



## Local Picture Postcard Column - Part 282

### **Ham House**

Well here we are in 2025. Another New Year and a time when many of us are making plans for holidays with trips abroad to see places that we have read about or seen on TV but never previously visited.


We do this to learn about the history of these places and often to visit their excellent gardens as well.

But how many of you realise that by living in the borough of Richmond upon Thames you are surrounded by parks, palaces, stately homes, rivers and gardens that are the envy of the world and attract tens of thousands of visitors from all parts each year. I can imagine that many of you who are surrounded by our local historical treasures have yet to visit at least some of them.

We can start the year by taking a look at Ham House through a few of the many postcards that have been published of it during the last 130 years or so. The first postcard was posted in 1908 and shows the front of the house that faces the river. The second pictures Ham House on a Reward Card that was given to school pupils for regular attendance and good work and the 3rd postcard this week shows the rear of Ham House from around 1929.



Ham House is a 17th-century house set in formal gardens on the bank of the River Thames in Ham. The house is unusual in retaining much of its original 17th-century interior decoration, offering a rare experience of the style of the courts of Charles I and Charles II. The original house was completed in

1610 by Thomas Vavasour, an Elizabethan courtier and Knight Marshal to James I. It was then leased, and later bought, by William Murray, a close friend and supporter of Charles I. The English Civil War saw the house and much of the estate sequestrated, but Murray's wife Catherine regained them on payment of a fine. During the Protectorate his daughter Elizabeth Murray, Countess of Dysart on her father's death in 1655, successfully navigated the prevailing anti-royalist sentiment and retained control of the estate. The house achieved its greatest period of prominence following Elizabeth's second marriage—to John Maitland, 1st Duke of Lauderdale, in 1672. The Lauderdales held important roles at the court of the restored Charles II, the Duke being a member of the Cabal ministry and holder of major positions in Scotland, while the Duchess exercised significant social and political influence. They began an ambitious program of development and embellishment at Ham. The house was almost doubled in size and equipped with private apartments for the Duke and Duchess, as well as princely accommodation suites for visitors. The house was furnished to the highest standards of courtly taste and decorated with "a lavishness which transcended even what was fitting to their exalted rank". The Lauderdales accumulated notable collections of paintings, tapestries and furniture, and redesigned the gardens and grounds to reflect their status and that of their quests.



After the Duchess's death, the property passed through the line of her descendants. Occasionally, major alterations were made to the house, such as the reconstruction undertaken by Lionel Tollemache, 4th Earl of Dysart, in the 1730s. For the most part, later generations of owners focused on the preservation of the house and its collections. The family did not retain the high position at court held by the Lauderdales under Charles II, and a strain of

family eccentricity and reserve saw the fifth Earl refuse a request from King George III to visit Ham. On the death of the 9th Earl – the last Earl to live at Ham – in 1935, the house passed to his second cousin, Lyonel; he and his son, Major (Cecil) Lyonel Tollemache, donated it to the National Trust in 1948. During the second half of the 20th century the house and gardens were opened to the public, and were extensively restored and researched. The gardens and pleasure grounds at Ham cover approximately 12 hectares (30 acres). They follow an axial plan, with avenues originally leading east, west and south from the house. The fourth, northern, side of the estate fronts the River Thames. The property has become a popular filming location for cinema and television productions, which make use of its period interiors and gardens.

The house can be reached by public transport and is located in Transport for London travel zone 4; from Richmond station the 65 bus service serves Petersham Road and the 371 bus service serves Sandy Lane. There is a free council car park north-west of the house, next to the Thames. Hammerton's Ferry, to the north-east, links to a playground between Orleans House Gallery and Marble Hill House below Twickenham's central embankment. The house is accessible to pedestrians and cyclists via the Thames Path national trail.

