Helicopter over Richmond Park

Residents in the Richmond area have been commenting on the presence of a helicopter circling over Richmond Park. The National Police Air Service stated "To dispel some rumours that have been circulating. We were deployed to Richmond Park last night searching for escaped prisoner Daniel Khalife. Due to the size and complexity of the park this took a protracted period of time. Apologies for the noise."

The terror suspect Daniel Khalife escaped from Wandsworth Prison on Wednesday morning. Khalife has links to the area having lived in Kingston near Richmond Park with his mother and sister; he also attended Teddington School until 2018.

Pavilion fire - Hampton Wick

Six fire engines and around 40 firefighters tackled a fire on Park Road in Hampton Wick.

The Brigade was called at 03:15 and the fire was brought under control by 05:24. Crews from Kingston, Surbiton, New Malden, Richmond and Surrey Fire & Rescue attended the scene.

Aljazeera: World Health Organization sees 'concerning' COVID trends before winter as hospitalisations rise. The UN health agency says many countries stopped reporting COVID data and called for more vaccinations and surveillance.

The Telegraph: New Covid variant pirola 'spreading' in the community First case in UK was detected last month and an outbreak in a care home in Norfolk has been reported.

Epidemiological update: COVID-19 transmission in the EU/EEA, SARS-CoV-2 variants, and public health considerations for Autumn 2023: In recent weeks, signals of SARS-CoV-2 transmission have increased from previously very low levels in the EU/EEA. Factors unrelated to the genetic evolution of SARS-CoV-2 likely contributed to observed increases in epidemiological indicators, such as large gatherings and increased travel during the seasonal holidays, as well as waning levels of immunological protection against infection – but not severe disease – in the population.

Nonetheless, SARS-CoV-2 remains capable of acquiring mutations that facilitate its continued circulation at unpredictable times throughout the year. Recently observed increases in SARS-CoV-2 transmission have coincided with the emergence and subsequent dominance of a group of related Omicron sub-lineages, XBB.1.5-like variants carrying the F456L mutation.

Norfolk.gov.uk: Covid outbreak in care home: Interim Director of Public Health Stuart Lines said: "We have been working closely with the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) in their support to manage an outbreak of Covid-19 in a Norfolk care home.

How long are you contagious with COVID?

People with moderate or severe COVID-19 should isolate through at least day 10. Those with severe COVID-19 may remain infectious beyond 10 days and may need to extend isolation for up to 20 days.

Investigation to trace Daniel Khalife continues

We continue to appeal for the public to help us locate Daniel Abed Khalife, who escaped from Wandsworth prison.

There is a significant operation under way led by the Metropolitan Police Service's Counter Terrorism Command, involving more than 150 officers and staff.


They are working closely with colleagues in police services across the country, the Ministry of Justice and a wide range of Government agencies and other partners.

Commander Dominic Murphy, who leads the investigation, asked for anyone with information about Khalife that may help us to get in touch urgently.

He said: "Since yesterday, over 150 officers and staff have been working around the clock on apprehending Khalife.

"We have issued a nationwide alert that has resulted in increased security at our ports and borders, however currently there have not been any confirmed sightings.

"I recognise and am fully aware of the impact these measures are having on the public. We are working to ensure as minimal disruption as possible.



"It is crucial for the public to help us with this search and to call us immediately if they have any information on the whereabouts of Khalife."

Khalife was declared missing at 07:50hrs on 6 September. The Met was notified at 08:15hrs and took immediate action to track down a delivery van that had left the prison.

At 08:37, police officers stopped the van in Upper Richmond Road, near the junction with Carlton Drive. Officers spoke to the driver and carried out a thorough search. Police discovered strapping on the underside of the van.

Currently, we believe Khalife was hiding underneath the van and used this strapping as part of his escape.

Officers have traced the route of the van after it left Wandsworth Prison and are appealing to anyone who might have seen the van on this route to get in touch.

The van left HMP Wandsworth at 07:32 taking a right turn out of gates onto Heathfield Road. It then turned left onto Magdalen Road. The van then turned left onto Trinity Road (A214) up to the Wandsworth Roundabout. It took the first exit onto Swandon Way (A217).

