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

A significantly reduced service will run on a limited number of lines.


Large parts of our network will be closed. Trains will only run between the hours of 0700 and 1900.

Covid-19 By Teresa Read

World Health Organization Weekly epidemiological update on COVID-19 - 1 September 2023

Please note that this is the last edition of the COVID-19 Weekly Epidemiological Update. Moving forward, as WHO transitions its COVID-19 surveillance from an emergency response to long-term COVID-19 disease prevention, control and management, we will be providing updates every four-weeks, with the next edition set to be published on 28 September 2023.

In the last 28-day period, over 1.4 million new COVID-19 cases and over 1,800 deaths were reported to WHO, an increase of 38% and a decrease of 50%, respectively, compared to the previous 28 days. As of 27 August 2023, over 770 million confirmed cases and over 6.9 million deaths have been reported globally.

Currently, reported cases do not accurately represent infection rates due to the reduction in testing and reporting globally.

At the country level, the highest numbers of new cases reported within the 28-day period were from the Republic of Korea (1,296,710), Italy (26,998), the United Kingdom (26,264), Australia (20,628) and Singapore (20,432). The highest numbers of new 28-day deaths were reported from the Republic of Korea (596), Italy (192), the Russian Federation (158), Australia (145) and China (135).

The European Region reported over 104,000 new cases, a 39% increase as compared to the previous 28-day period. Twenty-four of the 61 countries for which data are available reported increases in new cases of 20% or greater, with the highest proportional increases observed in Kosovo (+467%), Czechia (+261%) and Romania (+259%). The highest numbers of new cases were reported from Italy (26,998), the United Kingdom (26,264) and the Russian Federation (12,239).

The number of new 28-day deaths in the Region decreased by 43% as compared to the previous 28-day period, with 682 new deaths reported. The highest numbers of new deaths were reported from Italy (192), the Russian Federation (158) and Ireland (62).

Local Government Association

Commenting on the Government's announcement that the Covid-19 booster will be moved forward due to the new variant BA.2.86, Cllr David Fothergill, Chairman of the

Local Government Association's Community Wellbeing Board said: "It is clear that the success of the vaccination programme has allowed us to live with Covid-19. But the threat of new variants still remains a concern, particularly for those who are more vulnerable in our communities.

"Councils and their directors of public health will be doing all they can to work with NHS partners to support the take up of the booster vaccination rollout.

"As well as this, providers in the domiciliary care and care home sector are also being encouraged to communicate the benefits of the flu vaccine and Covid booster to care home staff, residents and those receiving homecare.

"If you are eligible, please do get vaccinated for flu and Covid-19 to protect yourselves and your families."

Community Pharmacy England

From **11th September 2023** vaccination for care home residents and those who are housebound should start, coordinated by Integrated Care Systems (ICS). NHS England is asking ICS to ensure that all residents are vaccinated before 22nd October 2023.

From **11th September 2023**, COVID-19 vaccinations can also commence for other eligible people via local booking systems, starting with those who are most at risk, including those who are immunosuppressed.

On **18th September 2023**, this will be complemented by the National Booking System (NBS) which will become available to allow eligible people to book a COVID-19 vaccination online (using NHS.uk), via the NHS App or by calling 119.

The Local Picture Postcard Column Part 212 By Alan Winter

Richmond Lock & Bridge

If you look up this lock and bridge almost anywhere on the Internet you will see that it is called Richmond Lock Bridge. It's therefore interesting to see that the postcard publishers we had on the west (Middlesex) side of the Thames during the 20th Century made a point of titling their postcards of the lock as "St Margarets Lock and Bridge".

Whatever it is called, it is a quite remarkable piece of engineering and building so I thought that we should take a look at it in more detail.

The first 3 Postcards of the lock and bridge that we use today have all been photographed from the St Margarets side of the river. I have added the final one from the Richmond side which was posted in 1909



and shows a very full boat navigating the lock. As you can see, this card is titled Richmond Lock. Nice to see the passengers in their Edwardian finery.

