World Health Organization Weekly epidemiological update on COVID-19 - 17 August 2023 Data as of 13 August 2023

In the last 28-day period (17 July to 13 August 2023), over 1.4 million new COVID-19 cases and over 2,300 deaths were reported from WHO's six regions, an increase of 63% and a decrease of 56%, respectively, compared to the previous 28 days.

As countries discontinue COVID-19-specific reporting and integrate respiratory disease surveillance, WHO will continue to use all available sources to continue monitoring the COVID-19 epidemiological situation. COVID-19 continues to be a major threat and WHO urges Member States to maintain, not dismantle, their established COVID-19 infrastructure.

Currently, reported cases do not accurately represent infection rates due to the reduction in testing and reporting globally.

At the country level, the highest numbers of new cases reported within the 28-day period were from the Republic of Korea (1,209,194), Australia (30,402), Singapore (18,806), Italy (18,419) and the United Kingdom (16,938). The highest numbers of new 28-day deaths were reported from the Republic of Korea (340), Australia (201), the Russian Federation (182), the Philippines (162) and Italy (159).

The European Region reported over 80,000 new cases, a 18% decrease as compared to the previous 28-day period. The highest numbers of new cases were reported from Italy (18,419), the United Kingdom (16,938) and the Russian Federation (12,488). The highest numbers of new deaths were reported from the Russian Federation (182), Italy (159) and Portugal (112).

The Local Picture Postcard Column Part 210

Palm Beach - Taggs Island - Hampton Court

Taggs Island is a six-acre island formerly called Walnut Tree Island or Garrick's Upper Eyot, nestled between Bushy Park and Hurst Park half a mile from Hampton Court Palace. Although it is close to the Surrey bank near East Molesey, Surrey, it is connected to the slightly further Middlesex bank by a long single track road bridge and is within the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames. Its post town is Hampton (TW12).



From the 1850s the convenient nearby presence of Hampton Court station drew day-trippers to the island's shabby pub and skittle alley, the Angler's Retreat. Thomas Tagg set up both a home and a boat-building business here in 1868 and soon acquired the lease on the Angler's Retreat and rebuilt it as a hotel, where guests included the French Actress Sarah Bernhardt. Grand houseboats were moored around the island, one of which was rented in 1887 by Peter Pan author JM Barrie.

George Tagg took over his father's business but poor summers and unfavourable economic conditions forced him to sell up in 1903. Tagg remained manager of the island until 1912, when it was acquired by the impresario Fred Karno, who built an opulent hotel that he called the Karsino, and an equally luxurious houseboat for himself, the *Astoria*. Charlie Chaplin is said to have stayed on the boat. The musician David Gilmour bought the *Astoria* in 1986 and converted it into a floating studio. Pink Floyd's albums *A Momentary Lapse of Reason* and *The Division Bell* were recorded onboard.



Custom was initially brisk at the hotel but the outbreak of the First World War brought about a decline in trade from which it did not recover, despite relaunches as the Thames Riviera and later the Palm Beach.

Our postcards this week show the Palm Beach site between 1926 which was the year the Beach opened and 1930. These were probably Palm Beach's busiest and most profitable years.

New Princes Restaurant, a prestigious cabaret venue in Piccadilly had taken a three-year lease on the old Karsino casino on Tagg's island in the Thames near Hampton Court, and after refurbishment, re-opened as The Palm Beach on 8 May 1926.

The intention was to convert this island into a miniature version of Palm Beach, Florida by placing thousands of tons of sand, palm trees, sunshades, beach chairs and a fleet of

motor-boats, punts and canoes for river merrymakers.

In 1940 it closed again, and after a chequered history of attempts to revive or repurpose it that involved many financial collapses, the building was demolished in 1971 and never rebuilt.

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An update on the Stag Brewery planning application

At the end of July, Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities Michael Gove unexpectedly announced that all buildings over 18 metres in height will need a second means of escape.

Following this announcement, the applicants for the Stag Brewery redevelopment have decided to make revisions to the planning application to meet this requirement, prior to the application being referred to the GLA for the Stage 2 referral process.

The requirement effectively means an additional core within ten buildings on the east side of the site, which inevitably results in a considerable loss of residential floorspace.

To minimise the impact on the viability of the application and, ultimately, the delivery of affordable housing, some of the proposed office space will be now converted to residential. The Design Code will also be updated to ensure all buildings on the west side of the site, over 18 meters in height, have a second staircase. Once the revisions are drawn up, these will be submitted to us, as the local planning authority, for consideration.

In response to the nature of the changes, these revisions will be subject to further consultation and referral back to the Planning Committee at a later date.