It then turned left onto Old York Road (past Wandsworth Town station) then left onto Fairfield Street, right onto Wandsworth High Street (A3) staying straight ahead onto West Hill and then on to Upper Richmond Road (A205).

The Met has continued to focus its efforts in the London area, particularly around this route, as well as the Kingston area, where Khalife is known to have connections.

Khalife's previous military experience may mean he is more aware of efforts to apprehend him.

While he is not assessed to pose a threat to the wider public we advise anyone who seems him not to approach him and instead call 999 immediately.



Teddington and Lock Cut footbridge nighttime access

From Monday 11 September, there will be no access overnight across Teddington Lock footbridges from 9.30pm to 6.30am, Monday to Friday.

A bespoke access system has been developed that allows the majority of works to be completed, whilst maintaining access across both bridges. However, due to the restricted width of the bridges, when working on the inside of the parapets, we will have to restrict access to the bridges. To limit disruption these restrictions will take place overnight.

There will be no access via the bridges overnight on weekdays from 11 September 2023.

The nighttime works will take place when required from 9.30pm to 6.30am Monday-Friday. Works will not take place overnight on Saturday or Sunday.

Alternative routes

For those who would normally cross Teddington/ Lock Cut Bridge as part of their commute to access rail services to and from Teddington, the following bus routes serve both Richmond (rail and underground services) and Kingston (rail services):



Friday The 25th - What really happened after the Springboks match? (Part 1) From our North Twickenham correspondent, Francis (Mac) McInerny



Friday 25th August was marked by chaotic scenes after the Springboks v All Blacks match in Twickenham stadium.

To describe crowd behaviour as 'poor' does not fairly represent the situation that developed after the match.

Whitton Road was jam-packed with fans having no way through to Twickenham Station, large numbers of visitors reported urinating in residential streets and gardens and CSP stewards who were generally ineffective in keeping hundreds of rugby visitors out of the residential side roads.

Residents came out onto the streets to usher CSP stewards back to their posts and to try to persuade hordes of visitors to leave.

I run a community group in Twickenham and I was alerted to disorder on the streets just before midnight when I received messages by email from friends and members of my Heatham Alliance group.

The passage of crowds heading for Twickenham Station had been brought to a complete halt and the queue of departing

rugby fans was backed up along Whitton Road towards the A316.

Within 24 hours I received 20 or more emails from Heatham Alliance members and other residents, some with photos and video footage.

In spite of complaints made to the RFU there has been an astonishing lack of coverage of the unacceptable behaviour by many rugby fans, the appalling experiences that local residents endured, poor response by the CSP security firm and the lack of Police presence.

The aim of this article is to provide an independent and informed view of what residents saw and experienced on 'Friday the 25th' and to offer objective comments on what could be done to avoid such disorder in the future.



The anti-social behaviour was out of control

The most common complaints were about the CSP security stewards engaged by the RFU

and the offensive behaviour by dozens or even scores of visitors who treated our residential roads and private gardens as public toilets.

Finding their way to Twickenham Station blocked, many of the fans tried unsuccessfully to find alternative routes through the side streets and in many instances the CSP stewards just stood back to let them through the crowd control barriers.

Fans were allowed into the residential side roads, some of them looking for toilets. They were able to cut through the gardens of the elderly care home at Perrin Court, much to the distress of the residents there.

These are just a couple of the complaints I have read, typical of feedback from other residents:

"It wasn't one or two people being let through, it was droves of people, I'd say 100's and so many reports about the urinating." "We had hundreds of people walking and shouting and urinating in people's gardens." And that was just in one of the roads off Whitton Road.

In Heathfield North and Grimwood Road the residents came out onto the streets to try and calm things down and persuade visitors to leave and stay away, with some success and some abuse from visitors.



"They definitely need to be sending someone and quick as it's bad!"

The crowd was out of control and a Police presence was needed. However, the 'semi-official view' was that it is unlikely anyone – i.e. including the Police - would reach the spot before the offender had left.