So, we have a lock, rising and falling and integrating controlled sluices and pair of pedestrian



bridges. It is a Grade II* listed structure and is the furthest downstream of the forty-five Thames locks and the only one owned and operated by the Port of London Authority.


It was formally opened on 19 May 1894 by the then Duke of York (who later became King George V), having cost £61,000 (equivalent to about £8million in 2023). and is north-west of the centre of Richmond. Downstream are

Syon Park and Kew Gardens on opposite banks. It connects the promenade at Richmond with the neighbouring district of St. Margarets on the west bank during the day and is closed at night to pedestrians. – after 19:30 GMT or after 21:30 when BST is in use.

The lock and barrages were installed in 1894 by the Thames Conservancy to maintain a broad navigable depth of water upstream of Richmond. The rising barrage ensures upstream at least 1.72 metres (5 ft 8 in) of water is in the standard navigation channel (away from banks) to the next lock, Teddington, and an annual draw-off (an all-tides lifting of the sluice gates) takes place to enable dredging to keep the advertised 1.72 metres (5 ft 8 in) minimum channel depth.



In 1908 an Act transferred responsibility for all points of the river downstream of a point 350 yards (320 m) below Teddington Lock to the Port of London Authority thereby including this



structure.

In 1890, after many years of petitioning, an Act of Parliament was enacted to build the halflock and weir, the **Richmond Footbridge, Sluice, Lock and Slipway Act 1890**. This is among a small minority of Thames locks not to have been built around an island or islands (aits).

The sluice gates were manually operated by lock keepers, who

lived in housing mostly contained under the pedestrian steps and landing on both banks.

From the date of the bridge's opening until some-time during World War II, pedestrians were

charged a toll of one (old) penny, i.e. $\frac{1}{240}$ of a pound. The toll booths and the remains of the turnstile housings remain. Since two unconnected footbridges exist, four toll booths and turnstiles had to be provided to collect the tolls.

Dog walker licences By Councillor Geoffrey Samuel

Background.

A few years ago the Council introduced licences for any dog-walker who want to walk more than four dogs. A limited number of licences - and I had a constituent who lost his business as he did not get a licence. Although I did not like the scheme I [wrongly] failed to vote against it. For most dog-walkers this is their only source of income. Some are those who otherwise would claim benefits: some those made redundant: some, who, for various reasons, are not capable of an 'ordinary' job.

The Story.

The Council offers a limited number of licences for dogwalkers who want to cater for more than four dogs - and goes to Court to prosecute anyone who breaches this regulation.

Whereas allotmentholders keep their allotments for as long as they want and those on the waiting list wait for a vacancy,



these licences are for two years only. After two years if there are more applicants than licences, all the names are 'put in a hat'. So a dog-walker with an established clientele simply loses his/ her business. How is this fair? How can you run a business on this basis?

The answer from the council is unbelievable - and a disgrace. It actually states that dog walkers must make an allowance for that in their business plan! How can a business plan prepare for the loss of the business? It shows that this Council knows nothing and cares nothing about very small businesses.

There is another aspect. Dog owners (I am not one: just cats for me] take great care in entrusting their pet to a dog-walker. The aim this to build establish and maintain in the long run a relationship that will last. What dog owner would entrust their pet to a dog-walker who told them that they might go out of business after two years?

This Council does not understand small businesses - and it does not understand dogs and their owners either!


This project will be led by We Made That, a team of specialist architects, designers and urban researchers, who will evaluate how the town centre is working for all, using data, working with community organisations and speaking to local people, businesses, workers and visitors about their experiences. After this engagement phase, We Made That will produce a town centre study with their findings and recommendations. The Council will share this report with the public and use it to determine next steps for developing the vision.

I can't believe that our summer will soon be over: the new school year is on the horizon and students will be preparing to head to university, many for the first time. But we can still hope for an Indian summer before the autumnal weather starts. In the meantime, here are some really interesting new products that have been brought to my attention this past month.


