#### Rugby at Twickenham Stadium

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#### Local Picture Postcard Column - Part 276 Francis Francis Angling Club By Alan Winter

Francis Francis (1822–1886) was a well-known English writer on angling who twenty years after his death had a fishing club named after him in Twickenham that prospered for 117 years until it finally closed last year.

Francis devoted his life to angling – he was angling editor of The Field; a passionate supporter and protector of the Thames; helped bring the brown trout to Australasia; landed a foul-hooked 6 pound barbel on a single (horse) hair; and was a writer of novels, sailing and the 1867 classic A Book on Angling.

Francis Francis lived in Twickenham from 1855 until his death in 1886, and, "all his best work was done here. With his home and paddock stretching down to the River Crane, which flows into the Thames just below Richmond Half Tide Barrier and Lock, he will always be associated with Twickenham." He died in his chair on 24 December



1886. He had long lived at Twickenham and was buried in Twickenham Cemetery.



The following quotation appears below his name on his gravestone: "And angle on, and beg to have A quiet passage to a welcome grave."

These are the closing lines to the poem The Angler's Wish by English writer Izaak Walton. A white marble mural monument to Francis was also erected in the North Aisle of Winchester Cathedral by his friends, showing a medallion-portrait and another quotation by Walton.

The Francis Francis angling club was founded in 1906; based in

the Queens Head (subsequently re-named as the Barmy Arms) at Twickenham. From its very beginnings it was a punt fishing club. Outings took place exclusively on the tidal Thames between Richmond and Teddington every Sunday during the coarse fishing season. Originally members hired the punts they fished from but over a period of time, the club built up their own small fleet of 8 punts. Typically these punts were 24 feet long and 4 feet wide.

Our final two postcards today show members of the club at the Barmy Arms with their catches. These photos were taken after the last war and before the 1980's.



Bob Fentiman is on the extreme left of the first one and Eric Dadswell is on the extreme right of the final image. Both well-known local residents. In fact, I was at school with their sons and Eric Dadswell took me to Fulham to watch my first football match at Craven Cottage in the early 60's. (Although I have always been a Brentford supporter as many of you know!). These are the only chaps I have identified so far but feel free to let me know the names of anyone else you

might recognise and their positions in the photos.

Sadly, the club called time on its activities last year in 2023 unless anyone knows differently.

The Borough of Twickenham Local History Society (BOTLHS) issued a booklet on Francis Francis as Paper Number 65 in 1991. This is a detailed and interesting account of Francis Francis's association with Twickenham as well as a summary of his whole life. Probably still available from the BOTLHS website or the Twickenham Museum.

#### Twickenham's oldest car at the London to Brighton Veteran Car Run 2024

Earlier this month the annual event from Hyde Park in London to Madeira Drive on Brighton's seafront took place, as it has almost every year since 1927. The Run is in fact a reenactment of the 'Emancipation Run' that took place in November 1896... to celebrate the repeal of the draconian restrictions placed on driving in Britain by the Locomotives Act. All vehicles taking part must have been built in or before 1905 and over 400 took part again this year.

Only one Twickenham built car took part this year, SX13, a 1900 New Orleans Voiturette. As many as four have participated in the event in recent years. SX13 was built at the Orleans Works in King Street, Twickenham. It is in fact Twickenham's oldest car,





owned by Paul Edwards. Paul's father bought the car as a collection of pieces for £35 in the 1950s. He finally completed the rebuilding project, with Paul's help, in time for the 2000 London to Brighton run. Like her brothers before her, Paul's daughter Imogen drove SX13 this year in her first year of driving. However, she had to drive the car on 'L' plates, as she'd only just turned 17! There was considerable press interest at Hyde Park, as she is almost certainly the youngest women ever to have taken part, in the event's history.


Few people in Twickenham were aware that Twickenham had ever had a motor industry, let

alone a pioneering role at the earliest days of motoring, until the publication of my book earlier this year. 'Twickenham Motorcars: A local history of motor manufacturing', tells the previously untold

story of Twickenham's motor industry that lasted for 25 years. Not just cars, but motorcycles, buses, commercial vehicle and later, successful racing cars were manufactured.