Unfortunately this opinion doesn't take account of how urinating offenders behave as a group with others joining in and cases where a Police presence could have prevented further offences taking place.

One call to the RFU's helpline did result in Police being sent to prevent entry into Grimwood Road.

The Police presence was welcomed by residents but in some other roads Police arrived after the disorder had subsided and crowds were already dispersed.

Questions have been asked about a communication channel for residents to summon an urgent Police presence on RFU event days, difficulties accessing the RFU's community helpline and communications channels for CSP stewards to call for assistance.

Proper supervision of CSP stewards and supervision of the overall CSP operation were missing and instructions and training for the stewards proved to be inadequate. All of these have been recurring issues for a long time.

Over 500 new EV charging points coming to Richmond upon Thames this year

Richmond Council will install 525 new electric vehicle (EV) charging points across Richmond upon Thames. The borough already has 420 charging points, so the new additions will bring the total to 945.

Cllr Alexander Ehmann, Chair of Richmond Council's Transport and Air Quality Committee said: "Electric vehicles are becoming more and more popular, with nearly two in every five new car sales being electric, but access to charging can be a barrier. Our residents do rely on cars due to the limited public transport network in south west London, so by expanding the charging network we hope that even more people will choose to go electric and help improve the air quality in our borough.

"For those who are wanting to try out an EV, the Zipcar Flex car club operating in the borough offers electric options. And for those who are having to scrap their car to comply with the ULEZ expansion, the Council is offering financial support for you to try car clubs through our Good Move Scheme."



The charge points, installed directly into existing street lampposts, charge at a speed of up to 5kW and take less than two hours to install. The rollout is planned for key residential locations, allowing easy access to on-street charging, where the majority of residents park on streets with no access to off-street parking.

The installation and ongoing management will be carried out by ubitricity and will start this year. Drivers will be able to pay by debit or credit card or by using the Shell Recharge app. All live sites can be found on ZapMap.

The <u>Richmond Good Move Scheme</u> offers one-year free membership and £50 driving credit for Enterprise car club or Zipcar to residents who commit to scrapping their non-ULEZ compliant car. Other options including public transport tickets and bike hire are also available.

LO AND NO - A HEALTHY ALTERNATIVE

I don't know about you, but I'm conscious that we're drinking far more alcohol than we used to. So, with the autumnal evenings, and (dare I say it) the Festive Season on the horizon, now might be a good time to rein in a bit. I'm planning to cut back during the week, but not worry too much over the weekends, so I've been researching some excellent new no or low alcohol alternative drinks. Interestingly, one has to be careful if, for medical reasons, any degree of alcohol must be avoided: do check the label, as some that are labelled alcohol free have a tiny amount, hardly discernible for most, but could be unpleasant for some people.

Clean G is the brainchild of Spencer Matthews, who offers a selection of premium non-alcoholic spirits that taste just like the real thing across gin, rum, tequila, vodka and whiskey, offering an alcohol-free alternative without compromising on taste or social interaction. Clean G is the company's take on London Dry Gin. It has notes of crisp juniper, balanced with botanicals - and it's rather delicious. It's won a gold

award at the IWSC too and is surprisingly reasonably priced at £16 a bottle online <u>here</u> or at major supermarkets. And it's currently on offer in Waitrose for just £12 (till Sept 26)

Correspondence by email with South Korea took place in the run up to the FIFA World Cup in May and June 2002 when South Korea and Japan both provided venues. It was quite an exciting time with a lot of interest in World InfoZone from Seoul.

At this point, I was in contact with Roshan, a reporter for IRIN News, who often sent photographs for various countries illustrating on the spot news. However, there were many individuals and agencies keen to provide information and photographs throughout Asia, including government departments, and even a prime minister's office.

All this interaction and information went to build up a very comprehensive overview of Asia, illustrated with some very exceptional photographs. Of course, it must be remembered that it was an early time on the internet in respect of the number of websites online, with people keen to take part in the project; our pages of the Hong Kong visit going online in 1997, at a time when there were relatively few websites worldwide.




