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

Altered train service and buses replace trains in the Hounslow area **Sunday 28 July** The lines in the **Hounslow** area will be **closed all day** due to maintenance work.

- London Waterloo to Woking via Staines services will be revised. These services will be diverted between Barnes and Feltham and will call additionally at Richmond and Twickenham.
- Buses will run between Barnes and Feltham via Hounslow.

- Buses will run between Barnes and Twickenham via Hounslow (afternoon and evening only).

Local Picture Postcard Column - Part 259


Alfred Lord Tennyson Montpelier Row - Twickenham

We could write a very thick book about the well - known folk who have lived in Montpelier Row in Twickenham. As this column is all about what can be found on postcards, we shall take occasional looks at the people and individual houses that have appeared on postcards of this famous Row facing Marble Hill Park.

Let's look at number 15. This house was built in around 1721 and sits on the corner of Chapel Road. The garden spans the whole length of Chapel Road and originally had rear entrances to the property in Orleans Road which was originally built as a road of Servants cottages for those who lived in Montpelier Row.



Number 15 was originally called Chapel House and has also been named Holyrood House and Tennyson House in its time. Postcard Number 1. this week shows the house in the period it was named Holyrood House and identifies the link between Tennyson and the property. It has been listed as a Grade II building by English Heritage and boasts a blue plaque dedicated to Alfred Lord Tennyson who lived there between 1851 and 1853. His son was baptised at St Mary's Church at this time.





In 1850, after William Wordsworth's death and Samuel Rogers' refusal, Tennyson was appointed to the position of Poet Laureate; Elizabeth Barrett Browning and Leigh Hunt had also been considered. He held the position until his own death in 1892, the longest tenure of any laureate.

The second postcard is circa 1890's and shows an early photograph of Tennyson.

The final postcard was published by the BBC in recent years and quotes part of one of his more memorable poems.

And so to more recent times that even some of our older readers can remember! In the 1970's Number 15 Montpelier Row was bought by Pete Townshend of the Who. Pete lived there for a number of years before purchasing the Wick on Richmond Hill. We will have a look at postcards featuring Pete on another occasion.

To Editor, Twickenham Tribune Sir,

Richmond and Wandsworth Councils' shared Chief Executive

I was baffled and concerned to read the heartwarming eulogy on departing Richmond and Wandsworth Councils' shared Chief Executive, Mike Jackson, penned by Richmond Council Leader Gareth Roberts and published in your latest edition. This is very similar in vein to the glowing piece on Mr. Jackson that was also published in the latest Council News email.

Is Mr. Roberts not aware that Mike Jackson is at the heart of a General Election votes miscounting at Wandsworth Council, in which 6,500 votes simply disappeared, as reported in the national media? Indeed, it has been suggested that this gathering storm, is the reason for his abrupt resignation less than two years into his post.

Although quietly brushed under the carpet by our "sister" Wandsworth Council, this situation has now rightly been exposed and will no doubt be the subject of a serious investigation. Therefore, questioning the facts behind Mr Jackson's resignation, and his part in the vote counting blunder, is premature, inappropriate and potentially prejudicial to the investigation.

It reveals a disturbing lack of judgment on the part of Mr. Roberts, not to mention the appearance that he, too, is trying to "damage limit" in a situation where a more positive stance would have been to call for an examination of the vote count methodology for our own constituencies, to ascertain whether we, too, suffered a similar problem.

I am deeply unhappy that our elected Leader, whose job is to hold our Council officers to account, feels substandard performance and over-seeing mismanagement merit plaudits rather than criticism.

Would you or a relative of yours appreciate help from a friend in your local timebank: perhaps with practical tasks like gardening, decorating, cleaning, tidying, filing, shopping or petcare; perhaps with coaching, tuition, constructive listening and moral support or entertainment?

Could you, with your skills and experience, offer a corresponding length of time to other friends in your local timebank?