There's no better way to start the day than with a healthy breakfast. And what could be nicer than delicious combinations of natural ingredients sweetened with pure, mouth-watering honey. **Honey Heaven** sells a range of organic honeys exclusively sourced from small, artisanal Hungarian beekeepers. The pristine Hungarian countryside is an area of unspoilt natural beauty with stunning landscapes, criss-crossed by a network of springs and rivers, untamed Acacia forests and lush wild-flower and lavender meadows. The organic honey they make is extracted using

traditional methods which are sustainable and work in complete harmony with nature. The honey has won numerous Great Taste awards, is very delicious and available <u>here</u>. The kits include easy recipe cards and specialist ingredients such as spice blends, herbs, grains, noodles, sauces, and other extras. The fresh items that one needs to complete the dish are easily obtainable as part of a normal weekly shop The savoury Naksha Recipe Kits serve two or 6-8 the baking range serves six. Before the Pandemic, we as a family-Hedda, Shona and I took short breaks away over the bank holidays. With our beloved Hedda tragically leaving us in May, it's been all Shona and I could a to keep everything working so to speak. So, with the August Bank Holiday looming I wondered if I could at last keep my promise to Hedda – even though she'd have to come along spiritually, if you understand. And, that's what we did – went back to where I was when I was 17yrs old. I joined them (I was a farming student) to work with the market garden. In all these 70 years past wanted to go back and show the family the magical place I was in as a Teen.

So, we, Shona and I, went closed the agency last Friday night – put a message on the answer phone took our Mobiles and Laptops took a cab to Heathrow and caught the last flight to Cork – had a transfer to Kinsale and ended up in our 200-year-old converted Alms House

with its awesome views of the town and harbour below.

We also explored Kinsale, learnt how Mead is made, took a Harbour Cruise around the 2nd largest natural harbour in the world. Took a guided walk of the old town with a famous local historian.

You'd have thought Kinsale should have been the Capital of Ireland.

Walked my legs off and even found a Fig Tree (my favourite) with ripest sweetest fruit that I could scrump !!well they were going to waste...

Nothing! the flights, transfers, excursions, the Alms House all worked a treat.

Luckily for us but not for some as we had messages SOS's for help and with the laptops and mobiles sorted those issues out – but as far as we went, we were fine and I'm hoping that Hedda appreciated it too.

Whilst researching the countries in the Americas I was in contact with many individuals and organizations pleased to provide additional information for the country sections and photographs for the Galleries. Country tourism boards were always helpful but along the way I met many other organizations and individuals who supported the project.

In Ecuador, the Charles Darwin Foundation founded in 1959 in Galapagos, works closely with the government and is dedicated to the conservation of the Galapagos ecosystems. Charles Darwin brought back many specimens from his voyage on HMS Beagle (1831-1836). His observations of changes in species on different islands influenced his thoughts on evolution, published in *The Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection* in 1859.

By coincidence, the new Darwin Centre in South Kensington, London, adjoining the Natural History Museum and housing Darwin's specimens, opened while I was researching Ecuador and I was invited as a special guest to visit the inner sanctum of Darwin's specimens.

With many countries in the Americas to cover in the project I was soon corresponding with various organizations in the US such as the Embassy of Chile in Washington DC, as well as individuals throughout the Americas. One very helpful organization that has now sadly closed is the US NBII, the National Biological Information Infrastructure, and consequently the loss of access for everyone to the very comprehensive digital image collections.

Ahhhh the life of a shop keeper...never a dull moment at Meet & Deep Newsagents I can tell you of that for sure...those of you who have visited my newsagents shop on Hampton Road Twickenham may have witnessed this madness first hand...I am often seen behind the counter serving customers whilst on my mobile phone advising members of the general public on how to pick up a pigeon and at the same time on the landline phone giving advice to another member of the public about what to feed a baby squirrel...you may be now be thinking from the past articles we have read from Deep here, we have always thought that Deep is a little on the crazy side...but this time...has he truly lost the plot altogether? I mean selling Coca-Cola on the one hand whilst advising someone on his mobile phone about how to resuscitate a crow?