An even more surprising revelation, the evidence uncovered that the River Thames in Twickenham can lav claim to be the true birthplace of the British Motor industry. Before cars were freely allowed to use Britain's roads, Daimler motorboats were in production on Eel Pie Island.

### Finance, Policy, and Resources Committee

The Finance, Policy, and Resources Committee convened on November 14<sup>th</sup>, unveiling a mix of forwardlooking initiatives and persistent governance shortcomings. Chaired by Councillor Baldwin, who stood in for the Council Leader, the meeting painted a picture of a council grappling with modernisation while stumbling over inefficiencies and accountability concerns.

**Change Programme:** The council's flagship initiative, which aims to deliver £4–6 million in annual savings while modernising operations, dominated discussions. Yet, the presentation offered scant evidence of tangible progress. With £1.3 million of the £3 million allocated budget already spent, the programme's lack of defined deliverables and performance metrics drew sharp criticism from Councillor Bennett, who questioned whether public funds were being judiciously used.

Despite its ambition to make the council a "great employer" and embrace digital innovation, the initiative risks being seen as empty rhetoric. Burdened by escalating costs and uneven services, residents may need help to see the promised benefits materialise. Frustrations among committee members over their limited input into the programme underscored deeper concerns about the Shared Staffing Agreement—now rebranded as the *Richmond & Wandsworth Better Service Partnership*.

**CCTV Strategy:** The committee reviewed the council's CCTV strategy for 2024–29, despite claims that all the cameras had correct signage. When checking the cameras, most lacked legally required signage. This lapse undermines the council's commitment to lawful practices and shows how easily officers can mislead councillors. While software upgrades and collaboration with law enforcement are steps forward, such fundamental errors weaken public confidence in the council's capabilities.

Townmead Recycling Centre: The prolonged challenges at Townmead Recycling Centre spotlight the council's weak governance. Following a 2021 fire, the site remains uninsured due to non-compliance with fire safety standards. The planned £800,000 fire suppression system, funded from waste reserves, highlights delayed action that compromised safety and exposed taxpayers to significant financial risk.

**Council Tax Reduction Scheme:** Proposed updates to the Council Tax Reduction Scheme aim to align with Universal Credit's complexities, yet the admission that 355 residents will face increased costs raises significant concerns. While shifting to a banded system may streamline administration, it risks disadvantaging vulnerable households with fluctuating incomes, raising broader ethical questions about whether the LibDems governs for everyone or just the middle classes.

**Treasury Management:** In contrast, the council's treasury management was more positive. A projected £2 million boost in income is attributed to favourable bank rates and delays in council capital projects, meaning more funds were on deposit.

**Conclusion:** The meeting starkly illustrated how committee chairs have assumed roles resembling executive members, whilst bypassing the usual checks and balances of scrutiny for such roles. While some initiatives reflect strategic leadership, others betray systemic inefficiencies and insufficient oversight. Residents deserve more than ambitious declarations-they need a council capable of delivering tangible results while adhering to legal and ethical standards.

### Twickers Foodie - By Alison Jee

#### The Mayfair Chippy (Well, Knightsbridge Actually)

I never thought we'd find ourselves travelling all the way up to Knightsbridge for fish and chips, but we did, and it was really fabulous. The **Mayfair Chippy** is an award-winning, quintessentially British restaurant, that's perfected classic fish and chips and a lot of other dishes too. It's just opened a second restaurant, this time in Knightsbridge and we went along to see what all the fuss was about. Reader, this place takes fish and chips to a new level.

Spread across two floors, The Mayfair Chippy Knightsbridge is a larger extension of the flagship Mayfair site, which has become known for its round-the-block queues. The Knightsbridge restaurant is a great pit stop for museum tours or Christmas shopping sprees - as Harrods is but a stone's throw away. It's a luxury fast-casual restaurant with an emphasis on great fish, chips, shellfish & British classic dishes.

The decor is stylish with lots of wood and tiled tables, yet despite the hard surfaces, the tables are well spaced out so noise isn't a problem. There is



a Gin Bar, which, I noticed, stocks not just a few, but 15 different gins! Needless to say I couldn't resist a Negroni and my husband enjoyed a zero alcohol beer.