With nearly 300 weekly columns behind me in the Tribune I am beginning to run out of postcards of our local area that I haven't already written about. So, my search for old postcards continues. # Turing House School's admissions controversy continues

Turing House School, a free school based in Whitton, is conducting a statutory consultation on its admission policy for the 2026 academic year. Under its controversial admission arrangements, 80 per cent of places are allocated to an admissions nodal point in Somerset Gardens, Teddington and only 20 per cent from the school's Whitton location.

In 2016, the then council leader Lord True, when the Conservatives ran the council, stated the school was being allowed to select their own intake: "Schools should not be able to cherry-pick their intake. The logic of this policy is that in future we could have gated schools in deprived areas, close to local people, quite the opposite of the aims of the Government's school reforms. The school has ignored our strong view and the impassioned feedback from many local parents. I have urged the Minister to look into this as soon as possible and give hope to those who live in the Heathfield and Whitton area."

The current Liberal Democrat administration supports the school's catchment policy. The local councillor for Heathfield Ward, Cllr John Coombs, has repeatedly told local parents in Whitton that they should send their children to Twickenham School, which the local education authority has designated for them.

At the planning committee meeting, the school assured the council that it would review the admissions policy annually to ensure that children in Whitton could reasonably access the school. Members of the planning committee also stated that they felt the school would become more of a Whitton School over time. However, since receiving permission, the school

has refused to change the admissions policy, saying the Government approved the policy in its founding documents and the governors do not see a reason to change them.

Local critics have pointed out that this has resulted in a minimal Whitton catchment covering only a tiny percentage of the town's geographical area. Since opening, the school has also had a greater impact on Hospital

Bridge Road than anticipated. This is partly due to the new crossing TFL requested across the A316 and the cycle lanes still being stuck in the planning stage despite the school moving to Whitton in April 2022.

Supporters of the School say it's reasonable that Teddington Parents should have priority and that they needed an alternative to Teddington School, which they feel isn't as good as it once was. They also state that Teddington's parents first set the school up, and Whitton's parents have some access, which they would not benefit from if the school had been built elsewhere. Critics have replied that Teddington's parents have always had access to Twickenham School as an alternative. They state they should have supported both Twickenham and Hampton Academies after the fall-out over the collapse of the Learning School Trust.

The previous Liberal Democrat administration, then led by Cllr Serge Lourie, had handed the schools to the private Swedish company Kunskapsskolan in 2009 despite much local opposition. The Swedish self-directed teaching methods proved unsuccessful, leading to some abysmal academic results. Critics said that the opening of the competitor school, Turing House, was very unhelpful and had seriously undermined them to the point where both Twickenham and Hampton Academies nearly had to close and seriously delayed their recovery by several years. Despite these two schools now being rated good by Ofsted, much ill-feeling still remains in the local community, underlining how controversial the Free School programme can be and how it undermines other schools if there are not enough pupils to go around.

When schools consult on their admissions policies, anyone can object to any part of the policy, not just the proposed changes. The school's Adjudicator settles disagreements and can impose changes as they feel fit.



Jimmy Carter, 39th President from 1977 to 1981, died last week at the age of 100 and was the longest lived President of America. After only one term in office he was succeeded by Ronald Reagan. For his humanitarian work Carter was awarded The Nobel Peace Prize.

# New coffee pod recycling launched at Townmead Road

Residents can now recycle used coffee, tea and hot chocolate pods free of charge at Townmead Road Reuse and Recycling Centre.

The new service has been launched to help make coffee pod recycling as easy as possible in partnership with <u>Podback</u>, a not-for-profit recycling service created and funded by the UK's leading coffee pod systems and over 25 coffee pod brands and national retailers.

Simply collect your used coffee, tea, and hot chocolate pods at home in a reusable bag or container, keeping plastic and aluminium pods separate. When ready, take them to the <a href="Townmead Road Reuse and Recycling Centre">Townmead Road Reuse and Recycling Centre</a>.

Remember to book a slot prior to going. There's no need to remove coffee grounds. Empty the pods into the designated Podback containers for aluminium or plastic—these are clearly marked. Do not include bags or other packaging.

