whole rather than the quality of specific buildings or features.

The new appraisal and Management Plan, upon adoption, will provide guidance to planning applicants, developers and architects if building works are proposed that require planning permission and will provide a sound basis for decisions made by the Council on planning applications and other proposals.

The following conservation areas have been reviewed and updated draft Conservation Area Appraisals

and Management Plans have been produced for: <u>Hampton Hill High Street</u> <u>Teddington Lock</u> <u>High Street Teddington</u>

In addition to the draft Appraisals, three new buildings and structures are proposed to be added to the local list of Buildings of Townscape Merit (BTM), all of which are in the High Street Hampton Hill Conservation Area.



A locally listed building (also known as a Building of Townscape Merit) is a building or structure which is not statutorily listed but is recognised for its significance to the history and character of the local environment.

A Mass for the repose of Anthony's soul will be held in the University Chapel at 1:05 PM on Tuesday, 28th June and a Memorial Mass will be arranged for early next term, after consultation with Anthony's family. Details will be shared as soon as they are available. **Anthony McClaran, Vice-Chancellor St Mary's University, Twickenham, wrote to the St Mary's community this morning (June 24th, 2022):**



Following the sudden onset of Anthony's illness, the St Mary's community has come together every week to pray for his recovery and for his wife Karen and daughter Bethany, led by the Chaplaincy and close friends of the University, the Sisters of the Assumption. We know that this meant a lot to Anthony and his family during his final days, and I would like to thank colleagues for taking the time to take join these hours of prayer.

Anthony has been a leader in Theological and Catholic Pedagogical research throughout his career and has been a much-loved and well-respected member of the St Mary's community for many years. The University recently recognised Anthony's contributions to our community by presenting him with a St Mary's Medal, the highest honour the University can bestow.

Prof Anna Lise Gordon, Director Institute of Education at St Mary's University commented:

Mary's are deeply saddened by news of Anthony's death. Anthony was such a wonderful colleague, living out St Mary's values in all aspects of his work in Catholic education and research. Anthony was an inspiration to so many colleagues and students - wise, considerate, thoughtful, inclusive, encouraging and a wordsmith par excellence. We will miss him hugely.

Dr Jacob Philips, Director Institute of Theology and Liberal Arts at St Mary's University added:

Anthony was a colleague we will never forget. He was fiercely passionate, always loyal to the Catholic faith, had a big heart and even bigger laugh. He has left an indelible imprint on the way we do Theology at

St Mary's, and on the hearts and minds of the countless students he taught here over the years.

Following the completion of his PhD at the Gregorian University in Rome on the Eucharistic Thought of Thomas Aquinas, Anthony served as Academic Tutor at the Venerable English College, and the Head of RE at Loreto College, Manchester, before joining St Mary's as Head of Theology, Philosophy and History.

More recently Anthony was the Director of the Centre for Catholic Education, Research and Religious Literacy, making a number of important contributions to academic

and public life. Anthony was directly involved with the 2016 Department for Education A-Level and GCSE reforms and developed a new curriculum for AQA. Anthony also served as a member of the RE Commission convened by the Religious Education Council 2018, was an Ofqual subject expert and regularly participated in the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Religious Education.

Anthony also played a large role in ecclesiastical life. He consulted for the Bishops' Conference on Inter-Faith & Humanist Dialogue and was part of an academic group advising on the new Religious Education Curriculum Directory.

He regularly hosted theological conferences at St

Mary's, spoke at events and retreats, and was editor of the *Pastoral Review* journal.

Red Roses to host USA and Wales in September Internationals

England Women will play two September Internationals against USA (Sandy Park, Exeter - Saturday 3 September, KO 3pm) and Wales (Ashton Gate, Bristol - Wednesday 14 September, KO 7.30pm).

Tickets are on sale for both matches now here.

Simon Middleton's outfit return to Sandy Park for a fourth time to take on a USA side which boasts a number of players plying their trade at Allianz Premier 15s runners-up Exeter Chiefs in their ranks including forwards Hope Rogers, Rachel Johnson and Kate Zackary as well as backs Jennine Detiveaux, Gabby Cantora and Megan Foster.