QUALITY DITCHWATER, BUT DULL



Céphale et ProcrisMusic by Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre, libretto by Joseph-François Duché de Vancy Ensemble OrOuesta at the Arcola Theatre

Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre was the first woman to write a French opera, which makes her a perfect candidate for the Grimeborn Festival. Her opera is certainly no worse than those written Rameau – and sometimes better – but there is no getting away from the fact that French opera of the late 1690s was pretty stiff and stilted. The libretto is dreadful, starting with an allegorical prologue in praise of Louis XIV and never recovering, as all the characters, whether divine or human, do everything in their power to thwart the love of Céphale and Procris. They eventually succeed by convincing each of the lovers that the other is unfaithful, with the result that he accidentally kills her with an arrow. Othello it ain't.

The music feels pretty constrained as well, with an awful lot of recitative interspersed with airs that usually fail to blossom. The ensemble writing is more interesting than







It seems a bit of a waste of some extremely talented performers. Ensemble OrQuesta has some fine instrumentalists who were beautifully audible in this intimate auditorium. Kieran White (Céphale) has a beautiful high flexible tenor and did wonders in making this difficult music sound ingratiating. He is well matched by Poppy Shotts as Procris.

Marcio da Silva sings Arcas, as well as conducting and taking responsibility for the staging, lighting, set, costumes, and choreography. His talents are considerable but he spreads them far too thinly. He has far too many ideas - and not all of them work. And why choose to 'represent Céphale with female characteristics' when he still has a beard and occasionally loses his skirt for no good reason.

Scavengers by Bryan Oliver

Urban Wolves Theatre Company at The Etcetera Theatre

Strolling into *Scavengers*, with its deceptive and dark staging, you could be trespassing into somebody's dwelling. Sitting there at a table, fiddling between make-up and mobile, sits Zeb, who is about to take centre stage in a play which explores survival in a post-apocalyptic world that is closer-to-reality than you might hope.

Set within the murky confines of a tower block's basement, the play delves into the lives of three individuals battling against insurmountable odds to endure the aftermath of a major catastrophe. Wikki and Zeb are hiding from the relentless



hunters – scavengers – of The Squire, an opportunist who has seized control over this hellish landscape, follows a combined crisis of climate and virus. A chance intrusion by Finn, another survivor desperately searching for sustenance, sends shockwaves through their precarious existence, as truths are gradually revealed. Amidst the backdrop of scarcity and danger, the characters are compelled to confront fears, desires, and the looming external threats that challenge their fragile limbo-like reality.



Oliver's script is performed with an impeccable tempo, which keeps the audience suitably unnerved throughout, capturing the urgency and tension of a world in a state of disarray. The effective use of darkness and candlelight heightens the atmosphere, enveloping the characters in an eerie ambiance that mirrors the uncertainty of their world.

The cast's skilled performances keep the tension whispering, as three human beings navigate unthinkable challenges. Matteo Piombino's extravagantly performed Finn, who turns from hushed timidity to eccentric humour, stands out, while Wikki is given a real grit by Neil Hobbs, creating a grounded and moral character. Grace Richardson perhaps has the hardest role with Zeb as the true centre of the story, yet manages to ebb and flow credibly in her relationships with the other characters.

Scavengers completely draws you into its bleak post-apocalyptic setting. Its uncertainty is unsettlingly close to reality, an unease that lingers even after leaving the theatre into a London darkness permeated by softly suburban streetlights.


The Camden Fringe Festival Round-Up The Camden Fringe 2023 has come to an end. Here are a final few offerings

An Evening with Gene Montague by Lewis King and Robert Thomas (Hot Car Vodka Collective) The interviewer at a talk show has been replaced by the incisive Aubrey, putting the interviewee, actor Gene Montague, on a wrong footing, and into downward spiral. Montague (Woody Franklyn) is clearly on the way down, if he was even up there at all. His exposé is simultaneously cruel and funny. A dramatic sequence against the soundtrack of *Gardener's* Question Time is ingenious, as it goads the plot towards the climatic revelation.

