Church Street Food Hall

Many of us will have strolled down Church Street and seen the reincarnation of the former bookshop. Is it a wine shop? Is it a delicatessen? Is it a café? Or is it a restaurant? Actually it is all of the above, and more!



It is described by owner Colette Chesters as ‘your farm shop and country café right in the heart of Twickenham’ and that sums it up well. Carefully sourced produce - British and local where possible - fill the shelves and fridges, as well as a great selection of wines, from Borough Wines in Borough Market. Colette, a trained chef, qualified barrister (and pretty good barista too as the coffee there is delicious) was a finalist in Masterchef Live at Olympia a year or two ago, and prepares and serves much of the food herself.

The Twickers Foodie ventured in this week for a spot of brunch – and jolly good it was too.



A plate of home baked gammon, served with fried eggs and bubble'n' squeak at £7.95 was accompanied by Colette's homemade Piccalilli – and by jove it was tasty! The TF's other half had the ‘All Day Full English’, £8.95, which comprised fried egg, delicious herby, meaty sausages, thick rashers of back bacon, tomato and home made baked beans, served with a couple of slices of toast and a selection of artisan and



homemade preserves. It was a generous and substantial brunch and very tasty.

While you await your freshly cooked food, take time to browse the gastronomic paradise that Colette has created. Truffle oils, specialist mayonnaises, chutneys, teas, coffees, biscuits, seasonings, gluten free products, cheeses, charcuterie, chocolates (some made in Twickenham) and great wines, are all on display.

Have your say - Bridging the divide

The Radnor Bridge proposal continues to gather momentum. Perhaps encouraged in part by the planned redevelopment of the Ham Close area.

This much needed housing improvement will see the number of homes in that area grow from the current 192 housing units to a planned 425, in part through the development of new modern and better equipped six story buildings. In association with Richmond Housing Partnership (RHP) this development will form part of Richmond Council's Uplift programme, which seeks to regenerate the areas of Whitton, Hampton North, Barnes, Mortlake, Ham and Hampton Hill.

The planning committee has promised to adhere to five key principles;

1. Any resident of Ham Close wishing to remain in the community will be able to do so.
2. Retain and enhance green space.
3. Create a heart to Ham Close and Ham, retain and support a village feel.
4. Better integrate Ham Close.
5. Improve community facilities. For instance by co-locating the youth centre, clinic and library.

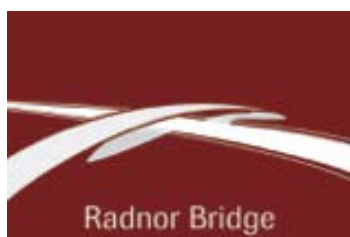
Traffic and Transport is bound to be an important consideration for the development. And therefore, should the redevelopment go ahead, the developers have promised to bring about improvements to cycle routes as part of their plans.

Obviously Radnor Bridge should be considered essential to delivering this plan. After all, it will provide the necessary strategic solution to serve at least four of the uplift zones (Whitton, Hampton North, Ham and Hampton Hill), while connecting two halves of the borough. And it will help deliver on #2 and #4 of the key principles above and also contribute much to the village requirements outlined in #2.



There is an alternative idea, called The Quiet Way, which proposes using the Teddington Lock bridge. Nothing new there then!

Radnor Bridge is the 'big idea' the borough needs to underpin all its plans for the future. This is essentially because only Radnor Bridge will deliver the improved cycling infrastructure the borough is crying out. And at the same time it will gift a powerful legacy to future generations. The increasing population size and need for improved access that comes with this means the Borough can no longer ignore this proposal.

Have your say - Sky's the Limit or Pie in the Sky?

For the benefit of anyone who missed the 'Sky's the Limit' campaign launched last week by NATS (the partly privatised air navigation service), we are led to believe that the UK airspace is facing gridlock because the projected number of flights per year could be 3 million by 2030. But don't worry folks, the problem can be solved by airspace modernisation or the Future Airspace Strategy (FAS). By designing new routes with steeper climbs and descents, and aircraft flying routes with greater accuracy (i.e. concentrated flight paths), NATS will be able to pack in more and more flights with a miraculous reduction in the number of people impacted by noise. There will also be the possibility of multiple routes to distribute noise.

Who knew? The solution to the problems of noise and air pollution is to cram more and more planes into streamlined superhighways and, of course, NATS gets paid by airlines for air traffic services... kerching! Under this divide and rule approach, NATS keeps very quiet about the impact on those unfortunate enough to live under the concentrated routes whose lives and communities will be blighted.