The midweek fixture against Wales will be the Red Roses' first-ever visit to Ashton Gate. A crowd of 14, 689 watched England take on Ioan Cunningham's outfit in the 2022 TikTok Women's Six Nations at Kingsholm and another large crowd is targeted at a fellow West Country venue close to the Anglo-Welsh border.

Both matches will act as crucial preparation for the team's Rugby World Cup 2021 campaign which begins on 8 October. Team and venue-specific ticket packs for the tournament are available <u>here</u>, with general admission tickets going on sale from 30 June.

Head coach Middleton said: "We're delighted to be able to confirm our two September Internationals.

"Sandy Park has got a special place in our hearts. The club and the crowd have really embraced us and every time we've been there they've put on a sensational show.

"Susie Appleby, her staff and players have been exceptional in the Allianz Premier 15s and had a brilliant season too. It's an honour to go back there and there's no better place to sign off ahead of travelling to New Zealand.

"Equally, Bristol's set-up is second to none. It's another rugby union hotbed with fantastic tradition, staunch support and it's great to take a game there and go to another venue we know is massively passionate about our sport.

"Bristol have demonstrated their commitment to the women's game. We as a coaching group had the good fortune of going into their training facility earlier in year and the integration of the men's and women's programmes stood out. Their women's team also had a very strong season in the league, reaching the play-off semi-finals and deserve great credit.

"These matches are important for all three teams' preparation before heading out to New Zealand and will be exciting contests. We know the people of Devon and the West Country will come out in their numbers and hopefully we can put on a show."

Exeter Rugby Club chairman and chief executive Tony Rowe OBE said: "As a club we're delighted to be welcoming the Red Roses back to Devon once again. The rise of the women's game in England is there for all to see and here in Exeter we're helping play our part in that growth.

"Not only have we welcomed record-breaking Red Roses crowds to Sandy Park in the past, but our own women's team are growing year on year and there is a real hunger and passion for the women's game here in the region.

"Sandy Park has proven over the years that it's a venue fit for hosting international fixtures, so we're fully expecting another capacity crowd and the people of the area to come out in force and support England Women."

Ashton Gate Managing Director Mark Kelly said: "With record-breaking crowds in this year's Six Nations and more than 4,000 fans attending the Bears Premier 15s game against Harlequins in May, it's a fantastic time to be welcoming international women's rugby to Ashton Gate.

"There's a huge appetite for the women's game in the city and there's likely to be Bears involvement in both sides as they prepare for New Zealand. It's an exciting occasion for Ashton Gate and we look forward to hosting a big crowd."



COVID-19 Cost Tracker

The National Audit Office (NAO) has released the latest update to its COVID-19 cost tracker which summarises the government's estimated cost of its response to the COVID-19 pandemic so far. The NAO expects this to be the final full update.

The cost tracker is an <u>interactive data tool</u> that details measures taken by government in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Where available, it provides estimated lifetime costs for each measure, and details how much has been spent. It is produced to aid transparency and assist Parliament and the public in scrutinising government spending on the pandemic response.

In June 2022, the estimated total cost of government's COVID-19 response is £376 billion, an overall net increase of £6 billion since the NAO last reported on the data in September 2021.

Since September 2021 the largest increases in cost include:

- a £4.0 billion increase in support for rail emergency measures as the Department for Transport has extended this support for train operators into 2022-23
- a £3.2 billion increase in the cost estimate for funding to the devolved administrations as a result of further adjustments through the Barnett formula
- an increase of just over £3 billion across three large health measures (vaccine rollout, NHS Test and Trace and Enhanced discharge support)

Since September 2021 the largest reductions in cost include:

- £4.7 billion, due to a decrease in estimated loan write offs across BEIS' different business loan support schemes
- £2.8 billion decrease in the grant payments for the Self-Employment Income Support Scheme

Of the estimated £376 billion total cost, £321 billion has been reported spent. This compares with £261 billion that was reported as spent in September 2021.