Gaslight by Shaira Yasmin Berg (CADS)

What would happen if "life-threatening physical wounds were treated the same as psychological trauma"? In this exploration relationships fall apart abruptly. Arianna Munoz's sensitive direction uncovers emotions, accusations and betrayals. The roles of five students and their tutor are played with subtlety and skill, in highly watchable performances. None of them comes away unscathed in a tight script that build up to the tragic climax of this tense guick-paced drama.





Wife Material by Heleana and Sophia Blackwell (HSB) Anyone expecting a cosy ideal of marriage are soon brought up short, as we are drawn into niggles, bad habits, duvet covers and ... lockdown. Sharply directed by multi-award winning comedian Maria Shehata, this slickly devised show draws on the Italian and West Indian roots of the writers. The pair manoeuvre swiftly between comedy, poetry and song. Drawing energy from the audience, this is an hilarious, refreshing, relevant hour of joy.

How to Be Jewish Again by Gillian Fischer

In spite of a passion for bacon, actress-writer (and one time Israeli tank driver) wants to revert to Judaism. However, research shows that the number of people converting back to their Jewish faith is zero! After eighteen months, we share her arduous climb, but maybe

Fischer will never again be 'Jewish enough'. It is a poignant message, but Gillian Fischer has a witty and vibrant style, and is a natural comedienne and storyteller.

ULEZ'is all about raising £200 million' not health says Conservative group leader

Tories 'should have stepped in' to stop expansion says party's leader in London

THE Leader of the Conservatives on the London Assembly has said he thinks his party should have stepped in over the expansion of ULEZ to all 32 boroughs of Greater London.



Keith Prince, Member for Havering and Redbridge, told <u>GB News</u> the Conservatives "should have challenged the consultation" as he claimed the new charges were "all about raising £200 million."

"I really don't think Saqid [Khan] appreciates how angry people are," he said. "We had a special meeting this week at my council. The weekend before, I was out in the streets of Romford and I can tell you people are really angry and they're not just angry with Sadiq, they're angry with us too.

"And I can understand that; I can understand why they're angry with the Conservatives because they feel we haven't done enough to help them.

"I really do think we should have stepped in. We should have challenged the consultation because he broke virtually every rule around consultation and we should have said 'Sorry, you've got to do it again."

With reports showing that levels of air pollution on the London Underground are worse than at street level, Mr Prince told Nana Akua he believed Saqid Khan hasn't focused on the Tube due to finances.



"He can't raise any revenues from that," he said. "The London Underground is 30% more polluting than a ground level on the street. But of course, he can't raise any revenue by taxing the tube lines but of course, he can tax people who can't afford it and this is all about him raising £200 million.

"It's got nothing to do with air quality because his own survey said that the impact will be negligible."

"He actually wrote to me in 2021 saying he had no plans to roll out the extension of ULEZ to the outer London boroughs and he said a blanket approach was not the way to do it. That's what he said in 2021. And now, two years later, look where we are."

Mr Prince also said he believed "some people are beginning to realise that [Khan's] power is unfettered."

"Even though we have the Assembly and we are able to, on rare occasions, overrule him, it's only when we have a two thirds majority.

"As nearly half the assembly are Labour we're never ever going to have a situation where we have a two thirds majority to stop the madness of Sadig Khan."

£381m boost for electric vehicle charging as Chancellor opens West Midlands charging hub

- £381 million funding scheme to deliver thousands of public charge points across the country opens for applications.
- Chancellor opens UK's largest electric vehicle charging site in Birmingham in major boost to Britain's electric charging infrastructure.
- EV drivers in the West Midlands set to benefit from the 180 charge point hub, becoming the largest electric vehicle charging site in the UK.

A new electric vehicle charging hub – big enough to charge 180 cars simultaneously – has been opened by the Chancellor Jeremy Hunt in Birmingham today (Thursday 7 September). It marks a significant boost for Britain's electric car charging network, becoming the largest electric vehicle charging site in the UK.