We started with a portion of Coronation Chicken Fritters and another of Battered King Prawns. The fritters were very tasty and served with a mango and onion chutney. There were three of them and, with a side salad, would make a perfect light lunch. The prawns...what can I say? I think the batter at The Mayfair Chippy is the lightest, non greasy, tastiest, fluffiest batter I've ever tasted. There were four fat prawns, piping hot and served with some salad leaves and a classic cocktail sauce.



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For mains, my husband opted for classic fried cod with chips, mushy peas, tartar & chip shop curry sauce. (gluten free and alcohol free batter is available). The portion was incredibly generous and our lovely server, Kevin, had suggested we try the loaded chips (with truffle and Berkswell cheese no less), which, although delicious, were in fact, surplus to requirements.

I'd been tempted by the Lobster & Crayfish Roll, which I'd seen being served at a nearby table, so opted for that, plus a portion of Mayfair Slaw. My 'roll' was in fact a giant slice of brioche, split and toasted, packed with lobster, Marie Rose sauce, pickles and garlic mayonnaise, and served with chips.



Again, the batter was amazing and the fish cooked perfectly. The mushy peas were classic style and the tartar sauce homemade. It's served in a paper lined metal basket, which looked impressive, but wasn't that easy to negotiate without having soggy paper that would allow sauces to soak through the basket.

My roll was stupendous, but there was a lot of brioche and a generous portion of piping hot chips, so I felt rather remorseful not being able to manage it all. The slaw was lovely -American style, without any mayonnaise, just a light oil and vinegar dressing.

I enjoyed a glass of English wine: Balfour Leslie's Sparkling rosé, a new one to me and it paired well with my main.

My husband surprised me by having enough room to enjoy a generous portion of Apple & Blackberry Crumble with custard and hazelnuts, which was declared fabulous. I chose a selection of Hackney Gelato, which was the perfect end to a really good meal.

And if you don't eat fish, there are lots of meaty and plant based alternatives.

### BOORV TRAP NSFW

by Lucy Kirkwood Teddington Theatre Club at Hampton Hill Theatre

The comedy *NSFW* opens in the offices of *Doghouse*, an unsubtly named "lads mag". Aidan, the magazine's slimy grimy editor, is keen to keep a sharp focus on the magazine's core offering - boobs, boobs and more boobs. Ian Kinane, as Aidan, radiates calm while laying down the rules, and possibly more, in the office. Compelling, Kinane is a tiger, gentle and suave but step on his toes and ...

Aidan's assistant, Charlotte, is played by Chloe Hunkin, a mischievous twinkle in her eyes as her character knowingly does what has to be done to pay the rent,



while dealing with "a few tits along the way". Richard Scott gives a rumbustious performance as trustafarian Rupert, nice-but-dim and filthy rich. Danny Maurice gives a very strong performance as Aidan's third assistant Sam, the play's closest thing to a moral compass.

Day-to-day life at *Doghouse* comes off the rails when Rupert discovers that Carrie Bradshaw, the winner of the magazine's "local lovelies" competition, is only fourteen years old. Aidan vows *someone* has made a mistake and *someone* will have to pay.



But her father has come across Carrie's picture, and intends to destroy the man who has ruined his daughter. Played powerfully by Graham Schafer, the twitchily repellent Bradshaw confronts Aidan. It's strong stuff, sharply contrasting with earlier banter. Their journey is full of twists as they reach an outcome that works – more or less – for both of them.

Then, in the second act we discover Charlotte and Sam have gone to work for *Electra*, a women's magazine for "leaders, thinkers, dreamers, shoppers", *especially* shoppers. As Miranda, *Electra*'s mordant, flirtatious and self-loathing editor, a sublimely funny Mia Skytte gets

humour out of every line. Maurice gives a sympathetic and honest portrayal of Sam's temptations of nature, while Scott's necessarily silent contribution to the second act is as memorable as it is startling.

With *OnlyFans*, AI and face-swap technology facilitating fantasies and revenge porn, the world of *Doghouse* seems a long time ago. But if Kirkwood's play has lost its relevance, it hasn't lost its bite. This first class production of *NSFW* is a sublimely funny look at what brought us to where we are today. It marks a very strong TTC debut for Matt Dennis its talented young director.

## HAZZARD WARNING

Fast

by Kate Barton and Stephen Bennett Stephen Leslie Productions, Upstairs at the Gatehouse, Highgate

Back in the early 1900's 'Dr' Linda Hazzard's seminars, newspaper adverts and books perhaps offered society a glimpse of what we now know as celebrity influencers, protein shake peddlers and diet pill pushers.