Worry not...I haven't just gone mad (my family will tell you that happened many years ago already) but I have been focusing my efforts on using my time whilst I serve customers and work in the shop to simultaneously save London's Wildlife...one pigeon at a time...so who wants to join me? She finds herself entertaining two lovers at the same time, and hiding them from each other in grandfather clocks, while developing an increasing rapport with sexy muleteer Ramiro (René Bloice-Sanders) who came to get his watch repaired, but finds himself carrying the clocks – with the men inside – up and down from her bedroom according to her whim. Ravel's pleasingly astringent score provides enough bite to save the piece from predictability.

This double bill makes a thoroughly delightful evening.

Turandot

by Giacomo Puccini, libretto by Giuseppe Adami and Renato Simoni Opera Makers and Ellandar, Arcola Theatre, Grimeborn Festival

Puccini's *Turandot* is extreme opera in every sense. An astonishing score blends orientalist chinoiserie with an Italian lyricism. Twisted out of shape by erotic obsession, it affronts conventional tonality. And the lead roles are even harder to sing than Wagner.

The main characters are both monsters. In response to an act of rape thousands of years ago, Turandot insists, if they fail to answer her riddles, on the slaughter of men who want to marry her. Calaf is so obsessed with winning Turandot's love that he is prepared to endanger the life of his father and his devoted servant



by offering himself up for execution if she can find out his name.



Turandot, with its big chorus and vast spectacle, isn't the kind of opera that you expect at the intimate Arcola. Hearing Puccini's amazing score stripped to its bare bones with largely piano accompaniment emphasises, in an utterly fascinating way, just how weird and discordant it is. Musical Directors, Panaretos Kyriatzidis and Thomas Ang thrilled the audience.

Co-directors Becca Marriot and Iskandar Sharuzuddin have refashioned the opera as a monstrous video game (with impressive designs by Erin Guan) where people wear masks that function as headsets to connect them to an alternative reality. This is an interesting take, with Liu as a much more central figure than usual. Heming Li is outstanding and outclasses all the other singers in this role.

The issue of how to handle Puccini's unfinished score is adroitly done. None of the completions quite work, so this one stops where Puccini does. (Probably just as well when there was no interval, and it was

excruciatingly hot.) Instead of committing suicide, Liu throws her engagement ring at Calif and walks out.

The production doesn't always distinguish between reality and computerised fantasy. But that is probably what happens if you spend too much time playing video games ... or going to the opera.

And I Love Him Still

About Bill by Bernie Gaughan, music and lyrics by Matthew Strachan Take Note at the Theatre at the Tabard until 2nd September

We never meet legendary trumpeter Bill Fitzgerald (an image of memorable jazz musicians of the mid-twentieth Century), but his presence pervades throughout *About Bill*, an evocative and poignant musical drama of Bill's life seen through the perspective of the many women in his life, from the schoolgirl crush, to the flawed romance with the recovering addict in his later years.

Most impressive is that Kim Ismay (for whom the piece was written) plays all the women with verve and versatility, managing with aplomb simple but very effective costume changes, from showgirl 1930s to hippy 1970s.

Bill was born on the eve of the Second World War, son of an aging itinerant showgirl. He never knew his father... it's not sure his mother did either. He was given some stability in his early life by his gently fierce but fiercely loyal Aunty Dot, whose engaging narrative provides the thread throughout the production.

Quite apart from the wonderfully and wittily observed mores and context of the time, this narrative takes us though a whistle-stop tour of musical and memorable events as brief soundbite of the years.

Paul Crew accompanies with sensitivity and a real feeling for the different styles, as Bill's life captivatingly mirrors the highs and lows, and changing culture of the times.

Chameleon like, versatile Kim Ismay absolutely inhabits all of these many faceted women with confidence and honesty. Outspoken, but gentle giant, Aunty Dot's bewilderment at her nephew's talent is beautifully portrayed. The loneliness of lovelorn landlady, Gloria, who watched Bill take endless young ladies up to his bedroom all the while secretly wishing it was her is truly moving. The final scene as Sally stands at his grave imagining the life she never knew, was poignant.