Plastic and aluminium pods need to be collected separately, as they are recycled at different facilities. All the pods collected by Podback are



recycled in the UK. They are shredded to remove the coffee, then the plastic and aluminium are used to create new products, including packaging, car components and building products. The coffee grounds will be treated by anaerobic digestion to create renewable energy (biogas) and soil improver.

Podback also offers free plastic and aluminium pod recycling via a Yodel drop-off service [www.podback.org/drop-off].

Additionally, residents using Costa Coffee pods can take advantage of <u>free recycling at select</u> <u>Costa Coffee stores</u>.



I always think it a shame that January has been deemed the ideal month to cut back on booze - it's by far the worst month of the year in my opinion, so the last thing one should do is cut back on one of life's enjoyments! But here are some suggestions for some alcohol alternatives if you're wanting to cut back.

If you just want to cut back, rather than cut out, your gin and tonic, **Cotswolds Dry Gin Essence** is a full strength gin designed to reduce the amount of product, and thus alcohol required in a G&T while retaining the intensity of flavour. 

Well, like it or not...here we are in 2025...this past week it has been that odd period after new year's eve but before the "regular work pattern" or school routine starts...you know what I am talking about...those days when no one even knows what day of the week it is...or whether it's morning or evening, or even what colour underpants they put on that day...it's like the disturbance in our routine causes all sorts of disturbances in our brains rendering the majority of us to be about as productive as the last overcooked Brussels sprout left in the bowl...you all know what I mean...we've all been there right (or is it just me then?)

The MAIN question I was asked all week here at Meet & Deep Newsagents (by pretty much all of my customers) was "did you have a good new years?" and it's always the same answer "yes, it was lovely, just with family and friends"...and no joke, I say this to everyone too (even when I haven't had a good one), it's just something we all say, but why? # Sleeping Beauty by Alan McHugh

Crossroads Pantomimes at the New Victoria Theatre, Woking until 5th January

Sleeping Beauty is a star-studded panto extravaganza, with a panto veteran, a 90's pop sensation and a multi-talented magician. The fairy tale of Princess Aurora, cursed by the Sorceress Carabosse and finally rescued by love's first kiss by The Prince, faces some detours. (Will Richardson's Prince is called William – no relative!)

Panto "national treasure", Christopher Biggins kicks things off as The Spirit of Dreams, floating across the sky perched atop a crescent moon, to narrate the wintery prologue from his story book. Maybe not the standard pantomime dame, but in Biggins' hilarious rendition of *If I Were Not upon the Stage*, his progressively ridiculous cross-dressed outfits more than compensate.





Faye Tozer's statuesque striding and haunting cackle paint Carabosse as the villain, but with her likable quality she shouldn't cause too many bad dreams. Indeed, she provides some light relief with Muddles, the Royal Magician when his booty call goes wrong and she feeds him lines from pop songs. It's a shame we don't hear more of Tozer's singing, but she excels in the finale by bursting into one of Steps' well known numbers which the audience can't help but dance along to.

Muddles, along with his loveable puppet pals, Sooty, Sweep and Soo, save the day, and free the King and Queen (James Paterson and Brenda Longman), despite his unrequited love for the Princess (Rhiane Drummond). As Muddles, Richard Caddell excels by providing comedy, magic illusions and puppetry, as well as directing the production! He cheats death chained in a box suspended from the ceiling, introduces Sooty's rendition of Nessun Dorma, and allows his mischievous friends

licence to soak the front rows with water pistols, while transporting the old-uns back to childhood

with the incantation, "izzy whizzy let's get busy".

The ensemble excels with high kicking acrobatic dance routines. Their beautifully intricate costumes seasonally include Frozen sky blue gowns, candy-cane red and white stripes, and Quality Street purple soldiers.

A Christmas medley interlude raises the spirit of the season to add the icing to Woking's wow Christmas cake. Sleeping Beauty is one of this year's top local pantos, one that adults and children alike will love.