Government has guaranteed loans worth £132 billion during the pandemic, £16 billion of which the government estimates may have to be written off. This is a reduction of £4.7 billion from government's previous estimate, however, the current estimate is largely based on data at the end of December 2021 when economic indicators were generally more positive than they are currently. The £16 billion write-off costs are included in the £376 billion total forecast cost.

The overall estimated costs of Government's response to COVID-19 have been divided into four main categories by the NAO:

- 'Support for businesses' has the highest total forecast cost of £147 billion; a net decrease of £7 billion from the September 2021 estimate. This includes measures such as the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme (furlough scheme) and the Bounce Back Loan Scheme.
- Support for health and social care' is estimated to cost almost £89 billion; £5 billion more than government estimated it would cost in the September 2021 publication of the cost tracker.
- 'Support for individuals' is forecast to cost a total of £60 billion, the same amount as the government's
 estimated cost for measures in this category last September. This category includes measures such as the Self
 Employment Income Support Scheme.
- 'Support for other public services and emergency responses' is forecast to cost £75 billion; £8 billion more than last September's estimate.

Severe acute hepatitis of unknown aetiology in children - Multi-country

Outbreak at a glance

As of 22 June 2022, 33 countries in five WHO Regions have reported 920 probable cases of severe acute hepatitis of unknown aetiology in children which fulfill the WHO case definition. Since the previous Disease Outbreak News published on 27 May 2022, 270 new probable




cases have been reported to WHO, including from four new countries. This Disease Outbreak News includes updates on the epidemiology of the outbreak, the publication of the new interim guidance on laboratory testing, and the launch of the clinical case report form on the WHO Global Clinical Platform. The detection of severe acute hepatitis of unknown aetiology in children across five WHO Regions is unusual, and the severe clinical sequelae of some cases warrant detailed investigation.

Description of the outbreak

This outbreak was initially detected on 5 April 2022 when the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (the United Kingdom) notified WHO of ten cases of severe acute hepatitis of unknown aetiology in previously healthy young children aged under 10 years in the central belt of Scotland.

As of 22 June 2022, 33 countries in five WHO Regions have reported 920 probable cases (Figure 1). These include new and retrospectively identified cases since 1 October 2021, which fit the WHO case definition as stated below. There are four additional countries that have reported cases which are pending classification and are not included in the cumulative probable case count. Of the probable cases, 45 (5%) children have required transplants, and 18 (2%) deaths have been reported to WHO.

Half of the probable reported cases have been reported from the WHO European Region (20 countries reporting 460 cases), including 267 cases (29% of global cases) from the United Kingdom (Table 1, Figure 2). The second highest number of probable cases have been reported from the Region of the Americas (n=383, including 305 cases from the United States of America), followed by the Western Pacific Region (n=61), the South-East Asia Region (n=14) and Eastern Mediterranean Region (n=2). Seventeen countries are reporting more than five probable cases. The actual number of cases may be underestimated, in part due to the limited enhanced surveillance schemes in place. The case count is expected to change as more information and verified data become available.

WHO Director-General's opening remarks at International Health Regulations (2005) Emergency Committee regarding the multi-country monkeypox outbreak – 23 June 2022

Dear members and advisors of the Emergency Committee, dear colleagues and friends,

Thank you for agreeing to be part of this committee to assess whether the multi-country monkeypox outbreak constitutes a public health emergency of international concern.

As you know, monkeypox has been circulating and killing in Africa for decades, with sporadic cases outside the continent linked to travel from Nigeria that have never before become epidemics.

Just over six weeks ago, WHO was notified of a family cluster of three cases of monkeypox without any recent travel outside of the United Kingdom.

Since then, more than 3200 confirmed cases of monkeypox, and one death, have been reported to WHO, from 48 countries including Nigeria, and in five WHO regions.

The outbreak in newly affected countries continues to be primarily among men who have sex with men, and who have reported recent sex with new or multiple partners.

