### World Health Organization

Weekly Epidemiological 15 February

During the week of 7 to 13 February 2022, the global number of new COVID-19 cases decreased by 19% as compared to the number reported during the previous week, while the number of new deaths remained similar to that of the previous week. Across the six WHO regions, just over 16 million new cases and just under 75 000 new deaths were reported. As of 13 February 2022, over 409 million confirmed cases and over 5.8 million deaths have been reported globally

At the regional level, the Western Pacific Region reported an increase of 19% in the number of new weekly cases while all other regions reported decreases: the South-East Asia Region (37% decrease), the Region of the Americas (32% decrease), the African Region (30% decrease), the European Region (16% decrease) and the Eastern Mediterranean Region (12% decrease).

The number of new weekly deaths increased in the Eastern Mediterranean Region (38%), the Western Pacific Region (27%), the African Region (14%) and the Region of the Americas (5%), while it remained similar to that of the previous week in the European Region and decreased in the South-East Asia Region (9%)

## WHO ANNOUNCES FIRST TECHNOLOGY RECIPIENTS OF MRNA VACCINE HUB WITH STRONG SUPPORT FROM AFRICAN AND EUROPEAN PARTNERS

At the European Union - African Union summit in Brussels – 18 February - WHO Director-General, Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, announced the first six countries that will receive the technology needed to produce mRNA vaccines on the African continent. **Egypt, Kenya, Nigeria, Senegal, South Africa and Tunisia** all applied and have been selected as recipients.

The global mRNA technology transfer hub was established in 2021 to support manufacturers in low- and middle-income countries to produce their own vaccines, ensuring that they have all the necessary operating procedures and know-how to manufacture mRNA vaccines at scale and according to international standards.

The WHO mRNA technology transfer hub is part of a larger effort aimed at empowering lowand middle-income countries to produce their own vaccines, medicines and diagnostics to address health emergencies and reach universal health coverage.

## **Blue Plaques**

London's famous blue plaques link the people of the past with the buildings of the present. Now run by English Heritage, the London blue plaques scheme was started in 1866 and is the oldest of its kind in the world.

Across the capital over 950 plagues, on buildings humble and grand, honour the notable men and women who have lived or worked in them. There are 26 such plagues in Richmond-upon-Thames together with a number of unofficial plagues.

## Michael Lee

Michael Lee aged 89 died on 2 February 2022

Michael and his wife Joy came to live in Twickenham in 1998. He was an author, historian, and social scientist.

He retired from Bristol University where he had been Professor of Politics, Head of Department and Dean of the faculty of Social Science.

On coming to Twickenham he continued to teach, giving Workers Educational Association courses, for a number of years. He was also much involved in the early setting up of the Twickenham Museum.

His academic interests lay mainly in modern history and politics which led him to write his book the *Making of Modern Twickenham*, covering the twentieth century, when Twickenham became a Borough, the changes that took place as the town enlarged, the trams came, and the population grew.

It included analysis of the various plans for the Twickenham riverside, still to be resolved.

His passion for well researched and accurate facts in relation to local history and politics led him to write valuable contributions to the Richmond Local History Journal, which he edited for a number of years.

He enjoyed learning as well as teaching, was a member of Cercle Francais Richmond being a fluent French speaker. He took up Italian in his 70s.

He attended the Scientific Society as well as various discussion groups.

He liked to go rowing and to the gym where he was able to mix with people of all ages and thoroughly immerse himself in the local community.

He will be fondly remembered by his family and all who knew him.

## CLOSURE OF ROYAL PARKS

A Royal Parks spokesperson, said: "Due to the current red weather warnings for Storm Eunice, we have closed all eight Royal Parks on Friday 18 February as a precautionary measure. "The Royal Parks host more than 170,000 trees across 5,000 acres, including ancient and veteran trees that are vulnerable to high winds.

"We will monitor the forecast closely over the next 24 hours and will communicate updates via our website www.royalparks.org.uk, twitter account @theroyalparks and Facebook pages. We will reopen all parks as soon as it's safe to do so.

"The Royal Parks are: Bushy Park, The Green Park, Greenwich Park, Hyde Park, Kensington Gardens, The Regent's Park and Primrose Hill, Richmond Park and St James's Park. In addition, we've closed Victoria Tower Gardens and Brompton Cemetery."

### **Preservation of trees**

Following the recent felling of trees in a site off Hampton Road (the "backlands" behind the Prince Albert pub), the Council has shown considerable interest in the preservation of trees. This is evidenced by a motion in full Council in January 2022, and a Press Release on 14 February headed "Richmond Council demands more powers to protect local trees".

I deplore the destruction of trees on the Hampton Road site, and heartily commend the Council's action in this respect (those who agree might consider adding to the Objections lodged to planning application 22/T0063).

However, the Council's recent activity in this respect seems at odds with their attitude towards trees on and bordering the Diamond Jubilee Gardens. Here, a process of wholesale felling is planned to occur, 44 trees in all (according the Arboricultural Impact Assessment). As I have mentioned in a previous letter, amongst these trees the greatest loss will be the two Catalpa by the Wharf Lane entrance, and the two of the hornbeams adjacent to the Service Road.

In July 2019, I enquired from the Trees & Parks Department about obtaining a Tree Preservation Order for these four trees. The definitive reply I eventually received from the Arboricultural Manager was ".... [the trees] are not under any threat of removal; as this is the case it would not be expedient to serve a Tree Preservation Order. I am aware there is a design competition for the site ad my advice... is that the trees should be surveyed in order to properly understand their condition and contribution in the local and wider landscape".

I enquired further in September 2021, when the planning application had been published making it quite clear that those four trees would be removed, despite a very positive independent report of their condition and contribution to the local and wider landscape. I received the following from the Council's Arboricultural Manager "...The creation of a Tree Preservation Order is a lengthy process and should only be used where it is expedient, as there is no immediate threat of removal and there are provisions in place to assess any scheme in line with established policy I will not be recommending that an order be made at this time".

On the Hampton Road site, the Council complains they do not have sufficient powers; on the Riverside site they have the powers, but do not allow their use. A touch hypocritical? What more can an individual do to get trees preserved when there is a clear and present danger of them being felled?

## Storm warning – advice and changes to waste collections

The Met Office has issued a red warning for strong winds today. Storm Eunice may cause significant disruption across London.

### Live updates:

- We are aware that some recycling collections did take place this morning. As many boxes were put out for collection, our contractor decided to complete as many collections as they could this morning, to avoid debris and serious litter when the winds pick up.
- Crews will be out tomorrow morning (Saturday) as expected if your normal collection day is today (Friday) and you did not present your recycling, please do so tomorrow.
- Strong winds are anticipated to continue, we still ask that residents keep hold of their recycling, if they can, until next week's collection.
- All COVID-19 mobile testing and vaccinate sites across London will be closed today. If you have a booking you will receive a message with details for rebooking.
- Townmead Road is closed today. If you had a booking you will have received an email with further information.
- Report fallen trees immediately by calling 020 8891 1411 or by reporting a problem with a tree

You should expect travel disruptions to roads, bridges, and railway lines, as well as possible delays and cancellations to bus, train, ferry services, and flights. Flying debris can also cause a danger to life, please take care and follow the below advice.

Stay safe:

- Secure loose objects such as bins, garden furniture, and anything else that could be moved by wind
- Close and fasten doors and windows
- Park vehicles in a garage, if available; otherwise keep them clear of buildings, trees, walls, and fences
- Adjust your plans to avoid travel if possible
- Many local attractions and parks have closed please check with them for details
- Stay indoors as much as possible
- Avoid walking close to buildings and trees. Do not walk along tow paths and in woodland areas
- If damage is caused, do not go outside to repair it whilst the storm is in progress
- Do not drive unless your journey is really necessary

After the storm:

- Be careful not to touch any electrical/telephone cables that have been blown down or are still hanging
- Do not walk too close to walls, buildings and trees as they could have been weakened
- Make sure that any vulnerable neighbours or relatives are safe and help them make arrangements for any repairs

## Council to host Green Homes Grant drop-in event

Richmond Council will host a virtual drop-in webinar event on Tuesday, 1 March to provide residents with more information on the Green Homes Grant and how eligible households across the borough can apply for up to £10,000 worth of funding to improve the energy efficiency of their homes.

The Green Homes Grant is a scheme for homeowners and landlords to support the installation of energy efficient and low-carbon heating improvements to their homes.

The Green Homes Grant provides funding to support with energy efficiency and low-carbon heating solutions for low-income households in the most energy-inefficient homes across the borough.

Eligibility for the Green Homes Grant has recently been expanded meaning more homes in the borough are now eligible for funding to improve the energy efficiency of their homes.



To be eligible for the grant households must have a household income of  $\pm 30,000$  or less and live in a property with an EPC rating of D, E, F or G (the four lowest EPC ratings). Residents can check the <u>EPC rating</u> of their homes. Both homeowners and landlords are eligible to apply for the scheme.

The event will be hosted by Richmond Council's Climate Emergency lead officer, Andrew Hagger. At the event residents will be able to learn more about the scheme and attendees will also have an opportunity to ask any questions they might have about the grant.

The event will cover who is eligible for a Green Homes Grant, the process of applying and what the home improvements will look like. The event will be recorded and made available on the Council's website for those unable to attend on the night.

The virtual drop-in event will take place on Tuesday, 1 March at 5pm.

## Richmond Council demands more powers to protect local trees

The Chair of Richmond Council's Environment, Sustainability, Culture and Sport Committee has written to the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Homes and Communities to request a review of guidance given to local planning authorities around protecting local trees from felling on the grounds of their benefits to the climate and biodiversity.

At January's full Council meeting, a motion was passed unanimously to request the government review the legislation and guidance on Tree Preservation Order (TPO) and trees in conservation areas. The Town and Country Planning Act 1990 gives "amenity" as the grounds for protection and online government guidance specifically states that while nature conservation and climate change are factors that can be taken into account, they are not sufficient grounds in themselves for making a Tree Preservation Order.

The motion was tabled following serious concerns raised by the community and local environmental groups over the potential loss of trees near to Twickenham Green. In November 2021 notice was served on the Council, outlining the intention to fell trees on land to the rear of properties in Hampton Road, which is in a conservation area. A Eucalyptus tree was already protected by a TPO and works to it were refused permission by the Council. However, under national planning laws, there was not sufficient reason for the Council to be able to make preservation orders for the other trees. The developer has now felled all but one of the trees not protected by a TPO.

Councillor Julia Neden-Watts said:

"The loss of tree canopy is something we should seek to avoid wherever possible. With our nation's minds so keenly focused on the impact of climate change and biodiversity loss, the Government should be doing everything they can to help us achieve this. At the moment, guidance does not place enough importance on the climate impact.

"Richmond Council, like many others around the country, has declared a climate emergency and has in place an ambitious and wide-ranging Climate Emergency Strategy. It is critical that local planning authorities are able to give weighting to climate and environmental considerations in their decision making, notwithstanding the separate legislative requirements in relation to protected species.

"I have written to Mr Gove to ask he reviews the Government's guidance and, if necessary, the Regulations and Act to ensure local authorities have a clear mandate that allows them to protect their local tree canopy."

## **Twickers Foodie** - By Rlison Jee THE LENSBURY: A RESORT ON OUR DOORSTEP

If you've lived in the area for any length of time, you'll have heard of **The Lensbury**. It's that massive building beside the Thames, just along from The Anglers in Teddington. It's a sports club; one that's rather exclusive, but offers an amazing range of facilities to members. Established in 1920, as the sports and social club for employees of Shell, the current clubhouse was completed in 1938.



Shell added a conference centre later, and this facility exists still - now open to all. The march of time led Shell to divest itself of this overhead, and it became a private sports club for the local community. In the early 2000s it had significant investment in the facilities, bedrooms and grounds, to form The Lensbury as we know it today. London & Regional Hotels acquired it a couple of years ago and made a further £1 million investment improving the gym and studio facilities.

But did you know that anyone can book to stay at **The Lensbury Resort** (as it is now called)? I certainly didn't, but recently went to check it out: I was delighted to discover that we have, right on our doorstep, a fabulous hotel, complete with sports and leisure facilities, glorious grounds alongside the River Thames, and a luxury spa!



The Lensbury has over 150 guest bedrooms, offering everything one would expect from a luxury hotel. Our room was large and luxurious, overlooking the gardens, and while perhaps a tad corporate in design, was certainly top notch.

There's a lovely atmosphere at The Lensbury - one that reminded us of an American country club. It was obvious that there's also a big social element to Lensbury membership.

We enjoyed our dinner - the service is exemplary and the staff are not only very professional, but charming. The menu in the Club Lounge is pretty extensive, and offers everything from sandwiches and light bites (from £4) to a 10oz sirloin steak at £25. There is also a curry of the week at £14, which, judging by the ones we saw being served at other tables, looked excellent.

There's a well constructed and sensibly priced wine list, also offering some fine wines for those wanting to splash out.

We started with a couple of 'small plates & nibbles' - chargrilled halloumi and crispy squid rings (£6 a portion). The portions were a tad on the mean side, but were tasty and didn't spoil our appetites for our main course. My husband enjoyed a steak, and I opted for the lamb rump, both of which were really delicious. I couldn't resist a 'dessert of the day' - a ginger cheesecake - which was amazing! My husband chose the sticky toffee pudding, which was declared excellent. Desserts are very reasonably priced - from £5. This menu is, of course, available to all hotel guests too.



Breakfast was equally good, with an extensive hot buffet and again, impeccable service. There were lots of members enjoying breakfast, and meeting friends for coffee after a sports session or one of the on-site fitness classes. Members also enjoy a dedicated co-working space, plus a range of children's facilities, holiday camps, and a creche.

There's a fabulous indoor pool (with saunas and steam room) and state-of-the-art gym, just a short stroll from the main building. The main building also has a relaxing spa, in conjunction with Elemis, offering a full range of beauty treatments. In the morning I enjoyed a wonderful facial, and made a note to return at a later date for some more treatments - as the beauty spa is open to non residents.



This is a point I'm keen to make: **we have a luxury resort on our doorstep.** One that many people aren't aware of, and one that's the perfect venue for a local 'staycation'. It's also a popular wedding and party venue (again this facility is available to non members). There are water sports facilities (including motor boat hire) and for anyone keen on racquet sports, there are 24 courts available!

The Lensbury has a number of special offers and seasonal packages for anyone wanting to book a stay - check out the website <u>here</u>. Standard B&B is from £145 per room per night and dinner B&B from £195. Overnight guests enjoy full access to the hotel's leisure facilities, including complimentary use of the tennis and squash courts (subject to availability), gym and pool. In warmer weather, kayaks can be hired at an hourly rate, as well as a motor boat. And if you're interested in membership, the club is currently open to new members, so you should contact the club on 020 8614 6420 to arrange a tour and find out about joining fees and membership costs.

Killology by Gary Owen

Putney Theatre Company at the Putney Arts Studio until 19<sup>th</sup> February

The award-winning play *Killology* has a tagline that suggests it's going to concern the effects of playing violent video games, but it quickly becomes apparent that the play is far more interested in exploring the consequences of personal actions and how they are influenced by human relationships, especially on a paternal level.

Jerome Joseph Kennedy, Morgan Beale, and Theo Leonard each relish their roles and attack the parts

with gusto. The play is formed almost like a relay, with the spotlight constantly moving back and forth on stage, not at one point is the baton dropped when it's anyone turn to run with it.



For the most part the characters are kept separate from each other and it takes nearly an hour of their three stories before the crossover aspects really start to come into effect. When they do finally start to interact with each other the tension created between the characters is palpable and very well staged. The father-son interactions in the second half of the play are very well worked and the actors, who have essentially been telling three long monologues for the most part, play off each other very effectively.

It is testament to the way the characters and direction navigate a very sharply written piece that by the end there is no hero or villain but just plenty of questions and debatable perspectives lingering amongst the audience.

Whether the real villain is nature, nurture or rogue outside influences and who is responsible for them is left for debate. The show is a true three-hander in terms of stage action and the whole cast and crew have come together to create a very strong and powerful two hours of theatre.

Death, natural or otherwise, seems to be a preoccupation, even in the title for half the plays.



Liz Carroll's *Death by Misadventure* has details of the grisly death of a bridegroom at the hands of his bride gradually revealed. There is some great imagery, red blood on the white wedding cake. Very Hitchcock!

*A3*, by Neil Jarvis, follows the dead man's daughters in the aftermath of his funeral. In spite of sibling rivalry, a mysterious note, saying simply "A3", has more import. In *A Shot at Life* also by Neil Jarvis, a man commissions a hit-

man to murder his wife. This seemingly simple premise develops into an intriguing backstory.

*A Thousand Words* by Adrian Tang is written in verse, which gives it a Shakespearian feel – with a few modern expletives thrown in. Everley is painting a royal portrait, attempting to capture the Kings character, but is that what the King wants?

Stephanie Gunner Lucas' *The Fisherman and his Wife* retells the Grimms' tale, in which a fisherman comes across a talking fish that can grant unlimited wishes. The wife demands more and more, but this play has a traditional Grimm message for us all.

In *Factory Children* by Matthew Beswick, a vlogger goes into a derelict biscuit factory (Reading's Huntley and Palmers?) where five children and their teacher have mysteriously disappeared. This provides the backdrop for a reflection on the priorities of today ...

## The Bells of St Mary's: Preview Thames Singers at Hampton Parish Church, Hampton 26<sup>th</sup> February

Music critic Thomas Forsythe discusses the bells of Hampton Church and the forthcoming *Concert for the Bells* with St Mary's Ringing Master, Jonathan Williams

TF: Campanology is a great word for a pub guiz, but it must be exciting to make these giants of the musical world sing out so joyously.

JW: St Mary's eight bells have been part of our local heritage for nearly two centuries, so yes, it is an exhilarating experience.

TF: We hear that you are planning a rehanging of the bells, an

extensive piece of work, presumably after they ring out for the Queen's Jubilee?

Later in the year the bells will be lowered from the tower and taken to a foundry for tuning. The eight JW: bells weigh nearly three tonnes, so not an easy job. Additionally, the ringing mechanism will need to be renovated before the bells are reinstated in the tower.

TF: The peals of St Mary's bells are a familiar sound known far and wide.

JW: Our bells appear in unexpected places. It is the bells of St Mary's that feature on Pink Floyd's High Hopes album. Pink Floyd guitarist David Gilmour owns The Astoria, the historic houseboat that is moored at Hampton.

TF: May I ask which foundry will be doing the work on the bells?

JW: Our bells were made in the famous Whitechapel Bell Foundry that made Big Ben; and its successor will be one of the specialists tendering for the work.

TF: Could you tell us what you estimate the cost to be?

JW: We are budgeting for a total of £80,000. However, we have a very generous grant from a dedicated charity of £15,000, for which we are enormously grateful.

TF: Nevertheless, that still leaves a considerable sum of money yet to raise.

JW: Yes, and to this end the appeal for the bells of will be launched on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> February with a free chamber concert at St Mary's church. Thames Singers will be performing solo and choral items. The programme comprises music from the 18<sup>th</sup> Century to today by well-known composers such as Handel, Schumann and Brahms and less famous names such as Rheinberger, Morten Lauridsen and Bob Chilcott.

TF: Thank you, Jonathan for telling us all about your exciting project, which brings together music, culture and tradition, with a fantastic music source that rarely features in arts reviews, church bell-ringing.

## WIZ Tales - Hungary

The Republic of Hungary is a landlocked country in Central Europe. It is bordered by Ukraine, Slovakia, Austria, Slovenia, Croatia, Serbia and Romania.

Hungary was one of the original members of the Warsaw Treaty Organisation, formed in 1955; the treaty allowed the Red Army to have bases in member states.

On October 23 1989 Hungary was renamed the Republic of Hungary and in 1990 free elections were held. The Hungarian Democratic Forum formed the new government and Hungary began to develop close political and economic ties with the EU, becoming a member in 2004.

Many Hungarians have found fame abroad including the following:

- Joseph Pulitzer, born in 1847, who became a famous publisher and newspaper owner in the USA founding the Pulitzer Prizes with awards in journalism, literature, drama, education, and travelling scholarships.
- Adolph Zukor, the founder of Paramount Pictures, and Alexander Korda who left Hungary in 1919 to work in England and the United States; Korda was knighted in 1942 by George VI.
- Sir Georg Solti who worked as the music director of London's Royal Opera, Covent Garden between 1961 and 1971 and went on to become the director of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.
- Jozsef Galamb, the designer of the model T, the world's first mass produced car, David Gestetner, inventor of the office copier, Ladislao Jose Biro, inventor of the ballpoint pen, Janos Neumann, a mathematician and inventor of an early computer, and Charles Simonyi, who worked at Xerox Palo Alto Research Center and Microsoft developing microcomputer applications.

### Storm Eunice and preparations ...

We have a nice, open training ground and it's been quite windy. It was impossible to do offensive and defensive set pieces today so we will do a walk-through tomorrow when we meet. I had a tactical session with some free play yesterday, so we got some bits in. [Today] we did prep, some boxes, and some small-sided games to get it going. Suddenly, one of the goals was moving so after round six I cut it and we went in.

### Team News ...

Ivan Toney has done some light sessions and we will assess him in the morning to see how close he is. He's a player we would really like in our team, or at least in our squad. We will see

### tomorrow.

Christian Eriksen looked good in the 60 minutes he played [on Monday] and looked good in training. He feels well and is in a good place. He's been out for seven months and normally you need a proper pre-season to get it going. He came to us with a good foundation, so he doesn't need six weeks, but this Arsenal game is just one step too early. We have another good opponent for a friendly game on Monday. We are aiming for the Newcastle game.

Josh Dasilva is in a good place physically. Now it is for him to put in consistent performances. He is pretty close to showing the level and talent he has. I have no doubt that he is one of our most important players if he can hit his level going forward. He needs to show that week in, week out, in the Premier League but he has all the abilities to do that. I can't wait for me to decide to let him start. Hopefully, that will be soon.

### Mood in the camp ...

We have a very good group of players, a lot of whom have been here for a few years so know what we do and the environment we try to create. I am quite consistent in my messages, day in and day out. In general, being consistent in your behaviour is key. Performances don't lie, results can lie. I would have been much more worried if the performances had been bad because it is much more difficult to twist that narrative as the players feel it themselves.

### Facing up to Arsenal ...

After a little bit of a tough start to the season for various reasons, they have done unbelievably well. They are indeed fighting for a top four and are in good form. Arsenal want to do everything they can to prove it was a slip from them against us, we need to do everything we can to perform well and to try to get three points. We believe that we can do that in every game. If we continue to put the consistent performances out there, then hopefully the margins drop for us, and we could make a remarkable win.

We need to defend well in a low block, when we have to, and there will be spells where we will have to defend with our lives. I hope we are brave to play a bit more in spells. Arsenal have changed a few bits in the way they build up. In that way we need to change small bits.

Looking from the outside their performances look more consistent and their culture looks stronger and stronger. They are a team that works harder for each other and that is paying off.

They are playing their younger, top talents, who are growing because they are playing with the right players around them. Everything is building and growing in the right direction. They have consistency in their performances which means a lot when it comes to getting points and competing for the top four.



## Record breaking crowds Confirmation of West Ham attendance

Brentford FC has received confirmation of a record that has been broken this season, and could be again within weeks, potentially days. Earlier this season when The Bees won against West Ham United at the London Stadium, there was confusion over the attendance. It has now been confirmed that the official attendance was 59,889. This is the largest crowd ever for a Brentford league match.

It has been more than a century since Brentford entered the Football League. The Bees have played more than 4,200 league matches at well over 100 stadiums. But matches in front of crowds of more than 50,000 have been rare.

The highest crowd The Bees have ever played a recognised fixture in front



of came in 1942. The Bees beat Portsmouth in the London War Cup Final at Wembley Stadium. The official attendance for that fixture was 69,792.

The game against West Ham is now the largest crowd for a league game and we have played in front of more than 50,000 people on four more occasions this term – at Newcastle United, Tottenham Hotspur, Liverpool and Manchester City. Our visits to Arsenal, tomorrow, and then Manchester United in April could also be record-breaking.