# Robin Hood

The opening scene in Sherwood Forest has as much smoke and mystery and dazzling lighting as you would expect from a big panto, as the polished prologue opens this varied and colourful *Robin Hood*, directed by Joanna Read, who does full justice to its witty script.

A weekday matinée brings many school parties of various ages to the packed throng, and for the rest of the audience brings on that usual resentment. Why didn't we have school trips like that? (The youngsters are a lot better behaved than the adults at <u>Scummy Mummies</u>.)





The eponymous Robin Hood is played by Ricky Oakley, whose charisma just spills over ... and he has great a singing voice. The highly engaging Safia Bartley's fiery Marion complements Robin perfectly and is a good foil for the Sheriff of Nottingham, played by Lucy Benjamin. It is refreshing not seeing a moustache-twirling male take this role, and she works hard to make being witty, monumental, delusional, and villainous seem easy. Benjamin carries if off right to her highly unusual and sticky end.

The deceptively hapless Much is slickly played by Matt Pinches, and is a perfect foil to the colourful drag of

Peter Gordon's Nanny Fanny Annie. A messily intensive bakery scene shows their close rapport, with

Much taking the falls with boundless energy.

Verity Holt's skilled and detailed choreography is great fun. The costumes, particularly the colourful boots, are beautifully designed by Nancy Surman. The entire cast are intricately dressed, not forgetting the outstanding gold lamé in the curtain call. The set in predominate pink, and lighting designed by John Harris brings it to life. The backdrop of Nottingham, the kitchen and the woods stand out. Sherwood Forest is sinister and mysterious, enhanced by Josh Robins' sound.

The Merry Men include a strong Jacob Kohli as Lil Jon and

Tuck as a hopeless cook. The diligent ensemble provide strong support, and vibrant songs arranged by Paul Herbert are by played by musical director Andrew Linham and his band, with great gusto.

If you go down to the Surrey woods today, you're in for a big surprise, but be sure it's Guildford's Sherwood Forest.



# Match Preview: Southampton v Brentford

Analysis, team news, match officials and more. Here's everything you need to know ahead of Brentford's first away Premier League game of 2025 against Southampton on Saturday (3pm kick-off GMT) Written by Brentford Football Club

Brentford face Southampton at St Mary's Stadium on Saturday (3pm kick-off GMT), in the Bees' first away game of 2025.


The Saints will be looking for their second win of the season this weekend with Ivan Jurić now in charge, as they face a Bees side who are still searching for their first victory on the road this term.

Analysis, team news, match officials and more. Here's everything you need to know ahead of the fixture.

### Pre-match analysis

Richard Cole, Playmaker Stats: Expected Goals numbers will give Southampton hope

Brentford travel to the south coast to take on a struggling Southampton team in what could be a fifth win in a row over the Saints.



The Saints are now under new management with Ivan Jurić taking over from Russell Martin. Looking at the numbers, things do look bleak for Southampton this season and, should the Croatian coach manage to save the club from relegation, it would be a huge achievement.

Thomas Frank's side will travel to St Mary's Stadium knowing they will be facing a team who have lost seven of their nine games at home in the league this season. In those fixtures, Southampton have had just 85 shots (the lowest in the division) and fans have seen their team score just seven times (the joint-fewest goals at home alongside Everton).

Indeed, as Jurić looks to strengthen his defence, there will need to be work done at the top end of the pitch, with no Southampton player scoring more than twice in the top flight this season.

But the Saints should not be written off and the numbers show that, should Brentford take the bottom-placed team lightly, they may be punished.

Southampton may have scored just 12 times this season (the lowest in the league), but their Expected Goals (xG) show that things could have been different. In total, Southampton have an xG of 23.27, which ranks them 16th in the league - not far off 15th place Nottingham Forest (27.84xG), who are enjoying very different fortunes.

If Jurić can get his forwards firing, then they should see a drastic improvement. Cameron Archer is a threat and, considering that only four players are underperforming xG more than the forward (-2.9xG), more goals are likely to flow in the future considering his quality.