Person-to-person transmission is ongoing and is likely underestimated. In Nigeria, the proportion of women affected is much higher than elsewhere, and it is critical to better understand how the disease is spreading there.

In addition, so far this year, almost 1,500 suspected cases of monkeypox and around 70 deaths have been reported in Central Africa, primarily in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, but also in the Central African Republic and Cameroon.

Few of these cases are confirmed, and little is known about their circumstances. While the epidemiology and viral clade in these cases may be different, it is a situation that cannot be ignored.

I want to emphasize several things: WHO asks all Member States to share information with us.

In other outbreaks, we have sometimes seen the consequences of countries not being transparent, of not sharing information.

We need case finding, contact tracing, laboratory investigation, genome sequencing, and implementation of infection prevention and control measures;

We need information about the different clades of monkeypox virus;

We need clear case definitions to help identify and report infections;

And we need all countries to remain vigilant and strengthen their capacities to prevent onward transmission of monkeypox. It is likely that many countries will have missed opportunities to identify cases, including cases in the community without any recent travel.

WHO's goal is to support countries to contain transmission and stop the outbreak with triedand-tested public health tools including surveillance, contact-tracing and isolation of infected patients.

At the moment, while men who have sex with men have been most affected in these new outbreaks, there are also risks of severe disease for immunocompromised persons, pregnant women and children if they are infected.

There are also some risks to health workers if they are not wearing appropriate personal protective equipment.

So although most cases so far in newly affected countries have been identified in men who have sex with men, WHO has been calling for intensified surveillance in the broader community.

We have learned a great deal from recent outbreaks, including COVID-19 and the global HIV epidemic.

One of the most important lessons is that one of the most effective ways of responding to outbreaks in affected communities is to work closely with those communities to co-create effective risk communications. That is what WHO is doing.

We need to work with partners, including with affected communities, to address stigma, discrimination and misinformation swiftly and decisively.

We also need to work together as an international community to generate the necessary clinical efficacy and safety data on vaccines and therapeutics against monkeypox, and to ensure their equitable distribution.

We rely on your expertise for advice on public health measures, raising awareness, diagnostics, vaccination, treatment, and other matters.

My colleagues will provide technical updates on the current epidemiological situation, future scenarios, vaccination, international travel, and other matters.

My thanks once again to all of you for sharing your expertise, and for your dedication and commitment.



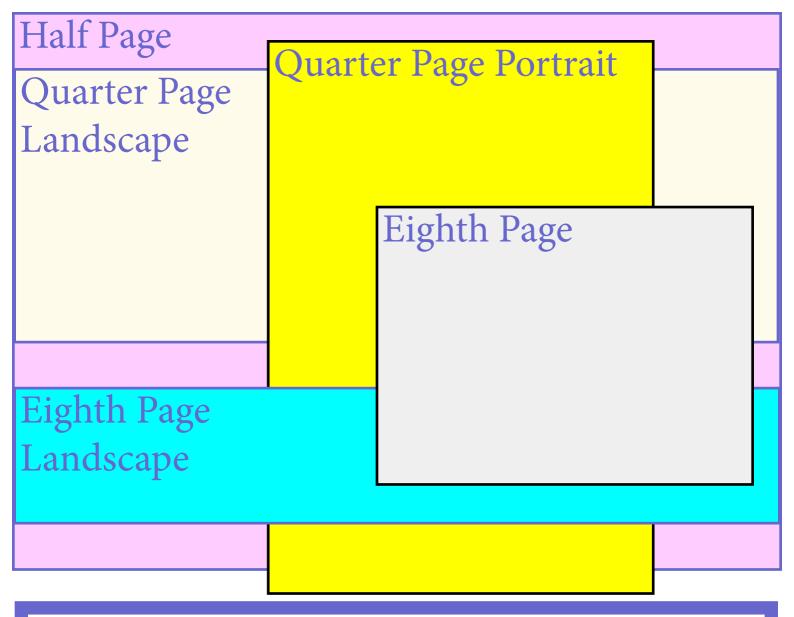