You might want to get to know your fellow timebankers before the practical work starts. You will meet them at a discussion of the development of the timebank itself, at a teleconference or in person, followed by discussion of the members' immediate offers and needs.

Have you already been giving time to voluntary and charitable endeavours? The organisers might credit you for that time, and thus you can get initial credit for your timebank account.

People get involved in time banks for a range of reasons: to find an outlet for their skills, to obtain help, to build their social network, to develop the sense of community where they live, and to build credit that they may use for themselves or relatives if and when they are in failing health.

If these suggestions interest you, we'd like to hear from you, and welcome you as a founder member of Richmond Timebank - serving the whole Borough of Richmond and people nearby.

There are 130 timebanks in Britain affiliated to Timebanking UK. It's time that we in Richmond had one. Have a look at the website – www.timebankinguk.org - for more detail of how timebanks operate.

Our next in-person meeting to develop Richmond Timebank will be at the Old Ship, 3 King Street, Richmond, TW9 1ND at 6.30 on Mon 2nd September. Look out for the table with the Timebank sign.

However, meantime, do feel free to get in touch with me and join in the e-mail discussion and teleconferences we will be having as we refine the constitution and procedures and the roles we may play as timebrokers, IT and database developers, publicists, secretary and treasurer to keep Richmond Timebank running and developing, as well as exchanging our time informally.

When you get in touch, I'll send you a more detailed account of progress so far, and what we envisage will be the next stages in development of Richmond Timebank and an application form to join us.

We timebankers can start exchanging time as soon as we like. I'd like some help at my allotment in North Twickenham, and in exchange I can offer any of the practical services listed above.

Ideas for projects include:


- Installing a rain garden rain gardens can survive long, dry summers and short periods of heavy rain or flooding





It's crafted in partnership with the Master Distiller at **The Two Tykes distillery**. Serve with tonic water over ice with a slice of grapefruit and a sprig of rosemary. It's great value at £21.25 for a 70cl bottle, but currently on offer to clubcard holders at just £18.

Torres Vina Sol is one of my favourite white wines. It's so reliable and, for me, brings happy memories of holidays in Mallorca. Crafted from grapes grown in the sun-kissed coastal vineyards of Catalonia in the North East of Spain, award-winning Viña Sol wines truly capture the spirit of summer. But until recently I'd only tried the original blend, the one that's been a crowd pleaser since 1962. 

Humble Boy



Humble Boy is set in a garden, replete with glorious flowers as if to emphasise the lack of life and nourishment for the family that inhabits it. There is a parallel allusion to the bees, beloved by Flora Humble's late husband. The hive, prominent on the set, is now empty.

Felix Humble, who has a fractured relationship with his mother, Flora, has returned to the family home following the death of his father. Crashing insensitively into their discomforting reunion, comes businessman George Pye. George and Flora have been having a long-time affair and now intend to marry. Adding to these complexities, Felix and George's daughter Rosie have also had a fling, ending in unhappy resentment. Rosie has a young daughter... and who might the father might be?

Flora's rootless friend Mercy, energetically played by Marie Bushell, is privy to many of these secrets, and has much of the cleverly written humour, witness Mercy, preparing lunch, unknowingly adding a spoonful of the father's ashes to the gazpacho.

Thoughtful angles come with Felix's genius mind,



Flora is the "Queen Bee", whose prerogative is always to have the last word. Susan Reoch perfectly captures the essence of this dominating, self-centred matriarch.

Playing George is Ashley Brown, who brings the loud brashness of this dreadful self-made man, out of his depth in the genteel world to which he aspires. His daughter, Rosie, "she's not a looker but has character" in George's words, is played with an exuberant mix of playful confidence by Anna Piggott.

The mysterious gardener, always in the background, played sensitively with studied under-statement by James Phillips, flourishes in a final touching scene where he shows himself to be the only person that Felix can trust.

Director Jane Gough brings *Humble Boy* together with sympathy and enthusiasm, enhanced by music sympathetically reminiscent of the English country garden, to create a clever and absorbing mosaic of a play that works on many different levels.

Opera Gala Concert West Green House Opera, at the Theatre on the Lawn, Hartley Wintney

Gleaming white dining pavilions by the glittering lake and the gardens, swollen with glorious blooms, form the setting for a new opera season. On the hottest day of the year there is a party atmosphere as the champagne corks pop. (Ice-pack don't last at 32°C.) Bacchus smiles out from the programme cover, the Bacchus on the façade of West Green House, which forms the backdrop in the Theatre on the Lawn, a generous pavilion, sans upstage wall, looking across the greensward towards the handsome house.

The BBC Concert Orchestra is full of energy in spite of the heat. Its dynamic conductor John Andrews is a champion of neglected <u>pieces</u>, tonight Poulenc's seldom seen surrealist opera, Les Mamelles de Tirésias. A wife changes sex, a current rage, but not like this. Her breasts becomes balloons and float off. Meanwhile her husband gives birth to 40,049 children! Mafi brings out all its wicked playfulness in a spirited Piafian sort of way.

Accomplished tenor soloist Nicky Spence MBE provides the ear-worm: from Lalo's opera Le roi d'Ys. The warrior Mylio sings



an aubade to his bride, princess Rozenn, a rich velvety aria, not knowing that her jealous sister is about to inundate the city by broaching the sea wall. (Quite hard to stage.) Of course nowadays for any tenor Nessun dorma from Puccini's Turandot is a must. This time though we feel the full force of Spence's powerful voice, against every instrument in the orchestra in the crescendo, "vincerò"!

The stand-alone orchestral pieces include an exuberantly energetic czárdás from Johann Strauss' only opera, Ritter Pázmán, about knights, kings and stolen kisses. It is folksy multi-tempo dance, full of zesty zip and zing, with vigorous violin virtuosity in the prestissimo passages.

Mafi has fun with *Glitter and Be Gay*, from Bernstein's operetta *Candide*. Demi-mondaine Cunegonde, is arraying herself in jewels for a Parisian soirée. Mafi's nimble coloratura skips along even through this demanding aria's most florid sections. Her eyes twinkle with the naughtiness, as does her glittering gravity-defying dress.

However, it is the duets that grip the audience. The much-loved *Lippen Sweigen* from Lehar's *The Merry* Widow, forms the finale for the concert. The familiar lyricism of the piece permeates the audience, Mafi and Spence dance the waltz, and everyone believes that "all the world's in love with love". And walking back to the dining pavilions through the illuminated wonderland of glowing pools and niches, it seems that all the senses are alive.


Meditate and heal at free immersive exhibition 'The Templum'

RNLI reminds everyone to stay safe in the water on World Drowning Prevention Day

Today (Thursday 25 July 2024) marks World Drowning Prevention Day and the RNLI is reminding everyone in the South East heading to the coast to visit a lifeguarded beach and swim between the red and yellow flags. In addition, it warns against entering perilous rivers and inland waters. The charity is sharing its lifesaving safety advice as school children across the country enjoy the start of the summer holidays, with the coast predicted to be incredibly busy.

Figures released by the RNLI show that 83% of the UK adult population (aged 16-64) expect to visit the coast this summer, and 40% expect to go three times or more.

Figures from the RNLI reveal that Teddington RNLI volunteer crew attended 95 incidents and saved two lives on the Thames last year. RNLI lifeguards will be



patrolling around 245 beaches this summer to offer advice on how to stay safe and they are also there to help anyone who gets into trouble. Teddington Water Safety experts will also be visiting fairs and fetes throughout the summer.

236 people accidentally died in water related fatalities in 2023, ten more than in 2022 but in line with the five-year average. Of the 236 accidental fatalities in the UK in 2023; 20 occurred in July and 21 in August, reinforcing how important it is to stay safe at the coast over the summer.

On July 25th Teddington RNLI safety advisors and volunteer crew will join the London Fire Brigade and other emergency services in front of Hampton Court Palace from midday. They will demonstrate how to use throwlines, the importance of floating to live and other lifesaving advice.

Miranda Jaggers, Teddington RNLI Head of Water Safety said: "On World Drowning Prevention Day we want to remind everyone that visiting a lifeguarded beach and swimming between the red and yellow flags can make a lifesaving difference. We know the coast is going to be incredibly busy over the summer holidays and we want everyone to enjoy their time but to also remember our vital safety advice.

"If you get into trouble in the water, Float to Live; tilt your head back with ears submerged and try to relax and control your breathing. Use your hands to help you stay afloat and then call for help or swim to safety if you can. It's OK if your legs sink, we all float differently. In a coastal emergency, call

999 and ask for the Coastquard."

Paris 2024 Olympics: Team St Mary's Preview

Thirteen athletes from St Mary's University, Twickenham (SMU) and the Endurance Performance Centre (EPC) have been selected to compete at the upcoming Olympic and Paralympic Games this summer.

Thirteen athletes from St Mary's University, Twickenham (SMU) and the Endurance Performance Centre (EPC) have been selected to compete at the upcoming Olympic and Paralympic Games this summer. The Paris 2024 Games will see current, former, and associate athletes of SMU compete in athletics, triathlon, rugby sevens, and para-cycling events for Great Britain, Jamaica, and France.



St Mary's University has a history of success at recent Olympic and Paralympic Games. athletes, alumni, and students from SMU have won a Gold medal at every Games since Beijing 2008. In total the University has seen 51 athletes take part in the last four Olympic and Paralympic Games, with some representing multiple events, winning 15 medals for their nations.

At the Rio Games in 2016, SMU athletes took home four Gold medals, as well as three Silver and two Bronze. This included Sir Mo Farah who won double Gold in the men's 5,000m and 10,000m, as well as alumnus Moe Sbihi who won Gold in the coxless four. Moe has also won Bronze twice in the men's eight at the London and Tokyo Games. Alumna Corrine Hall took home Gold and Bronze in the track and road para-cycling events respectively as a Pilot for

Lora Fachie in Rio, and at the Tokyo Games in 2021 the pair won Gold and Silver in the track and road para-cycling events. Overall, SMU athletes won three medals at the Tokyo 2020 Games.

Speaking of the team going to Paris, Head of Sport St Mary's said, "The Olympics is often referred to as the greatest show on earth, and with good justification. St Mary's is incredibly proud of all our athletes, and we understand how much work they've all put in to be selected for a Games. We wish them an enjoyable and successful experience and we'll be cheering them on."

Here is the full list of all the SMU athletes selected to compete at the Olympic Games in Paris this summer to watch out for:

Beth Potter

Beth is an EPC and SMU alumna and will be competing for Team GB in the women's triathlon, having secured her place after taking the World Championship title last year. Paris will be Beth's second Olympic Games, having previously competed at the Rio Games in the women's 10,000m event. She made her switch to triathlon in 2017, winning Gold just two years later at the 2019 European Triathlon Championships.

Emile Cairess

Emile is an EPC and SMU alumnus and will be competing in the men's marathon for Team GB. Emile was the first-placed Briton in the 2024 London Marathon, running the second fastest British marathon time ever at 2:06:46. Fellow EPC alumnus and four-time Olympic Gold medal winner Sir Mo Farah currently holds the record with a time of 2:05:11. Emile is the current European record holder for the road 10 miles.

Charlotte Purdue

Charlotte is an EPC and SMU alumna. She will be running in the women's marathon for Team GB. She is currently third on the women's British all-time Marathon record list, and holds the UK junior 10,000m record. Charlotte completed her first marathon in 2016 and was the first British woman across the line at the World Athletics Championships in 2017.

Corrine Hall

Corrine is an SMU alumna and will be competing in her third Paralympic Games as a tandem pilot for Lora Fachie. The pair have already won Gold twice at the Paralympics in the track para-cycling events at Rio and Tokyo. In the road para-cycling events they took home Bronze in Rio and Silver in Tokyo.

Adelle Tracey

Adelle is an EPC and SMU alumna and is representing Team Jamaica at the Paris Games. Adelle is running in the women's 800m and 1500m events, having previously broke a Jamaican national record in both distances at the World Athletics Championships in 2023. Adelle represented Great Britain until 2022, and was one of the torchbearers at the Opening Ceremony for the London Games in 2012. She was selected as a torchbearer by Dame Kelly Holmes as one of six young British sport talents to watch.

Revée Walcott-Nolan

Revée is an EPC and SMU alumna and will be racing in the women's 1500m. She made her Olympic debut for Team GB at the Tokyo Games in 2021, having been crowned the women's 1500m champion at the British Championships that same year. Earlier this year Revée placed third in the 1500m at the British Athletics Championships, securing her place at the Paris Games.

Jake Wightman

Jake is an EPC associate and has been regularly training at SMU since 2017. He made his Olympic debut at the Tokyo Games, running in the men's 1500m event. Jake became the men's 1500m World Champion in 2022 at the World Athletics Championships in Eugene, USA. At the Paris Games, he will be competing in the men's 800m for Team GB.

David Weir

David is an associate of St Mary's and regularly trains and undertakes testing in its world class

facilities. He has been selected for his seventh Paralympics for Team GB, racing in the men's T54 1500m, 5000m, and marathon events during the Games. David previously won four Gold medals at the Beijing 2008 Paralympics, and a further two Golds in the London 2012 Paralympics.

Emma Uren

Emma is an alumna at SMU and has been named captain of the Team GB women's rugby sevens squad at the Paris Games. This is Emma's second Olympic selection, having competed with the Team GB squad at the Tokyo Olympics in 2021. The team came fourth at the Tokyo Games.

Ellie Kildunne

Ellie is an alumna of SMU and will be making her Olympic debut in Paris with the Team GB women's rugby sevens squad. Ellie was the leading point-scorer for the winning England team at this year's Six Nations tournament, scoring nine tries throughout the Six Nations. She also finished the tournament with the most carries, most metres gained, and most line-breaks for the team.

Lauren Torley

Lauren is a current MSc Applied Sport Psychology student and Gold sports scholar at SMU. She will be making her Olympic debut with Team GB women's rugby sevens squad in Paris. Lauren was previously on the gold medal-winning Team GB squad at the 2023 European Games.

Aaron Grandidier

Aaron is an alumnus and former rugby academy scholar at SMU. He is part of the France men's rugby sevens squad in Paris, and previously scored a French record of 11 tries in a single weekend at the 2022/23 Hong Kong sevens.

Abi Burton

Abi is an alumna of SMU and has been listed as a reserve for the Team GB women's rugby sevens

squad. Abi previously competed at the Tokyo Games with the squad in 2021.

Championship Rugby League Fixtures for the 2024-25 Season Announced

Fixtures for the 2024-25 Championship Rugby league season have been confirmed for what is anticipated to be another highly competitive season.

The league competition will be played over 22 rounds, beginning over the weekend of 20-22 September, with the final round scheduled for the weekend of 30 May-1 June next year. A two-leg play-off for promotion to the Gallagher Premiership will then take place on the weekends of 6-8 June and 13-15 June between the top placed team in the Championship (provided it meets the minimum standards criteria) and the last placed team in the Gallagher Premiership.

The league will consist of 12 teams in the upcoming season after Chinnor RFC secured promotion to the Championship having topped National 1.

2023-24 season league winners Ealing Trailfinders kick off their first match at home to Hartpury University and newcomers Chinnor take on Cambridge away in their first-round game. Cornish Pirates who finished second in the league last season, play Nottingham at The Bay, while elsewhere in the competition Doncaster Knights face Ampthill at home, London Scottish play Coventry at The RAG and Caldy travel to Goldington Road to face Bedford Blues.

The Cup competition will begin in November with the first games taking place over the weekend of 1-3 November, with further rounds in February, before the quarter finals (28 February-2 March), semi-finals (7-9 March) and the final over the weekend of 14-16 March. The fixture details for the Cup will be announced soon.

RFU Director of Performance Rugby, Conor O'Shea said: "We're pleased to be able confirm the fixtures for what promises to be season full of excitement, drama and close encounters.

"The past few seasons have seen close finishes at the top of the table and 2023-24 was no different with only a handful of points between the top two teams. We will no doubt see further demonstration of the competitiveness of the league in the upcoming season.

"We're really pleased to welcome Chinnor to the Championship, who will be a great addition to the league following some brilliant performances in National 1. We wish them and the other clubs success for the year ahead.

"Throughout this season we will continue work that's taken place over the past 18 months with the clubs to develop and enhance rugby's second tier. It's an exciting time for the league and we look forward keeping its fans updated as these plans develop."

Championship Committee Chairman, Simon Halliday, said: "The value of the Championship was clear for all to see last season. The quality of rugby played was exceptional, crowds were up, and they were hugely entertained by fast, open and positive play which was particularly evident in the Premiership Cup. The role of our league as a conveyor belt of talent for English rugby will continue to feature strongly as we build and invest in our competition through the development of a new league in 25/26.

"The idea of promotion and relegation is now a long-term reality after recent Council decisions and for the first time in some years there is the genuine chance for our clubs to challenge for the top table in English rugby. This brings equivalent excitement and jeopardy to the Premiership which we all desire and which is the lifeblood of any competition.

"I wish all 12 clubs the very best of luck for the coming season and I would particularly like to welcome Chinnor, who triumphed in a very competitive National One. I am certain they will bring fresh energy and talent to the Championship.

"In this transformational season, we all look forward to fierce clashes, close matches and excitement in every game, the length and breadth of England."

Highlights, report and reaction: Benfica 1 Brentford 1

Bryan Mbeumo's opener cancelled out by Vangelis Pavlidis's close-range finish as Brentford draw with Benfica at Estádio da Luz

Bryan Mbeumo was on target as Brentford drew 1-1 with Benfica on Thursday evening.

Mbeumo capitalised on Morato's sloppy back-pass to give Thomas Frank's side an early lead in Lisbon, but the Eagles levelled on 24 minutes when Vangelis Pavlidis poked home Álvaro Carreras's cross at the front post.

Kevin Schade led the line for Brentford with <u>Igor Thiago sidelined by a meniscus injury.</u>



Vitória, a bald eagle, soared above the stadium before kick-off as the noise levels rose inside Estádio da Luz. The hosts, perhaps inspired by their winged mascot, looked to get off to a flying

start on the pitch and fashioned the first chance of note in the fifth minute.

Pavlidis released Leandro Barreiro beyond the Bees' backline with a deft touch and the midfielder was brought down by Myles Peart-Harris on the edge of the box. Fredrik Aursnes curled the resulting free-kick over the crossbar.

Brentford took the lead four minutes later. Schade's ball up the left channel was intercepted by Morato and the defender's back-pass to goalkeeper Anatoliy Trubin was underhit, which allowed the alert Mbeumo to steal in and finish first time into the bottom corner.

Benfica levelled midway through the first half. Aursnes played a short pass into the overlapping Carreras down the left, who took the ball in his stride, advanced to the byline and delivered a low, fizzing cross to the front post. Pavlidis made no mistake in poking beyond Hákon Valdimarsson from close range.

Matt Cox and Frank Onyeka replaced Valdimarsson and Yehor Yarmoliuk at the break.

Two minutes after the restart, a corner dropped to João Mário inside Brentford's box and his driven effort deflected off Nathan Collins and flew just wide of Cox's left post.

Cox showed his reflexes to deny Gianluca Prestianni on 56 minutes, diving to his left to get a strong hand on the winger's bending effort from 25 yards.

Prestianni then turned provider, lifting the ball into the area for Arthur who shot first time into the side netting.

On 64 minutes, Mbeumo cut in from the right and saw a trademark curling effort strike the far post. Moments later, at the other end, Arthur drove low across the face of goal and narrowly off target.

On 69 minutes, shortly after coming on as a substitute, Ji-soo Kim made a brave block to prevent Aursens' fierce shot from testing Cox.

João Rego, at full stretch inside the six-yard box, then turned Jan-Niklas Beste's cross from the left side wide of the post.

In the final minute of regulation time, Martim Neto received a pass from João Rêgo, took a touch to set himself on the edge of the box and forced Cox into a smart stop.

Prestianni's cross from the right was then flicked on by Arthur into the path of Casper Tengstedt, and the forward's left-footed shot from the centre of the box lacked power and was straight at Cox.

Gouveia saw his shot blocked by Conor McManus in the final seconds as Brentford withstood some late Benfica pressure to draw their second pre-season friendly of the summer.

Frank: A good test and a great experience

Pinnock: Benfica's high press a big test

Brentford defender Ethan Pinnock believes that Thursday's game against Benfica was a "good test" in preparation for the upcoming Premier League season.

"It was a great experience," he said. "They're a side with a lot of calibre and a lot of history and it was a packed-out stadium. It was a good test."

On Benfica's high-pressing game, Pinnock added: "It posed us a challenge. One of the things we focus on is trying to play out, so that helped us.

"They provided a difficult situation and we had to solve it. More often than not, we solved it. There are things we can tweak but overall we did fairly well."



Educational outcomes for SEND pupils have failed to improve over the last decade despite costs of these services trebling and councils facing a financial cliff edge, new independent report reveals

Educational attainment amongst children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) has not improved since the introduction of landmark reforms in 2014, despite councils projected to be spending £12bn on these services by 2026, up from £4bn a decade ago.

The findings come in a major new independent report by Isos Partnership commissioned by the County Councils Network and the Local Government Association. Based on substantial engagement with councils, schools, health partners, young people and parents, the study concludes that the current system is not working for families, schools and councils alike.

With a new government now in place, councils say the need for reform of SEND services is now 'unavoidable' with the report setting out a system at breaking point despite families, schools and councils all acting rationally. Councils have called on the new government to set out reform of SEND over the next 18 months, delivering its manifesto pledge to ensure mainstream schools become more inclusive.

The report outlines how councils are struggling to cope with a more than doubling of children on Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) within a system that creates 'perverse incentives' to shift responsibility between public bodies and inadvertently creates adversarial relationships between local authorities and parents. It finds a system weighted down by legal disputes through tribunals and an over-reliance on special schools due to a loss of parental confidence that mainstream schools can meet their children's needs.

Unless the system is fundamentally reformed, the report warns that outcomes for children and young people with SEND will not improve and the system will become even more financially unviable for councils. The report estimates that local authorities are projected to be spending £12bn a year on SEND services by 2026, but will still face a £5bn funding black hole to meet demand that year.

Those deficits are currently being kept off councils' balance sheets, but if they were to be placed onto their accounts, one in four councils surveyed for the research said that they would cease to be solvent within a year or less: a significant financial cliff edge.

Despite this increase in spending, educational attainment for pupils has not improved, including reading, writing and maths, and at various different ages.

New analysis contained in the report *Towards an effective and financially sustainable approach to SEND in England*, demonstrates the challenge within the system and the case for change:

- Half a million more children and young people are now identified as having special educational needs. Since the 2014 reforms of the SEND system, the number of children and young people with EHCPs which set out the level of statutory support individuals are eligible to receive has risen from 240,183 in 2015 to 575,973 in 2023/24, an increase of 140 per cent over 10 years. A further 1.2 million children in schools are identified as requiring SEN support below the level of a statutory EHCP, up from 990,000 in 2015.
- In seven of the last 10 years, more children with ECHPs have been placed in special schools compared to mainstream settings. Since 2014/15, there has been an increase of 60 per cent in the numbers of children and young people in state-funded special schools and a rise of 132 per cent in the number placed in independent and non-maintained special schools. In total 185,000 pupils with an ECHP were in special schools in 2024, up from 109,000 in 2015. For local authorities, the costs to the high needs block of a maintained specialist school placement are £25,000 per year, with an independent placement costing £58,500. This is compared to £8,200 for placing a child with an EHCP in a mainstream school.
- **Higher rates of identification of SEND** are **not leading to better educational attainment.** The report reveals that children with EHCPs have seen performance flatline, or decline, across key educational milestones over the past decade. At the end of primary school in 2022/23, only 8 per cent of children and young people with EHCPs achieved the expected level in reading, writing and mathematics exactly the same percentage who achieved that level in 2016/17. At the other end of the age spectrum, only 30 per cent of young people with EHCPs achieved Level 2 by age 19 compared with nearly 37 per

- cent who achieved this level in 2014/15.
- This is despite expenditure by councils tripling over the course of a decade. In 2015, councils SEND related expenditure was £4bn, with this forecast to reach £12bn by 2026.
- These rising costs on SEND have outpaced reform and funding from the previous government. Despite bespoke 'Safety Valve' financial support for some councils, transfers from mainstream school budgets and use of councils reserves all projected to total around £1bn between 2019 and 2026, new analysis shows cumulative deficits currently stand £3.2bn this year and are projected to rise to £5bn by 2026.
- With these deficits currently held off councils' budgets due to a temporary 'statutory override' councils face a financial cliff edge when this ends in March 2026. If the statutory override came to an end tomorrow, 1 in 4 councils surveyed for the report said that they would cease to be solvent within a year or less, with half stating they would cease to be solvent in three years or less.

In 2022, the previous government published its 'SEND Improvement Plan', designed to reform services and curtail costs. However, eight in 10 research participants surveyed as part of the report stated they disagreed (47 per cent) or strongly disagreed (36 per cent) that the improvement plan would address the fundamental challenges in the system.

Instead, the report argues there is a 'strong consensus' for a more radical programme of reform, one focused on meeting the needs of more SEND children in mainstream education. It argues that currently many mainstream schools, early years settings and colleges lack the capacity, resources, and in some cases, the expertise to meet the needs of many SEND children, resulting in more parents seeking ECHPs and an over reliance on special school placements.

The report recommends the new government invests in building capacity in mainstream schools to meet children's needs, such as therapists, educational psychologists, and wider inclusion support, helping to reduce the reliance on specialist school places. It also recommends resetting the vision and guiding principles of the SEND system towards inclusion, prevention and earlier support which would cater for young people who do not have a statutory plan, with such plans reserved for the most complex cases.

Reforms would also include a new 'national framework' for SEND and establishment of 'Local Inclusion Partnerships' to enable more effective assessments, commissioning and collaboration between councils, schools and health. This would be supported by the creation of a *National Institute for Inclusive Education* as an independent arbiter around inclusive education and support for children and young people with additional needs.

Cllr Tim Oliver, CCN Chairman, said:

"The SEND system is broken. Wide-ranging reform in 2014 was well intentioned but a decade on, it has created a system that does not work for councils, schools and parents alike. Parents often feel they struggle to access schools' services, lack the capacity to support pupils, and councils have seen a doubling in needs over the last ten years, and have amassed deficits that threaten their financial solvency. Most importantly, education outcomes and employment opportunities have not improved for children with SEND.

"As this landmark report shows, the case for reform is unquestionable. With a new government in place and elected on a 'change' platform, it is vital that reform happens over the next 18 months. The government should build on this report's clear recommendations and work with local government to create a system that is sustainable for councils and schools and works better for parents and pupils."




"What parents and children need and deserve is a properly reformed and funded SEND system that meets the care and support requirements of every child and young person with special needs.