On the other end of the spectrum, midfielder Joe Aribo ranks fourth in the Premier League for xG per shot for players who have had at least 10 in total. The Nigerian is averaging 0.23xG per shot (11 efforts in total) which puts him behind only Ollie Watkins, Diogo Jota, Christopher Nkunku and Brentford's Yoane Wissa - the Bees man ranks first with 0.25xG per shot.





Another one to watch is, of course, young Tyler Dibling. Opposition defences are finding it difficult to stop the teenager, who has been fouled 35 times already this year - only seven players have drawn more fouls.

Considering that Brentford have still yet to get their first league win on the road in the 2024/25 season, Southampton may view this as a big opportunity to get back on track, something the Bees will have to be wary of.

### Scout report

Dan Long, Sky Sports: Positive mindset required for Saints' survival hopes

Southampton's latest 12-year stint in the Premier League came to an end in May 2023, when they were relegated under Rubén Sellés, and, even in spite of the fact they lost the likes of James Ward-Prowse, Tino Livramento, Roméo Lavia and Nathan Tella as a result, three wins from the first four games in the Championship gave the impression they would not be back in the second tier for long.

Then they lost four in a row and the rug of positivity was ripped from beneath them. "We want to give the fans a team to be proud of, but at the minute, we're going through a really tough moment," said under-fire boss Russell Martin after the 2-1 defeat at Middlesbrough on 23 September 2023.

Things flipped, though, almost in an instant. Over the course of the next five months, Saints went unbeaten in a club-record 25 games in all competitions. Coupled with Leicester's dramatic slip, it was almost enough to make them frontrunners for automatic promotion.

As the eventual top two – the Foxes and Ipswich - got back on track, Martin's side eventually had to settle for the play-offs, but they took it in their stride and, after an impressive semi-final second leg win over West Brom, edged past Leeds at Wembley to regain their top flight spot.

"I feel emotional and overwhelmed by the love and support I've had over the past nine or 10 months especially in the tougher times," said Martin after the play-off win. "I had to validate the board's decision and justify being handed the chance. I'm so pleased for them because it wasn't an exciting appointment."


When predictions started to get made during the off-season, Southampton were immediately installed as one of the favourites to go down.

Martin has a distinct style of play, with dominance of the ball at its heart and, in hindsight, their success this season would hinge on whether or not that could be translated against the best teams in the country.

The response was rapid. In the opener against Newcastle, they had 78 per cent possession and lost 1-0. Then, against Nottingham Forest, they had 65 per cent, and lost 1-0. Against Brentford, they had 64 per cent and lost 3-1. It was attractive and gave glimpses of promise, but the results just were not there to justify its use.

Saints had to wait until their 10th league game of the season for a win, which came when Adam Armstrong struck an 85th-minute winner at home to Everton on 2 November. They were only three points from safety at that point - just seven points separated the bottom five – so there was an element of hope in the air.

Martin had sufficient credit in the bank to see him through the next run of five games without a win. After



the November international break, they even came from behind to lead Liverpool, before Mohamed Salah's brilliance eventually shook them off. But it all came to a head on 15 December when Tottenham visited St Mary's.

With 36 seconds on the clock, James Maddison swept in the opener and with less than 15 minutes gone, Son Heung-min and Dejan Kulusevski had added a couple more. It was 5-0 at the break, with further strikes from Pape Sarr and Maddison.

The fans were leaving in their droves and many of those who had stayed started to aim their frustrations at Martin.

Little more than an hour after the final whistle, he was gone after 18 months in the job - and replaced before Christmas by former Croatia international Ivan Jurić. "I want an aggressive team and I think that fans of Southampton will like that," he said after his appointment on an 18-month contract.

His first two games, against West Ham and Crystal Palace, have resulted in another two defeats, meaning Saints are now 10 points from safety with 19 games to play. "I think we have to be positive and think positive," said Jurić after the first loss.