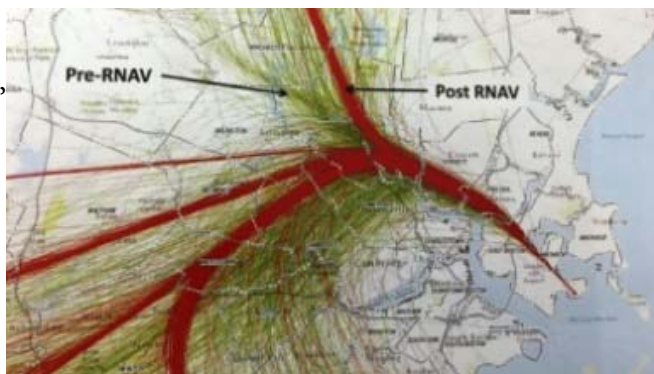
So, how's it going elsewhere?

Gatwick Airport In 2014, changes to flight paths were made as part of airspace modernisation. Some residents were so unhappy they took the Government to court over the changes and Gatwick Area Conservation Campaign wrote to MPs asking for a change in the law, to provide compensation to residents where they have been adversely affected by new flight paths. The Land Compensation Act 1973 provides compensation for people whose houses are devalued (according to a surveyor's report) by the building of a new runway but not by new flight paths based on existing runways.

Frankfurt Airport In 2011, a 4th runway was opened adding new flightpaths and making changes to existing ones. Immediately people began protesting as the noise stopped them sleeping, prevented them enjoying their gardens, and their homes lost value - some by up to 40%. Every Monday evening for the last four years, between 600 and 3000 residents march through Terminal 1, banging and chanting.

USA Airspace modernisation and concentrated flight paths introduced at Boston, Charlotte, Chicago, New York, Phoenix, San Diego, San Francisco, Seattle and Washington DC have resulted in lower, louder planes and many unhappy residents.

Heathrow The FAS has now been delayed while a new airspace and noise policy is developed. Aviation companies are trying to panic the Government by insisting time is running out. This is nonsense. The Government needs to stop, take stock and remember that its legally binding emissions commitments mean that aviation demand must be managed rather than increased.

There is considerable evidence that aircraft noise affects cardiovascular health, mental health and impacts children's learning. What sort of world do we live in when children in schools round Heathrow must shelter in earthquake huts in their playgrounds, to avoid the deafening roar of aircraft? The demand of frequent flyers for more choice and cheaper flights cannot be justified at the expense of our right to breathe clean air and to sleep undisturbed by aircraft noise.

UK CAT KILLER

Many of you will now hopefully be aware of the animal serial killer that is mutilating cats, pet rabbits and foxes. The killer was initially nicknamed the Croydon Cat Killer where most of the attacks occurred. Following publicity, people came forward to report more victims whose injuries matched the MO and it wasn't long before the killer became known as the M25 cat killer. Ever widening his reign of terror and following attacks in Maidstone, Brighton, St. Albans, Northamptonshire, Birmingham, Manchester and Liverpool, he is now referred to as the "UK Cat Killer". (I can say 'he' as Police have evidence to believe this is the work of one man). The killer has also struck in Richmond on Thames, Kingston on Thames (twice) and very recently for a suspected third time in Feltham. If you live in Greater London, you are currently living in a high risk area for these killings.

South Norwood Animal Rescue & Liberty (SNARL) is a small animal rescue run by Boudicca Rising and Tony Jenkins in South London and it is thanks to them that this has become a criminal investigation, with Police fearing that someone who enjoys mutilating and displaying animals could go on to prey on humans.

The couple are working alongside the police and the RSPCA to catch the "UK Cat Killer". There are currently 31 cases confirmed by post mortem, with around 90 since Feb 2016 which bear the hallmarks of what is believed (through forensic evidence) to be the same killer - decapitations/ removal of tail/ removal of paws/ any combination of these. The killer returns and displays the bodies or body parts close to where they were taken, or sometimes in very public places such as playgrounds or outside schools.

If you see anyone behaving oddly around cats, foxes or birds they are asked to call this into police via 101 with a full description of the person and what they are doing, and quote Operation Takahe in the call. Where possible get vehicle registration details. Please then send us the police or CAD reference number.

If you see anyone catching a cat, kidnapping a cat or fox or bird, hurting, kicking, standing on or otherwise causing harm to a cat or fox or bird in the same geographical area, that same advice applies except that's a 999 call. If you have any information about who might be committing these offences, please call the team running Operation Takahe on 0208 6490216

If you find a body which bear the injuries listed or body parts (heads, legs, paws or tails) please call SNARL on 07961 030064 or 07957 830490 immediately. Please stay with the body/parts if you can and prevent any council or waste services from touching or removing it and anyone from photographing it. Vital forensic evidence and has been lost as a result of Council waste services disposing of bodies.

The advice to cat owners living in the greater London area is to keep their cats indoors as much as they can and let them out only during the day when they can be supervised and to definitely keep them in at night.

It is likely to be through more public awareness and vigilance that this killer will be caught, so please share their pinned post and poster as widely as possible.