All involved, writer, music and lyricist, and Kim Ismay herself have wide West End success. And the recently reinvented Tabard Theatre is bringing top class theatre to West London. *About Bill* cements all of these reputations.



Match Preview: Brentford v Bournemouth

Analysis, tactics, match officials and more. Here's everything you need to know ahead of Brentford's Premier League game against Bournemouth

Brentford continue their 2023/24 Premier League campaign with a game against Bournemouth on Saturday (3pm kick-off).

Thomas Frank's side have a strong record against the Cherries, winning four of the last six meetings, including a <u>2-0 victory</u> at Gtech Community Stadium in January.

The Bees have taken five points from their opening three fixtures, while Bournemouth – having drawn with West Ham United on the opening day and then lost to Liverpool and Tottenham Hotspur – have one point.

Pre-match Analysis

Alex Lawes, Playmaker Stats: Brentford's in-form forwards may profit from Bournemouth's high line

Bournemouth have splashed more than



£100 million this season on a raft of new signings, as the impressive Andoni Iraola tries to implement a fast and aggressive style of football that worked wonders at Rayo Vallecano.

Now plying his trade on the south coast of England, Iraola led Rayo to a surprise promotion via the play-offs in Spain in 2021 and then moulded a competitive outfit in La Liga that flirted with European qualification.

In terms of his general style, Iraola can be viewed as an ideologue with a holistic philosophy that he tweaks game by game. In contrast, Brentford head coach Thomas Frank is arguably more flexible and pragmatic - varying the Bees' approach depending on the opponent or game state.

One similarity, however, is a shared focus on efficiency. Rayo's intense style last season saw them complete just 78.8 per cent of their passes, the 14th-lowest rate in Spain's top-flight, but still take 13.6 shots per game - only Real Madrid, Barcelona, Athletic Bilbao and Atletico Madrid shooting more frequently.

Bournemouth may have had a tough start with games against West Ham United, Liverpool and Tottenham Hotspur this season, but they are currently 15th for shots taken in the Premier League - 12.7 per game so far - averaging a similar amount to Iraola's Rayo.

Another tactical element of Iraola's style worth noting is his preference for a high line.

Last season, Rayo caught the opposition offside an average of 2.6 occasions per game, with only eventual UEFA Europa League winners Sevilla marshalling a better offside trap.

Leaving space in behind is a high-risk strategy though and - even given the quality of their opposition thus far - there appear to be defensive frailties for Iraola to iron out at Bournemouth: the Cherries conceding more than three more shots per game (19.7) more this season than they did last term (16.5).

One trait that Iraola's Bournemouth appear to share with his Rayo side is a penchant for shooting from distance. The Cherries have taken 21 shots from outside the box this season; the second most in the Premier League. His Rayo team ranked second, only behind Real Madrid, in La Liga last term.

This tendency contrasts sharply with Brentford, who average the fewest shots from outside the box in the top flight in 2023/24 and want to get as close to goal as possible to maximise their chances.

One shared characteristic between the Cherries and the Bees this Saturday could be their willingness to be direct - but even in this respect there are likely to be differences in approach.

Last season, Rayo had the third most inaccurate long balls in La Liga and so far this season, Bournemouth have had the fourth most in the Premier League. Brentford, on the other hand, rank only behind Man City for accurate long balls this season, with an average of eight more accurate long passes per game than their upcoming opponents.

When Bournemouth slipped to the bottom of the Premier League table at the start of March – following a game against Arsenal where they had taken a 2-0 lead, only to lose 3-2 – a return to the Championship after just one season back in the top flight looked a very real possibility.

They had only won four of their 24 league games prior to that point and were six months into Gary O'Neil's reign, which had started when Scott Parker left the club days after the 9-0 defeat at Liverpool, which equalled the Premier League record for the biggest winning margin.

"The boys will be devastated, as am I, for the next few hours or maybe slightly longer," O'Neil said, speaking after the aforementioned loss at the Emirates. "But Liverpool come next week and we'll be ready."