*Fast* is the true story of a complex and utterly driven woman, whose promotion of her radical fasting cure gripped the press and divided a nation. But this is a complex scenario. Hazzard was vilified as an interfering woman in a man's world, and in the play, she is quick to fight her corner on this front. John Harvey Kellogg, a contemporary of Hazzard also lost patients but was not scrutinized by the press in the same way.

We meet Hazzard giving a seminar. She speaks directly to us, making assumptions about our health issues and offering us alternative suggestions to improve our wellbeing. She is clever, charismatic and captivating. We then meet Dora and Claire, two English sisters who travel to Hazzard's sanatorium to undergo a six-week fasting treatment. All seems perfectly innocent, but as the plot unfolds, their stay at 'Starvation Heights' takes a turn for the worse and we start to see a different side to the 'doctor'.

The period costumes from production designer Junis Olmscheid are hugely impressive, but the set leaves much to the imagination. Maia von Malaisé is convincing as Claire, but despite her rapid decline under Hazzard's care, appears remarkably healthy for someone in her final throws of life. There are really strong performances from Imogen Grey as Dora and Jermaine Dominique as the inquisitive and persistent journalist Horace Cayton, but unarguably this production is lit up by the breath-taking portrayal of Linda Hazzard from the immensely talented Sarah Thom. We are completely taken in, manipulated and at times, made to feel on edge in this fascinating psychological thriller.

The electric battle between Hazzard and Cayton is well worth a night out at the theatre.

Was Hazzard a villain or an inspiration to woman wanting to work in the health sector? That's for you to decide and *Fast* will certainly make you think.

## BUCK TROW THE DEAD

### Maria de Rudenz

by Gaetano Donizetti libretto by Salvadore Cammarano Gothic Opera at Battersea Arts Centre

Donizetti's *Maria de Rudenz* has never been performed in the UK before. There are no knock-out arias, or "big" numbers, but this splendid performance proves that the piece is well worth dragging from the vaults of operatic obscurity.

Some plot motifs are similar to Verdi's *Il Trovatore*. The marriage is over before the wedding night; the baritone and tenor are romantic rivals and brothers; the convent is the only alternative to marriage with your beloved. But this dish has a very different flavour. The soprano is as much focussed on revenge as regaining her lover, and her love-hate relationship is with the baritone rather than the tenor.

The plot is gruesome (only the baritone survives to the end), but the emotions that it depicts are all very real: romantic rapture, the pain of rejection, fury, and the desire for vengeance. Maria is stabbed by Corrado, but she survives to reappear and kill his bride, after which she reopens her wounds and dies (Wagner's Tristan wasn't the first to kill himself this way.)

Lysanne Van Overbeek's direction is straightforward and serious, but always effective. She has an intuitive understanding of when the focus needs to be on the

music. Aided by the venue's Victorian grandeur, Nate Gibson's designs conjure up a Gothic atmosphere with just drapes, flowers, candles, and a portrait of a dominating *pater familias* with daughter, although Maria's Miss Havisham look is not very flattering.

Lorna McLean's Maria is marvellously incisive in a challenging part and undaunted by having to climb into the vocal stratosphere. Baritone Kieran Rayner as Corrado, the love rat who abandons Maria to marry her cousin Mathilde, has plenty of vocal charm. Davide Basso provides golden tone, lots of heft, and a fine musical intelligence as Enrico, as well as giving a perfect refutation of nominative determinism, as this is a tenor part.

Under conductor Anna Castro Grinstein, Leon Haxby's effective arrangement for four strings, clarinet, and organ no doubt make things easier for these outstandingly fine singers, in their musically strong and involving performance.

The next operatic exhumation is eagerly awaited.

## BEAEBIEN WINILER?

Abigail's Party by Mike Leigh Northern Stage co-production at the Rose Theatre, Kingston

The time-tested *Abigail's Party* is very much a comedy of manners, lampooning the behaviour of the suburban middle-classes through the prism of a cocktail party, where five contrasting and mismatched characters are thrown together.

Of all the grotesque characters, the must surely be the hostess, Beverley. As the evening progresses and many

drinks are consumed, the uneasy small talk is replaced by darker conversations, awkward social interactions, and the exposure of frustrations and insecurities. With Beverley's flirtations, the tensions rise and the evening descends into chaos.

> The self-centred Beverley is played with a bubbly charm by Laura Rogers, creating a character who is the epitome of the monster suburban housewife. An ex-beauty consultant, this is a woman who is a social climber (but should Beaujolais be in the fridge). She is a woman who dreams of romance, bored rigid with her socially awkward husband, Laurence. Leander Deeny depicts a world-weary man who recognises the finer things in life, such as art and literature, but without understanding them. A character who probably

loves his car more than his wife, this is a well observed performance capturing the frustrations of his marriage to Beverley.

Anna Yates' open set not only shows all the rooms, including the loo, but their car, a green mini of the period. Beverley's fully-fitted kitchen is full of newfangled gadgets and there are all the trappings of their pretentious lifestyle, white shaq carpet like a layer of snow, zebra print suite, Bacardi, and cheese and pineapple on sticks.


Their guests, newbies Angela and Tony, are played by Joe Blakemore and Chaya Gupta, she a chirpy but tactless nurse, he short of conversation, but the target of Beverley's flirtation. The third quest is another neighbour, Susan, played by Amy Rockson. We never see Abigail her daughter, who is holding a noisy party next door.

Beverley may be marooned forever in the 1970's, but director Jack Bradfield brings a renewed sense of energy with a dynamic cast who accurately capture the wit and foibles of the characters. This refreshing revival of Abigail's Party is still as funny, still as tragic and still as memorable as ever.

#### PRE-MATCH ANALYSIS

Stephen Gillett, Playmaker Stats: Set-pieces could prove decisive on Saturday



The Premier League returns this weekend after yet another international break and Brentford will have to maximise their strengths if they wish to beat Sean Dyche's Everton.

The Bees are 0-3 in their last three meetings against the Toffees and

Saturday's clash at Goodison Park is an intriguing one, as the two sides wield similar weapons.

For starters, both clubs are two of the Premier League's most skilled direct football practitioners and the battle for aerial supremacy on Saturday will be fierce.

To illustrate this point, the Bees (18) rank first in the Premier League for aerial duels won per game this season, just ahead of Everton (15.7), while the Toffees have pinged 293 accurate long balls - more than any team in the top flight - Brentford close behind them with 273.

It's important to note that both teams use their goalkeepers as literal launchpads for many of their attacks, with Jordan Pickford and Mark Flekken currently joint-top of the Premier League for long balls completed (119), and the two stoppers also topped this stat in the top flight last term.

The Bees will have prepared for Everton's tactic of spraying long balls to forward Dominic Calvert-Lewin, and the rangy target man's threat is underlined by the fact he has won more headers (47) than any player in the top tier this season.

Brentford are perhaps uniquely suited to handling 'DCL', however, given that Nathan Collins (third), Ethan Pinnock (fifth) and Sepp van den Berg (eighth) all rank in the top 10 in the Premier League for successful aerial duels in 2024/25.

Well-drilled by Thomas Frank and Sean Dyche respectively, Brentford (16 bookings) and Everton (17) currently lead the Premier League's fair play table and both sides' strict disciplinary code is highlighted by a shared reluctance to concede free-kicks.

Everton (39 per cent) may have the lowest average possession share in the Premier League this season, but only four sides in the league have given away fewer fouls than the Toffees (123) this season - but one of them is Brentford, who top this stat having only conceded a miserly 6.9 free-kicks per game on average.

Those free-kick stats hint at an acute appreciation of how important dead-balls can be and set-pieces could prove decisive on Saturday.

Brentford have rightly been lauded for their set-piece expertise in recent times (and their prowess from kickoffs this season has been readily apparent!), but Everton's dead-balls stats last season were staggering.

The second-most potent team in the top flight from free-kicks, throw-ins and corners last term, the Toffees converted 19 goals from set-pieces second only to Arsenal (20).

However, while the Gunners scored 22 per cent of their total goal tally from such situations, 48 per cent of all Everton's strikes in the 2023/24 campaign stemmed from set-pieces and Brentford will need to be at their best to thwart a Toffees' side who have already scored four of their 10 goals this term after the ball has gone dead.

Despite the clubs' common traits, Brentford fans will hope the Bees' evolution under Frank has added a few strings to their bow.

Second only to Spurs in the Premier League goal charts, Brentford have scored 16 of their 22 league goals from open play this term (only Man City have more from 'live' situations) and with Bryan Mbeumo and Yoane Wissa in red-hot form, the Bees currently possess impressive attacking potency.

This ability to cause problems from free play should stand the Bees in good stead, as should their capacity to carve out high quality chances - the Bees' 0.16 xG per shot the best average in the entire division at the moment.

Everton's troubles and persistent flirtation with the very real possibility of relegation from the Premier League continued last season.

They survived by four points in 2022, two points in 2023, and found themselves fighting it out in the bottom three on three separate occasions in 2023/24. This time around, though, it was largely down to the points deduction they were handed in November 2023 for breaching the Premier League's profit and sustainability rules.

Initially punished with a 10-point deduction - the biggest in the league's history - it was reduced to six on appeal, though a further breach saw them hit with another two-point deduction in April. Naturally, it was the overarching story of their season; survival was the sole ambition.

The second deduction in particular seemed to light a fire deep within, as the Toffees won five and drew two of their last nine games to finish with a very healthy 14-point cushion between themselves and the bottom three.

"We've had many knocks this season and I'm pleased the way the team and the staff have seen through the

challenges and delivered," said manager Sean Dyche after the final day defeat to Arsenal.

And the fixture computer seemed to have been kind to Everton when all the dates were released in June - however, they've not really taken advantage of that.

They were rock bottom of the table for the first month after defeats to Brighton, Tottenham, Bournemouth and Aston Villa. In the latter two, they led 2-0 before being beaten 3-2 on both occasions. Two weeks in a row, they were left shellshocked, which meant they lost their opening four league games for the first time in 66 years.

Taking 10 points from the seven games that have followed has helped them to 16th going into Saturday's game at Goodison Park but, with just one win at home and one win away, slipping back into the bottom three soon is not beyond the realms of possibility.

Ipswich and Southampton have recently picked up their first league wins of the season and will be desperate not to suffer immediate relegation back to the Championship. Crystal Palace and Wolves will not be happy with their respective current situations, either.

To look at it from a binary perspective, it is not necessarily a case of leaking too many goals, as only three teams in the bottom half have conceded fewer than their tally of 17 - scoring them has been much more of a struggle. Everton have netted just 10 so far, which is the joint third-lowest tally in the entirety of the top four divisions, after Crystal Palace (8) and Southampton (7).

#### IN THE DUGOUT

Sean Dyche

After a 17-year playing career ended at Northampton in 2007, Sean Dyche immediately stepped into the world of coaching by working as an under-18s coach at former club Watford, who he had played for between 2002 and 2005.

Two years later, Malky Mackay - who, incidentally, joined the Hornets as a player the summer Dyche left - was appointed manager, with Dyche promoted to become his assistant.

Over the next two seasons, the pair guided Watford to 16th and 14th-place finishes in the Championship and, in the summer of 2011, Mackay left to take over at Cardiff, which led to Dyche stepping up to take on the role on a permanent basis in his place.

He led the club to 11th in 2011/12 - their highest finish in four seasons - but the Pozzo family took over and, in a statement, said they "recognised Sean's impeccable conduct, representing the Hornets with honour and dignity at all time," before they quickly ousted him in favour of Gianfranco Zola.

Dyche was only out of work for a matter of months, though. Eddie Howe left Burnley to return to Bournemouth in October 2012 and he was installed as Howe's successor on a two-and-a-half-year contract.


However, he ended up remaining at Turf Moor for seven years more than his initial contract length, guiding the Clarets to promotion to the Premier League as runners-up in 2013/14 and as Championship winners in 2015/16. His side finished seventh in 2017/18, which saw them qualify for European football for the first time in over half a century.

In April 2022, with the threat of relegation increasing, Dyche was sacked by Burnley - who dropped into the Championship after a defeat to Newcastle United on the final day - and, in January 2023, he was appointed manager of Everton on a two-and-a-half-year contract.


The 53-year-old is the Toffees has stayed in the job for longer than his six permanent predecessors and is the longest-serving manager since Roberto Martínez, who left Goodison Park back in May 2016.



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