To have any chance of completing the great escape, staying positive has to be at the forefront of everyone's mind for the next five months.

### In the Dugout

Ivan Jurić

Ivan Jurić started his professional career at hometown club Hajduk Split in 1993 and played for the Croatian giants for four years, prior to earning a move across Europe to Sevilla, with whom he won promotion out of the Segunda Division during the 1998/99 campaign.

The midfielder spent time on loan at Albacete in 2000, before a brief spell back in Croatia with Sibenik preceded a move to Crotone in Italy. Juric had, arguably, the most successful personal period of his career at the Calabrian club, playing over 160 times and winning promotion to Serie B in 2003/04. He joined Genoa in 2006 and helped the club back to Serie A in his first season, with his performances eventually earning five senior caps for Croatia in 2009.

Juric started treading the path to a management career immediately after retiring in June 2010 and worked at Genoa, Inter Milan and Palermo, before he was handed his first head coach role by Mantova in June 2014. A year later, he re-joined Crotone and, in his second season back at the club, he masterminded promotion to Serie A for the first time ever.

Three separate spells at Genoa over the course of two-and-a-half years came next before two years at Hellas Verona and three years at Torino, the latter of whom he guided to three straight top-10 finishes in Serie A between 2021/22 and 2023/24.

After departing Torino by mutual consent in the summer, Jurić replaced Daniele De Rossi at Roma on 18 September, but he lasted less than two months in the job - having won four of his 12 games in charge - and was dismissed on 10 November, seven weeks before taking on the vacant role at Southampton - the first non-Italian club he has been associated with in almost a quarter-of-a-century.

# Milestone: COVID-19 five years ago



Five years ago on 31 December 2019, WHO's Country Office in China picked up a media statement by the Wuhan Municipal Health Commission from their website on cases of 'viral pneumonia' in Wuhan, China. In the weeks, months and years that unfolded after that, COVID-19 came to shape our lives and our world.

At WHO, we went to work immediately as the new year dawned. WHO employees activated emergency systems on 1 January 2020, and informed the world on 4 January. By 9-12 January, WHO had published its first set of comprehensive guidance for countries, and on 13 January, we brought together partners to publish the blueprint of the first SARS-CoV-2 laboratory test.



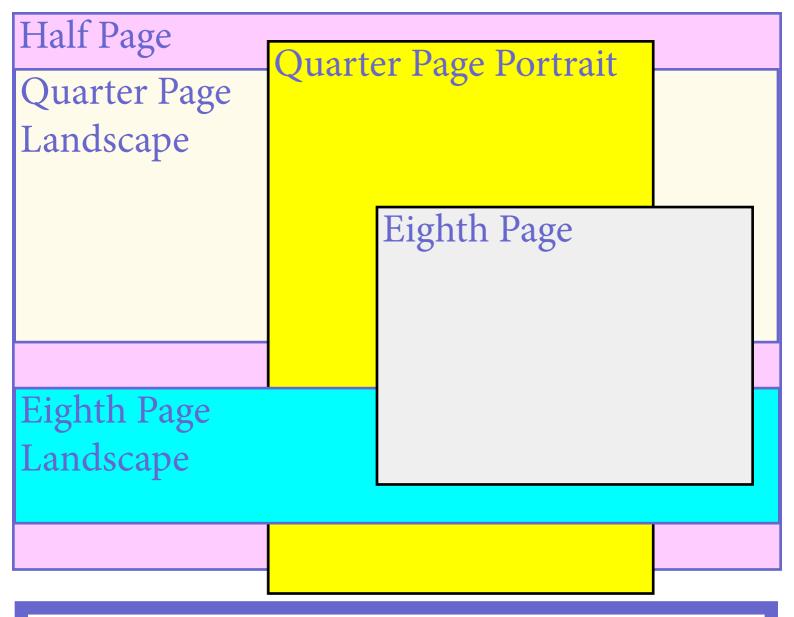