He was true to his word. Philip Billing put the Cherries in front after half an hour the following Saturday at the Vitality and, after a rare penalty miss from Mohamed Salah midway through the second half, they held on for a 1-0 win few saw coming, particularly as Liverpool had not conceded in almost 500 minutes at the time.

Bournemouth were by no means perfect in the last two months of the campaign, but they picked up four crucial wins in the next seven games – against Fulham, Leicester City, Tottenham Hotspur and Southampton – which meant that, by the time of a 4-1 win over Leeds United on 30 April, the poor form of the teams below them meant they could just about afford to finish with four straight defeats.

"Not many fans outside of Bournemouth would have given us a prayer this year," O'Neil remarked after the Leeds win. "To have as many questions asked of them as they have, to have been written off and to get to 39 points with four games to play is an incredible effort."

After managing to keep the club in the division for another year, it seemed as though O'Neil would be the man to steer them this term as they put the lessons they had learned along the way into practice. But the new ownership at the club had other ideas and, on 19 June, he was dismissed and replaced by Andoni Iraola.

There was understandable shock, which chair Bill Foley said he understood during an interview with talkSPORT: "It really wasn't so much about Gary not doing what he was asked to do, it was more about the opportunity to give our football club a different identity through the coach we made contact with some time ago and then initiated contact very recently."

The former Spain international came in on a two-year deal and despite in his first interview alluding to the fact one of the reasons he had joined the club was because of the players they had on the books, he has been presented with £110 million worth of new players, including Tyler Adams from Leeds, Alex Scott from Bristol City and Patrick Kluivert's son Justin from Roma.

His side haven't got going just yet, with two defeats and one draw from their first three Premier League games, which has done little to dissuade bookmakers from pricing them as fourth favourites for relegation behind Everton, Sheffield United and Luton Town.

With a lot of new faces, the window remaining open and a manager with limited experience in the English game, perhaps they have been guided by the element of the unknown. But Bournemouth have been written off countless times before and they will relish the chance to set the record straight once again.

In the Dugout

Andoni Iraola

A right-back by trade during his playing days, Andoni Iraola came through the ranks at Athletic Bilbao and made his debut during the 2003/04 La Liga season, following two years in the Segunda Division with Bilbao's B team and year with CD Basconia – effectively the club's C team – before that.

Over the 10 seasons that followed his debut year, Iraola, astonishingly, missed just 26 league games, during which time he was part of the squad that finished as runners-up in the Copa del Rey twice, once in the Europa League and once in the Spanish Super Cup. Between 2008 and 2011, he earned seven senior caps for Spain, too.

He featured considerably less during 2014/15 - his final season at San Mames – but captained Lehoiak in his final game for the club, in a third Copa del Rey final defeat, this time against Barcelona.

Iraola then signed for New York City of the MLS, where he spent 17 months, before retiring in November 2016.

Just over 18 months later, he was handed his first managerial role with AEK Larnaca, but lasted only until January 2019 after winning 12 of his 29 matches in charge of the Cypriot First Division club.

That summer, he joined CD Mirandes where, in his only season at the club, he masterminded a run to the semi-final of the Copa del Rey for only the second time in club history.

In August 2020, he took over at Rayo Vallecano, whom he led to promotion from the Segunda Division in his first season in charge.

Los Franjirrojos finished 12th in their first season back in La Liga and 11th last term, which led to an approach from Leeds United in February, which was rebuffed by the club's board.

However, he left at the end of the campaign, when his contract expired.

The Gameplan

Bournemouth Echo's Tom Crocker explains how the Cherries are likely to set up at Gtech Community Stadium:

"It has been a tough start, both in terms of results and the fixture schedule.

"Of the eight fixtures Bournemouth were handed to start this year, they lost all of those corresponding fixtures last season, so it was always going to be difficult, coupled with the fact a number of key players have been out injured.

"There have been encouraging signs along the way though, notably the front-foot approach. But I think everyone accepted the first month or so might be tricky results wise.

"Despite still having plenty of players missing, including likely starters Tavernier, Scott and

Adams, I expect Iraola to stick with the 4-4-1-1 he has been using all season.