The Gigahub™, located at the city's NEC Campus, is the largest-ever private investment in a UK electric vehicle project to date. The project has been developed by a three-way collaboration between the NEC, EV Network and bp pulse, and is now operated by bp pulse.

It is funded by a record £8 million from its investment partner, Zood Infrastructure Limited. The site will provide 30 super-fast, 300kw DC charging bays and a further 150, 7KW a/c charging bays - one of the largest amounts of super-fast chargers in one location in the UK.

The site is strategically positioned to become a major transport hub for the future – located in the heart of the UK motorway network, including the M42, M46 and A45 and the new HS2 interchange station.

The site supports the Government's electric vehicle infrastructure strategy and commitment to decarbonising transport, backed with more than £2 billion to support the transition to zero emission vehicles including accelerating the rollout of chargepoint infrastructure.

As part of that, Government and industry have so far supported the installation of over 45,500 publicly available electric vehicle charging devices, including more than 8,600 rapid devices.

The public charging network is growing quickly - public charging devices have more than tripled in four years from 10,300 devices in January 2019 to over 45,500 in August 2023.

The number of public chargepoints rose by 38% over the last year, and as a recent report from the National Infrastructure Commission points out, if charge point deployment grows at around 30% per year the 300,000 expectation will be met.

Today the Chancellor has also announced that several local authorities across England can apply for the first round of the Government's £343 million Local Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (LEVI) Capital Fund, with the West Midlands Combined Authority among the authorities eligible to apply this year.

The LEVI fund will ensure the transition to electric vehicles takes place in every part of the country by supporting tens of thousands of local chargepoints, especially for those without access to off-street parking.

Local authorities will receive LEVI funding in two groups, with the first able to apply for their allocated funding from today, to be distributed this financial year. The second group can apply for their funding next financial year.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Jeremy Hunt, said:

"This is the biggest private investment in electric charging in the UK and is a huge vote of confidence in Britain's role as a leader in green industries.

"The ground-breaking site will be a major transport hub for the future and marks a significant step in our rollout of electric vehicle charging infrastructure across the country".

Decarbonisation Minister Jesse Norman said:

"Electric vehicles will play a crucial role in helping the UK to decarbonise transport and reach net zero."

"Today's measures will deliver tens of thousands of chargepoints across the country, boosting the economy and creating skilled jobs."

Paul Thandi CBE, DL Chairman of NEC Group, said:

"We are proud to contribute to the UK Government's Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Strategy. Working in collaboration with EVN and bp pulse, the opening of our EV charging hub provides NEC Campus customers, commuters, and those working for local regional or national businesses, a reliable and convenient way to recharge and support a lower carbon travel future.

"This strategic collaboration and initiative strengthen our destination offer, demonstrate our commitment to reducing the impact our business practices and our Masterplan credentials have on the environment, and ultimately supports a reduction in carbon emissions."

Alongside this, UK Research and Innovation has announced that Innovate UK has awarded £5.8m of funding to 12 projects through the Driving the Electric Revolution Challenge Fund.

Winning projects include work on best practice in automation and robotics to produce EV chargers, and the scale-up of the assembly manufacturing processes for a rare earth-free permanent magnet generator – allowing us to produce electric machines without using rare earth elements.

Whilst he was in the region, the Chancellor also convened a roundtable with green industries SMEs based in and around the West-Midlands, including leading green electric vehicle, energy and manufacturing companies as part of his ongoing engagement with his five key growth sectors: life sciences, advanced manufacturing, green industries, digital and technology and creative industries.

THE CHANCELLOR Jeremy Hunt is confident that the plan to halve inflation this year is working and that pressure on household budgets will begin to ease.

Ahead of Parliament returning on Monday 3 September, the Chancellor recognised that household budgets are still feeling stretched, and has impressed the need to stick to the plan to halve inflation as the best way to help ease the pressure. Despite the Bank of England expecting a rise of inflation to 7.1 percent in figures released this month, forecasts still expect it will fall to around five percent at the end of the year.

It comes as the UK's growth figures have been substantially upgraded by the ONS, showing the UK economy recovered from the pandemic far more rapidly than previously thought, returning to its pre-pandemic size almost two years ago. The revision proves the resilience of the UK economy, which has already grown faster than Germany, Italy, Japan and France since 2010. The UK recovered from the pandemic faster than any country in Europe and only behind Canada and the US in the G7, and is second only to France for foreign investment.

The government will build on this momentum in the coming months, with the PM travelling to India to cement his already-strong relations with G20 allies, hosting the international Artificial Intelligence Summit to pioneer investment in AI and the Trade Secretary pursuing trade talks with Gulf Cooperation Council economies.

Over the summer, inflation fell to 6.8 percent, GDP figures showed the economy grew by 0.5 percent in June – beating forecasts, and business confidence in the UK soared to an 18-month high.

It comes as the government continues to drive economic growth, establishing 12 investment zones across the country to support growth industries, with the first investment zone in South Yorkshire already securing more than £80 million of private investment – helping to create 8,000 jobs by 2030. We are also investing billions in freeports and transport to boost connectivity across the country, such as the Teesside Freeport, which is bringing millions of pounds of new investment into the area, creating 40,000 jobs. And we have introduced full expensing for businesses to drive investment in the UK, equivalent to a £27bn tax cut.

The government has already taken decisive action to limit inflation by supporting households with the cost of living, the Energy Price Guarantee and by extending the cut to fuel duty. The Chancellor has also avoided inflationary spending, including by asking departments to fund public sector pay rises from existing budgets.

The Chancellor said:

"As we move into autumn, I know family budgets are still stretched, but inflation is coming down and now is the time to see the job through. We are on track to halve inflation this year and by sticking to our plan we will ease the pressure on families and businesses alike.

"And it should be no surprise, despite the doubting from some, latest figures show we have bounced back better than many other G7 economies and are one of the most attractive countries in the world to invest.

"This government is unlocking the UK's potential – attracting more investment, creating new jobs and growing the economy."


With progress made on the PM's priorities to halve inflation and grow the economy, the Chancellor is working with the public sector to improve productivity to ease the pressure on the public purse and keep taxes low for working families.

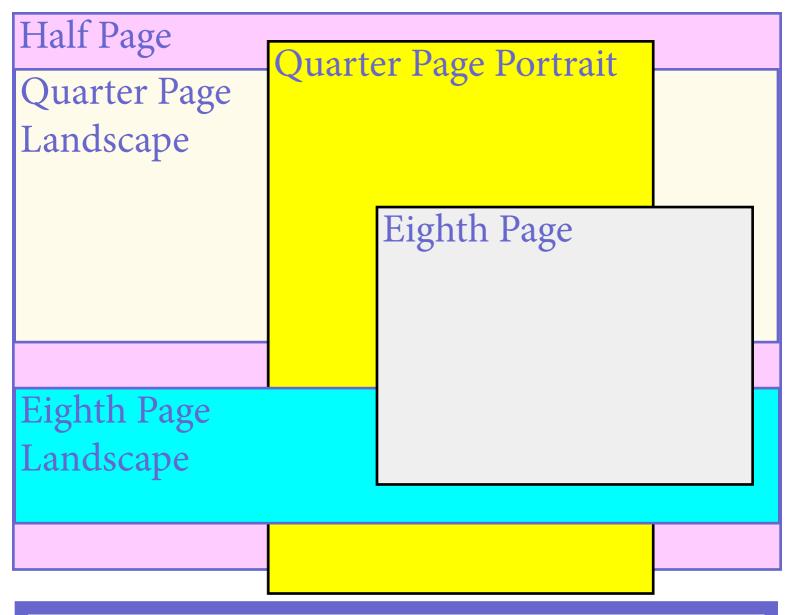
He will commission departments to provide up to date analysis of the time frontline staff are spending on administration and non-core work, and for plans to significantly reduce it as part of the Public Sector productivity programme.

Keeping spending under control is also important to keep interest rates down. External evidence suggests from the OBR and IMF that £25 billion of additional borrowing could push up interest rates by as much as 0.5%, reinforcing the need to carefully manage public sector spending.



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