Otterly delightful Soak up the sunny vibes at London Wetland Centre with a summer of art, inspiration and uplifting encounters with wildlife

Visitors to London Wetland Centre this summer can spy Tod and Honey, the resident Asian small-clawed otters,

as they cool down in the heat with delicious icy treats.

The fish-filled lollies are some of the furry duo's hotweather favourites, as they duck and dive playfully after the slippery snacks, fishing them out of water with their dextrous paws.

Nature-loving visitors can also enjoy **spotting the little** grebe who has been making a splash with wetlandgoers and WWT staff alike with his characterful antics.

The attention-grabbing little bird, kitted out in its summer plumage, can be seen spreading its wings and heating up its bottom in the sun before diving for tasty morsels. It's just one of the many magical and surprising moments visitors can expect as they take time to explore the 105 acre nature reserve and get closer to wildlife.



They can also **meet the Centre's three new arrivals, the Cape Barrens geese**. The sweet-natured sibling threesome are just five months old and have travelled from WWT's reserve in Martin Mere. Settling in well,



the rare, affable birds are a cuteness overload not to be missed.

Endemic to Australia, these birds have the unusual ability to drink saltwater, assisting in their offshore lifestyle. They also represent a huge success story for the species which was brought back from the brink of extinction, as a result of overhunting, thanks to conservation efforts.

Kids, aged 7+, have the extra special opportunity to join the reserve for **Bat Walks every Thursday** throughout August. The two hour experience, starting at 8pm, invites young nature-lovers on a nocturnal adventure to spot the iconic animals – in one of London's bat hotspots.

Taking place by moonlight, this after-dark experience is just £25 per child, with an accompanying adult going free, and even ends with marshmallows around the campfire.

Finally, those in search of a space to stretch the imagination, find inspiration, and try out illustration can take part in the Centre's Wednesday Arts Workshops throughout August.

The expert-led workshops are free and aimed at all ages and abilities. They include wildlife drawing with artist Laura Cuppage, 'Wild Wetland Beast' illustration with prize-winning illustrator Tom Sears, and clay modelling with sculptor Jane Muir.

Visitors can also take full advantage of WWT's partnership with world-famous illustrator, Quentin Blake, by picking up his illustrated guide and exploring the Drawn to Water summer trail.

Richmond Park opens new and redesigned catering kiosks

Two new catering kiosks and one redesigned kiosk have opened in Richmond Park, with another planned for later in the summer. Two Grab & Go kiosks have been installed at Ham and Kingston Gates. The kiosk at Pen Ponds has been recently replaced with a new, more sculptural structure, with Broomfield Hill Car Park kiosk being redeveloped in August.

The Royal Parks charity, which manages London's eight Royal Parks, is opening these kiosks to add to the visitor facilities in Richmond Park.

Previously two old toilet blocks, the facilities at Ham Gate and Kingston Gate have been transformed into new Grab & Go catering outlets, together with refurbished toilets. Colicci, the company delivering the catering has collaborated with London-based design studio, Article

Design on the interiors of these kiosks.

Pen Ponds and Broomfield Hill Car Park kiosks have been designed and built on the same principles as the recently installed centrally located kiosks which received multiple design nominations - with Ritz Corner kiosk winning a Restaurant & Bar Design Award in 2019. The overarching concept of these design is to be simple and functional whilst sympathetic to the park environment. These free-standing kiosks have been designed by Mizzi Studio, an award-winning architecture and design practice with studios in London and Malta.



Ensuring the sustainability of these two newly installed kiosks was a priority, especially as mains power is not available. Both kiosks have been adapted to use hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) fuel, a fossil-free alternative to mineral diesel with reduced CO2 emissions compared with traditional diesel generators. Lithium battery pack technology will also be introduced at the Pen Ponds kiosk which will reduce CO2 emissions by 60 per cent. Once this has been installed solar panels will be fitted and connected to the system.

High-quality timber oak, sustainably sourced from Herefordshire, has been manufactured into hand-crafted, sculptural, steam-bent cladding. The tree-like canopy of the kiosks' roofs creates a recognisable silhouette with instant associations of trees and nature whilst also providing shelter.

Paul Richards, Park Manager at Richmond Park, said: "We are so pleased to be able to add to our fantastic facilities here at Richmond Park. We hope that local residents and visitors from further afield all benefit from these additional and refurbished kiosks and will enjoy a cup of coffee or a snack whilst looking out at the park. The kiosks are designed with everyone in mind and are another way for them to connect with Richmond Park. We look forward to welcoming everyone into the parks to enjoy these new and improved spaces. Through our partnership with Colicci every purchase in the kiosks goes towards helping The Royal Parks charity in caring for Richmond Park."

Crisps are always a popular ingredient and there have been some interesting developments on the flavour front from Walkers. I've recently found a debut vintage Blanc de Noirs 2018 that won the **Sparkling Wine Trophy at the Independent English Wine Awards** (IEWA) 2023. It's called <u>Busi Jacobsohn</u> - and not content with winning this award, it also bagged a Gold medal at this year's International Wine Challenge! This delightful wine has lemon sherbet and biscuit with a pinch of sweet spices on the nose. Then brioche and hazelnuts on the palate, with plenty of complexity and depth. Great length with notes of crushed almonds on the finish. It's 92 % Pinot Noir and 8% Pinot Meunier and 12% alc and worth the indulgence: **Busi Jacobsohn Blanc de Noirs 2018** £48, Yapp.co.uk, Harvey Nichols, busijacobsohn.com

Rather than finish your picnic with anything chocolatey or sticky that might encourage wasps, it's far more sensible to take some nice cheese. One of my absolute favourites in terms of a widely available branded cheese is **Applewood Smoked Cheddar.** This multi award winning cheese makes the perfect picnic finale. (especially with some grapes) The company also produces a very acceptable plant based smoked cheese. Applewood and Applewood Vegan are available in Sainsbury's, Tesco, Morrisons, Asda, Ocado and Waitrose,

Applewood Vegan Grated is in Tesco and Ocado, Applewood Vegan Slices are in Waitrose, Sainsbury's and Ocado, and Applewood Vegan Minis have just launched in Morrisons.



When you're packing for a picnic, it makes sense to have a container that is reusable, but ideally one that packs flat when empty, to save space. Trouble in Tahiti

Arcola Theatre, part of the Grimeborn Festival at Arcola Theatre

Trouble in Tahiti is forty-five minutes of pure delight. My only complaint is that, after Bernstein incorporated it into his later full length opera *A Quiet Place*, Grimeborn didn't give us the longer work. Maybe next year.

Written in 1952, this gentle satire hasn't really dated, as suburban married couple Sam and Dinah, imprisoned by the stereotypical gender roles they have adopted, express their mutual unhappiness and frustration, something they find easier to do to the audience than to each other. Meanwhile a Jazz trio – think barbershop Rhinemaidens - comments ironically, with gorgeous singing from Izzi Blain, James Wells, and Tim Burton.







Bernstein's music has a real wit and lilt, which conductor Olivia Tait and her small orchestra successfully captured. Despite its title, the piece is very much set in suburbia. *Trouble in Tahiti* is the film that Dinah goes to see rather than her son's school play, which her husband also misses, giving priority to his handball game. Although he wins it, he is all too aware of 'the

law of men that even the winner must pay

through the nose. But, recognising that there is something not right between him and Dinah, he asks her out to see – *Trouble in Tahiti*.

Finn Lacey's direction displayed a light but effective touch. Peter Norris perhaps needed a bit more bite as Sam, while Alexandra Meier occasionally oversang as Dinah, but both gave compelling performances with beautifully phrased anguish and regret in a piece that definitely deserves to be performed more often.

EMOTIONS ON A KNIET EDGE

Cavalleria Rusticana by Pietro Mascagni, libretto by Giovanni Targioni-

Tozzetti and Guido Menasci and

Pagliacci by Ruggero Leoncavallo West Green House Opera, double bill at the Theatre on the Lake, Hartley Wintney.

West Green brings all the heat and passion of a Sicilian summer to its enchanting opera gardens with the inseparable Italian operatic pair, the torrid twins affectionately known as *Cav and Pag*.

The sex and violence plot is in essence the same for both operas. A husband, and one who is inclined to violence, is cuckolded. He finds out, and ends up killing the lover(s). That's it; no subplots: simple. Except for the characters being complex three-dimensional human beings with whom one can find sympathy.

The gorgeous Theatre on the Lake becomes the same fishing village for the two operas, set in Scilly in 1946. Bridget Kimak has created a simple set, a pantile roof above a gauze behind which

the orchestra can just be seen. However, its simplicity is deceptive, for it holds some later surprises.





As the ubiquitous rustic society, the chorus comes into its own with the Easter Hymn, sung with genuine fervour. In a *coup de théâtre*, the pascal effigy of the Virgin Mary is brought in by an oarsman rowing across the lake, before being borne up on the shoulders of the villagers. It is quite a wow moment!

It is the wronged Santuzza who has the most of the operatic passion-filled moments. It is clear that she is carrying Turiddu's baby, but his flame still burns for Lola, his former fiancée. Angharad Lyddon's honey rich mezzo adds

an audacious air of triumph as Lola, while Siberian tenor Alexey Dolgov voices the conflicting passions of Turiddu.

In her lustrous soprano, Samantha Crawford expresses the wringing emotions of Santuzza as she pours out her heart to Turriddu; to Lucia, his mother (distinguished mezzo <u>Sarah Pring</u>); and to Alfo (George von Bergen's imposing baritone), the bullying haulier who has married Lola.

With all the dramatic springs fully wound, Mascagni steps back with the Intermezzo, possibly more famous than the opera itself, a musical masterpiece. Conductor John Andrews pulls out

all the emotional stops, for we know what is about to happen dramatically. The music soars, sweeps, swoops, and a light breeze ruffles the waters of the lake.

We are in the same fishing village in Sicily later that year and a travelling theatre has arrived. It is a *Commedia dell'arte* show run by the overbearing Canio.

The two operas may basically tell the same story but Leoncavallo gives its raw emotional a more subtle psychological wrapping in *Pagliacci* and, by mounting it as a play within a play, adds a philosophical juxtaposition of stylised art and *verismo* reality.

Twilight envelopes the gardens, the overture plays and the orchestra is lit from behind the gauze screen. Sarah Bath's lighting creates another delightful surprise, as the orchestra gradually appears as a phantasmal phalanx.



<u>Jenny Stafford's</u> lyrical soprano has a mellow reflective feel as Canio's wife Nedda, who plays Columbine, the lover of Harlequin, Beppe's role. However, she is in reality having an affair with

a young villager, Silvio (Thomas Chenhall).



Another member of the troupe, the malformed clown Tonio, (versatile baritone Grant Doyle) is manipulative and full of spite; and he pulls many of the strings in the action. Tonio has overheard the lovers and alerted Canio. It falls to Beppe (tenor Lawrence Thackeray) to try to keep the lid on the dangerous emotions emerging, whilst keeping the show on the road.

<u>Tenor Ronald Samm</u> has an assured stage presence and is utter impressive in the momentous role of Canio. (It was a defining role for Enrico Caruso). It is a part that requires real power, and Samm richly delivers.

As art and reality converge, the *commedia dell'arte* performance closely resembles the lives of its performers. The violent end, with its double fatal stabbings, is truly horrific.

The ending echoes the fatal knife-fight at the tragically moving conclusion to *Cavalleria Rusticana*.

West Green House Opera's *Cav and Pag* is a masterly melding of two searingly passionate operas on the destructive nature of jealousy, adultery and treachery.

The Camden Fringe Festival

Edinburgh without the whisky, The Camden Fringe continues into August. A few recent shows include these.

Trustfall? by Carly Durrer and Jade Harris-Tyler (222 Productions)

It would be easy to say that *Trustfall* is simply a play about enduring friendship; but the subtext is far more complex. The first layer peels away as Carly, just off the plane, walks headlong into an all-too meaningful reunion with her friend, Jade. Disappointments, betrayals and misunderstandings come into sharp focus, as a friendship is brutally put to the test.

Exposed in harsh sudden strip lighting on a bare stage, the actor-writers have to rely on strong performances, and they do indeed deliver. *Trustfall*

is a true-life piece, which hints at a mutual biography. Authentic and honest acting creates a tight, terse tense piece.





Phrases by Lewys Holt (Perfectly Serviceable Productions)

Phrases contains very eccentric yet identifiable material embodied in skilled movement, as dance and spoken word artiste, Lewys Holt moves supplely against a minimal slideshow. Phrases appear: "Did I leave the oven on? ...", that familiar paranoiac situation. Its desperate logic worked well and, after a witty story, the old chestnut, "An apple a day ..." is reflected upon, before becoming an hilarious interactive session. Then Holt excels with some captivating dance movements.

However, a voiceover of a one-sided conversation lacked pace and even Bach's music when loud becomes jarring. Nevertheless, this quirky eclectic performance is full of sharp wit, and despite its ending verging on diffident, it's worthwhile looking out for.

Poems on Gender by David Lee Morgan

Prolific American poet David Lee Morgan has an impressive background as a BBC Poetry Slam Champion. A monumental figure on a bare stage, he greets us warmly. Twelve poems in precisely 38 minutes, then 22 minutes discussion. Would this work?

Brace for a polemic, but there is no lecture. Morgan tells us he embraced women's liberation so he didn't have to keep acting like John Wayne! Never tedious, *Poems on Gender* are absorbing with their deep black wit and flawless presentation.

World InfoZone -WIZ Around the World

Extracts from the 25th anniversary book of an internationally acclaimed internet project from Twickenham Teresa Read

The concept behind the World InfoZone website, twenty-five years ago, was to divide information for each country into sections for use in schools, ultimately providing a wider view of the world.

In the following years the World InfoZone project worked with over three hundred organizations and individuals compiling information about our world, initially linking to other websites, but over time it was found that there was more control over content by using World InfoZone's own country links. And this seemed to gain the approval of users of the site:

"I found a fantastic link ... to 'World InfoZone' and the bit on Kazakhstan, which of course led me onto searching through the whole World InfoZone site and several hours later I realised I needed to go to bed" - Mongol Rally blog.

From the project manager at the Stockholm Challenge "The 2008 Stockholm Challenge programme has been targeting ICT for Development projects globally. Great efforts have been put into the search for excellent examples of information and communication technologies, that show convincing benefits to people and communities and that help to build a global knowledge society. World InfoZone is such a project and therefore it deserves its place among this year's Finalists." Ulla Skiden, Project Manager, Stockholm Challenge

The school partnership project "Linking Our World – Schools Around the World" (a smaller global communication project within the main World InfoZone website) not only allowed pupils in different countries to get to know one another through emails but also linked to the WIZ country studies where they could gain background information about where their partners lived.

One of the projects in the Linking Our World project followed the <u>Route of the Olympic Flame</u> via links to information about the countries visited. The Linking Our World project in World InfoZone was selected Finalist for the Category Education in the Stockholm Challenge Award 2003/2004 for their contribution in the global movement of building a better information Society for all.

As a Stockholm Challenge Finalist in 2004 I received a specially made Kosta Boda glass sculpture and in 2008 World InfoZone was awarded a Diploma for excellence in the use of Information Technology in the Education Category.

Urban focus takes centre stage as Woodland Trust reveals Tree of the Year candidates

An oak that survived a wartime bomb, the tree that shaded Queen Elizabeth I on summer picnics and one of the UK's most famous elms are all in the running to be crowned Tree of the Year in the latest round of the competition organised by the Woodland Trust.

This year's contest shines a spotlight on ancient trees in urban locations, with every shortlisted specimen able to be visited free of charge by the public.

"Ancient trees in towns and cities are vital for the health of nature, people and planet," said Naomi Tilley, lead campaigner at the Woodland Trust. "They give thousands of urban wildlife species essential life support, boost the UK's biodiversity and bring countless health and wellbeing benefits to communities. But most ancient trees aren't protected by law, and those in urban areas are particularly vulnerable, like one of this year's nominees – which narrowly escaped being cut down by Sheffield City Council in 2017."

The Woodland Trust's panel of tree experts has shortlisted 12 fascinating urban contenders from across the UK for Tree of the Year 2023 – with one additional tree voted for by the public.

"Trees like those in the shortlist are remarkable and deserve celebration – and protection," Tilley added. "YouGov polling shows 83% of people in Great Britain support giving ancient trees legally protected heritage status. What's more, 85% of people think national government and its agencies should have responsibility for protecting them. The stats show just how much these trees mean to people."

This year's contenders are located in city parks, busy town centres and residential streets.

Each one has an amazing story to tell and is loved by locals, as well as providing vital habitat for wildlife, helping to reduce flooding, screen out noise, provide shade, filter air pollution, increase property values and bring cultural capital to our streets and parks.

Teenager Chiara George, one of the winners of the Woodland Trust's recent Youth Innovation competition, has a passion for urban and ancient trees.

She said: "Focusing on urban trees in Tree of The Year is super exciting because they are often overlooked despite their importance in maintaining biodiversity, absorbing noise and air pollution on busy roads, and so much more. It's really simple to vote for your favourite and help us crown a champion, so please get involved."

The winner will represent the UK in the European Tree of the Year competition!

England men's head coach Steve Borthwick has named his match day 23 to face Ireland at Aviva Stadium (kickoff 5.30pm).

Courtney Lawes (Northampton Saints) will captain an England side with six changes to the starting XV that defeated Wales 19-17 at Twickenham Stadium on Saturday. George Ford (Sale Sharks) and Ellis Genge (Bristol Bears) are named as vice-captains. In the front row, loosehead prop Genge is one of two changes to the forward pack, having won his 50th cap from the bench last Saturday. He is joined by Will Stuart (Bath Rugby) on the tighthead and Jamie George (Saracens) at hooker.

David Ribbans (Toulon), back in the side having successfully completed his return to play protocol, partners Maro Itoje (Saracens) in the second row. Elsewhere, an unchanged back row sees captain Lawes continue on the blindside with last weekend's player of the match Ben Earl (Saracens) at openside and Billy Vunipola (Saracens) at No.8. Ben Youngs (Leicester Tigers) and George Ford (Sale Sharks) are named in the half back births in what will be the 61st time the pair have started a Test match together.

In midfield, Manu Tuilagi (Sale Sharks) starts his first game of the Summer Nations Series at inside centre partnering Joe Marchant (Stade Francais) at 13. In the back three, Anthony Watson is named on the right wing with Elliot Daly (Saracens) on the left and Freddie Steward (Leicester Tigers) at full-back. Amongst the replacements, Ollie Chessum (Leicester Tigers) is back in an England shirt for the first time since the Guinness Six Nations having recovered from an ankle injury. Elsewhere Theo Dan (Saracens), Joe Marler (Harlequins), Kyle Sinckler (Bristol Bears), Jack Willis (Toulouse), Danny Care (Harleguins), Marcus Smith (Harleguins) and Ollie Lawrence (Bath Rugby) will all be hoping to join the action at some stage in the match.

"It is a great challenge against the number one ranked team in the world and we are all excited for this fixture," said Borthwick. "The game will be excellent preparation for us ahead of the Rugby World Cup."

Commenting on Owen Farrell's omission from the match day 23, Steve Borthwick said: "In my original planning for the Summer Nations Series and as part of our Rugby World Cup preparation, Owen Farrell was due to be selected to play in this Saturday's Test match in Dublin. However, in light of the fact that so much of Owen's training and match preparation time this week has been significantly affected and interrupted by the disciplinary process, I have not selected him in the matchday 23. Owen will travel to Ireland with our full support. Owen understands the situation, but is of course disappointed, as I am, that he is missing such a special game that he would otherwise have played in."

Red Roses To Return To Twickenham In 2024 TikTok Women's Six Nations

Twickenham Stadium will once again play host to a standalone Red Roses fixture in the 2024 TikTok Women's Six Nations.

John Mitchell's side will welcome Ireland to Twickenham in Round 4 of the Championship on Saturday, 20 April (KO 14:15), following on from last season's historic meeting with France at the home of English rugby. A crowd of 58,498 were in attendance for the first ever standalone Red Roses match at the venue as England Women clinched the Grand Slam with a 38-33 victory.

England and Saracens captain Marlie Packer said: "It is every player's dream to play on the biggest stages in the biggest matches; to have been part of the first standalone Red Roses match in front of nearly 60,000 fans was really special. We don't want it to be a one off; we want to grow towards selling out matches at Twickenham. We'll keep striving to break records, play in front of record-breaking crowds and hosting Ireland will be another occasion we will relish."

The Red Roses are also heading back to Ashton Gate to play Wales in Round 2 on Saturday, 30 March (KO 16:45). On their last visit to the Bristol venue ahead of the 2021 Rugby World Cup, England crossed for 11 tries against their visitors from across the Severn Bridge with Loughborough Lightning's Helena Rowland crossing for a hat-trick. Bristol Bears back Holly Aitchison was also in the backline that night and is relishing an international return to the city she now calls home.

"Ashton Gate is an amazing place to play rugby and we're all excited to be heading back there with the Red Roses," she said. "There is a great appetite for women's rugby in the South West, something I've learned even more so since moving to Bears. The fans are brilliant and always turnout in their numbers for Red Roses matches across the West Country and we have no doubt that we'll be heavily backed once again against Wales."

Ashton Gate Venue Director, Jenny Hutchinson, said: "After the success of our first international women's rugby match at Ashton Gate last year, we are delighted to be hosting the Red Roses and Wales again for another blockbuster Anglo-Welsh clash in Bristol. The opportunity to stage our first TikTok Women's Six Nations match is an exciting occasion for Ashton Gate and for the city. We attracted an 11,600-strong crowd for England's recordequalling 25th Test win over Wales the last time they visited and with the huge appetite for the women's game in Bristol, we look forward to welcoming another huge crowd."

Priority tickets for both matches are now available to O2 and Virgin Media customers with tickets priced from £5 for kids and £15 for adults*. England Rugby Hospitality packages are also available from today. Tickets will go on general sale on Wednesday, 16 August.

Frank: I can't wait for west London derby

Brentford head coach Thomas Frank has said he is looking forward to Saturday's west London derby against a 'very good' Fulham side; the last three meetings between the sides have featured 15 goals, including a 3-2 victory for the Bees in the last Premier League encounter Written by Brentford Football Club

Brentford head coach Thomas Frank has insisted that he 'can't wait' for Saturday's west London derby against a 'very good' Fulham side.

Frank has had numerous clashes with the Cottagers since becoming Bees boss in 2018, with his side winning the <u>most recent Premier League encounter 3-2 at the Gtech Community Stadium in March</u>.

The last three meetings, including the Premier League Summer Series fixture in pre-season, have featured 15 goals, and Frank wouldn't mind a similarly entertaining game on Saturday - but only if his side can come away with three points.

Frank laughed: "Another 3-2 that we come out on top in would be nice!



"Take the two league games and the recent friendly game: it's been three very tight matches, three very even matches, between two very good teams.

"Marco Silva and his staff have done a top job. I like the way Fulham play. I can't wait to play them.

"It's a big game for the fans, it's a big game for us and, hopefully, we will go out there, play with great intensity and try to take the initiative. It will be difficult away, but we will do our very best."

Fulham head coach Silva has confirmed that talismanic centre-forward Aleksandar Mitrovic will not play for his side on Saturday due to injury.

Silva also stated that Raul Jimenez will start in Mitrovic's place. And the former Wolves striker is someone that Frank believes is more than capable of filling in as the Cottagers' no.9.

"Mitrovic is a very good player and a very good striker. Jimenez is another good player and another good striker," said Frank.

"I think Jimenez's top level is as good as Mitrovic's. It's a little bit different, but it's similar.

"[Jimenez] is still a very good player to have in their team."

Frank confirms Fulham starter

Brentford head coach Thomas Frank has confirmed that Mathias Jensen will start for the Bees in their west London clash against Fulham on Saturday.

The midfielder came off in the <u>2-2 draw with Tottenham Hotspur</u> at Gtech Community Stadium last Sunday with a quad injury.

But Jensen will be available for the derby game against the Cottagers this weekend, with Frank adding that he will start for his side.

"He's ready - that's very positive. He's going to start tomorrow," said Frank.

The Bees boss also revealed that Jensen's midfield colleague Frank Onyeka is "ready and available for the game" on Saturday.



Defender Ben Mee will undergo checks on Saturday morning on the calf injury he suffered in the Bees' pre-season friendly against Ligue 1 side Lille.

Frank went from discussing defenders and midfielders to forwards, when asked how happy he is with his frontline in the absence of the suspended Ivan Toney.

Bryan Mbeumo and Yoane Wissa both scored in the 2-2 draw with Spurs, whilst Kevin Schade came on against the north Londoners, impressing with his dribbling ability and blistering pace.

And Frank was also keen to highlight winger Keane Lewis-Potter, who impressed for his side throughout pre-season.

"They're good players: Schade is a very good player, Wissa is a very good player, Mbeumo is probably the go-to guy now," said the Brentford head coach.

"And I think it's also important to mention Keane Lewis-Potter. He's a fantastic player and I have no doubt that he will be very good for us. He's been out with an injury and that just takes a bit of time to come up to pace.

"But, throughout this pre-season, he's adding layers. I like what I see from him.

"Both Yoane Wissa and Kevin Schade are good down the middle as a no.9, they're both flexible players. They have a little bit of different attributes.

"Wissa is fantastic in the box, being in the right position, being on the last line, attacking the gaps and crosses.

"Kevin is also good at that but he's also got his incredible pace."



Free access to cash protected

The vast majority of people and businesses are set to be no further than three miles away from withdrawing cash under a new framework set out by the Treasury.

A government statement published today [18 August 2023] set the minimum expectations on banks to protect services for people and businesses wanting to withdraw or deposit cash.

They can expect to withdraw cash without any fees – something that has been set out in law.

As part of this move, the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) has been provided new powers by the government to protect the provision of cash access services. This includes protecting cash access without any fees for those who hold personal current accounts.

Building on laws granted through the government's Financial Services and Markets Act 2023, the FCA will use these newfound powers to make sure banks and building societies are keeping up to these standards – and have the power to fine them if they do not.

While the country is moving further away from using coins and notes with the number of online payments rising from 45% to 85% in the past ten years, cash can still be an integral part of many businesses and people's lives.

Economic Secretary to the Treasury, Andrew Griffith, said:

"Whilst the growing choice and convenience of digital payments is great, cash has an important and continuing role to play. That's why we are taking action to protect access to cash in law and laying out that this means fee-free withdrawals and the availability of cash facilities within a reasonable distance.

"People shouldn't have to trek for hours to withdraw a tenner to put in someone's birthday card – nor should businesses have to travel large distances to deposit cash takings.

"These are measures which benefit everyone who uses cash but particularly those living in rural areas, the elderly and those with disabilities."

As it stands, the vast majority of people living in urban areas can access cash deposit and withdrawal services within one mile; with rural-dwellers around three miles away. Today's policy statement makes clear that the FCA should use its powers to maintain this level of coverage, while recognising that needs may differ by location and change over time.

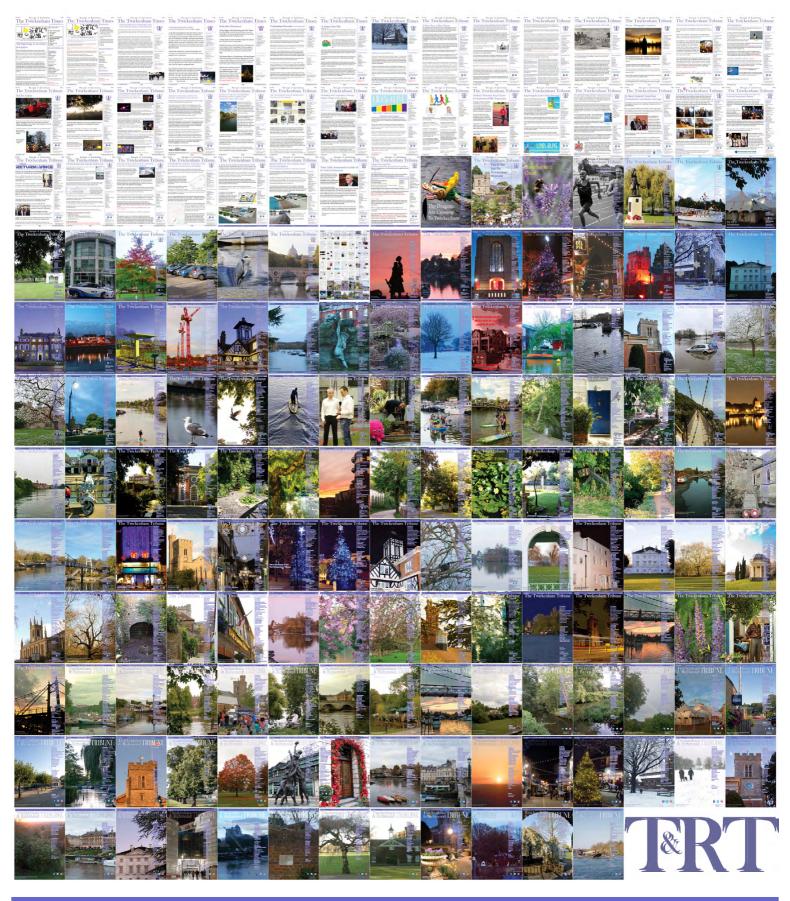
It also makes clear that – if a service is withdrawn and a replacement service is needed – this should be put in place before the closure takes place.

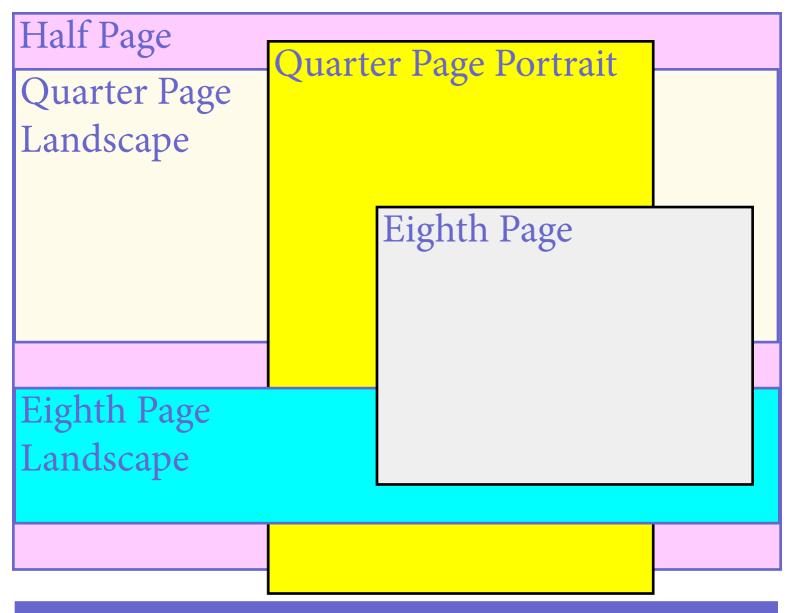
The FCA is also required to 'have regard' to local deficiencies in cash access. The policy statement sets out that the regulator should consider factors such as the opening hours and distance to cash access services, as well as the need for in-person assistance.

Laws introduced in the Financial Services Act 2021 have delivered cashback in over 2,500 shops across the UK – without any need to buy something in store – through the LINK network.