"There are not too many options to change the line-up from recent weeks, other than in the attacking midfield areas."


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Fraudster's brazen scam to trick London's ULEZ cameras

An investigation by ITV News London has uncovered a brazen scam to trick London's ULEZ cameras and avoid paying the £12.50 charge. The fraudster, who falsely claimed to work for Transport for London, said he could ensure polluting vehicles followed the rules to be compliant.

Using WhatsApp, the man who referred to himself as 'Christopher T' and said he altered ULEZ records for pre-Euro 6 cars which typically have high levels of harmful emissions. The scammer charged £700 and all he asked for is payment and the vehicle log book.

ITV News tested if the fraudulent scheme worked and obtained car registration details apparently provided to the seller by people he claimed were customers. We cross-referenced the details with the records on government data bases which confirmed the information matched.

Both cars are BMWs and both run on pre-2015 diesel engines which means neither are ULEZ compliant. But when you run the number plates through TfL's ULEZ checker it says they are.

"It certainly should not be coming up as ULEZ compliant, (the website says) this vehicle meets the ULEZ emissions standards – there's something very wrong there," said motoring expert Steve Fowler.

A spokesperson for Transport for London said: "We are proactive in identifying criminals attempting to commit fraud against TfL and are aware of a small number of criminals attempting to produce fraudulent counterfeit vehicle documents to support fraudulent ULEZ exemption applications. "We are working with the police to make sure the criminals face the consequences of their actions and are working closely with vehicle manufacturers to prevent fraudulent applications being successful. "Drivers should not use the services advertised by these fraudsters as they will also be committing a criminal offence as well as wasting their money as their exemption will not stand. We have already removed many exemptions where we have identified or suspected them to be fraudulent."

The man behind the scheme hides behind a series of social media accounts and always stays anonymous. ITV News London revealed details of the investigation to the fraudster and asked him to respond to our findings.

'Christopher T' called back and hung up and appeared to have no interest in responding to serious allegations of fraud that we found him to be committing. He then blocked us on WhatsApp and deleted his messages.

There are similar accounts still out there but those unwilling to pay the ULEZ charge could find themselves being drawn into this illegal activity as a way of saving money.

Transport Secretary Mark Harper said London ULEZ expansion is to pave the way for road pricing scheme

Mark Harper told <u>GB News</u>: "So in my view, in many other people's views, it's not about air quality. It's about raising money from some of the poorest motorists and hard-pressed Londoners.

"But it's also about putting an infrastructure in place for his future plans, which are on his own website for his Project 2030 scheme to develop more sophisticated, as he puts it, road user charging. So a pay-per-mile system, which will make driving the preserve of the better off. I don't want to see that happen.

"That's what this is really about, which is why I think it's so unpopular."

In a discussion with Christopher Hope, he

continued: "His own impact assessment that he commissioned through Transport for London says it's going to have a minor to negligible effect on air quality. So it's not about improving air quality. And therefore if you look at what else it could be about, it's clearly about raising money and putting in place the infrastructure for a future of pay-per-mile road charge."

Asked if the Conservatives would ban ULEZ schemes if they win the next election, Mr Harper said: "In other parts of the country, if mayors want to do these sorts of schemes, they've got to have the permission of the local councils, which is a useful check and balance in the system.

"That isn't currently the position in London and one of the things that's happening in a piece of legislation that's going through, the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill...which would mean in the future schemes like this would have to be supported by local councils or they wouldn't be able to run in those councils' areas.

"Now, I think that's a good step. You can't make it retrospective, it's going forward. But I think it'd be useful protection against this plan to have more road user charging in London, which Sadiq Khan plans to do in the future."

On reports that the national air traffic control system may have been caused by a French airline, he said: "I don't know where that story has come from, we're looking into the root cause of it...

"We haven't had a significant outage like this for the best part of a decade. Usually the system functions very well and that it is actually one of the best air traffic systems in Europe, it's very reliable, and usually performs very well.




Chancellor of the Exchequer Jeremy Hunt said:
